#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII FARM TO SCHOOL PROGRAM.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the farm to school
 program provides students with an agricultural education, which
 contributes to improved attendance, academic achievement, and
 behavior, while also increasing opportunities for place-based
 experiential learning, physical activity, and active
 participation in the school meal program.

7 In addition, farm to school program activities support a 8 nutritious school food environment that encourages students to 9 make healthier food choices. With more than eighty-five per 10 cent of students in Hawaii attending public schools, 11 participation in farm to school activities increases students' 12 familiarity with local foods, access to fresh fruits and 13 vegetables, and the likelihood that students will make healthier 14 choices at home.

15 The legislature further finds that concrete steps have been 16 taken in recent years to develop and sustain a farm to school 17 program in the State. The Hawaii farm to school program was



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1 established pursuant to Act 218, Session Laws of Hawaii 2015 2 (Act 218), within the department of agriculture to, among other things, improve student health, develop an educated agricultural 3 workforce, and expand the relationships between public schools 4 and the agricultural communities. In 2018, the legislature also 5 funded a position for the farm-to-school coordinator within the 6 7 office of the chairperson of the board of agriculture to assure 8 that programs and positions relating to the farm-to-school 9 program are aligned to properly execute, sustain, and grow the 10 program.

Since the passage of Act 218, the department of education, in collaboration with the office of the lieutenant governor, the department of agriculture, the University of Hawaii, and community partners established pilot programs using strategic procurement adjustments to increase the supply of locally-grown and raised foods in the school meal program.

However, while the department of agriculture has two positions appropriated for farm-to-school positions, the department does not have a formal program. Aina Pono is the department of education school food services branch's commitment to student health, protecting the environment, and advancing



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1 farm-to-school by purchasing fresh and local foods, greening 2 school cafeterias, reducing waste, and supporting school gardens 3 and nutrition, agriculture, health, and food education. In 4 2016, the board of education amended its school food services 5 policy to state that every public school shall provide food 6 services to students' nutritional needs at a minimum charge. 7 However, the program does not have a goal-oriented approach nor 8 indicators to successfully provide local meals to students. 9 Currently, it is estimated that three per cent of food served in 10 public schools is locally sourced.

11 The purpose of this Act is to authorize the department of 12 education to meet the local farm to school meal goal of fifteen 13 per cent of food served in public schools to be locally sourced 14 by 2025 and thirty per cent by 2030.

15 SECTION 2. Section 141-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 16 amended to read as follows:

17 "[+]\$141-11[+] Hawaii farm to school program; farm to
18 school coordinator. (a) There is established within the
19 department of agriculture a Hawaii farm to school program. The
20 purpose of the farm to school program shall be to:

21 (1) Improve student health;

13	state facilities, primarily education facilities, and take		
14	reasonabl	e steps to incorporate more agriculture and nutrition	
15	education	in schools.	
16	<u>(c)</u>	The department of agriculture shall work with the	
17	departmen	t of education to ensure that the department of	
18	education	shall meet the local farm to school meal goals of:	
19	(1)	Fifteen per cent of food served in public schools to	
20		be locally sourced products by 2025; and	



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1	(2) Thirty per cent of food served in public schools to be		
2	locally sourced products by 2030.		
3	(d) For purposes of this section:		
4	"Fresh local agricultural product" means fruits,		
5	vegetables, nuts, coffee, eggs, poultry and poultry products,		
6	livestock and livestock products, milk and milk products,		
7	aquacultural and maricultural products, and horticultural		
8	products one hundred per cent grown, raised, and harvested in		
9	the State.		
10	"Local value-added processed, agricultural, or food		
11	product" shall be defined to mean at least fifty-one per cent of		
12	the product's primary agricultural product shall be grown,		
13	raised, and harvested in the State.		
14	"Locally sourced product" means fresh local agricultural		
15	product; or local value-added processed, agricultural, or food		
16	product.		
17	"Primary agricultural product" means the major agricultural		
18	product in a processed or value-added agricultural, or food		
19	product."		



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1	SECTION 3. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is				
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated				
3	and to read as follows:				
4	"§302A- Farm-to-school program. The department of				
5	education shall work with the department of agriculture to				
6	ensure that the department of education shall meet the local				
7	farm to school meal goals of:				
8	(1) Fifteen per cent of food served in public schools to				
9	be locally sourced by 2025; and				
10	(2) Thirty per cent of food served in public schools to be				
11	locally sourced by 2030,				
12	with fresh local agricultural products in accordance with the				
13	farm to school program established in section 141-11, Hawaii				
14	Revised Statutes."				
15	SECTION 4. The department of education shall submit an				
16	annual report of its findings and recommendations, including any				
17	proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty				
18	days beginning prior to the convening of the regular session of				
19	2022.

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1	(1)	Percentage of food served in public schools that are
2		locally sourced;
3	(2)	Costs associated with program and any savings;
4	(3)	List of large purchases of local products and vendors
5		of purchase;
6	(4)	List of meals on the school menu, highlighting the
7		meals that contain the largest percentage of locally
8		sourced foods;
9	(5)	Percentage of fresh food served versus the per cent of
10		processed food served;
11	(6)	Description of training done to prepare cafeteria
12		staff for cooking from scratch; and
13	(7)	Percentage of food purchased from the department of
14		education's largest distributors.
