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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that existing laws 2 relating to the licensing or certification of emergency medical 3 personnel address only emergency ambulance personnel, including 4 licensed emergency medical technicians, advanced emergency 5 medical technicians, mobile intensive care technicians, and 6 paramedics. There is currently no licensure category for 7 emergency medical technicians with National Registry Emergency 8 Medical Technician certification only. The legislature further finds that emergency medical technicians with National Registry 9 10 Emergency Medical Technician certification provide at-the-scene, 11 life-saving care with minimal equipment to critical care 12 patients and have the knowledge and skills necessary to provide 13 immediate interventions while awaiting arrival of additional 14 emergency medical services. Emergency medical technicians are a 15 vital part of a comprehensive emergency medical services system 16 response and includes firefighters and ocean safety lifequards 17 who provide immediate life-saving interventions to patients but 18 do not provide emergency ambulance services.

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1 The purpose of this Act is to align the State with national 2 trends and mitigate the unintended consequences associated with 3 the deregulation of the State's emergency medical services 4 system by: 5 (1) Requiring the Hawaii medical board to establish a 6 pilot program to issue licenses for emergency medical 7 technicians with National Registry Emergency Medical 8 Technician certification only and whose practice is 9 limited to populations greater than 500,000, which 10 shall be based on certain requirements; 11 (2)Requiring the Hawaii medical board to issue licenses 12 for emergency ambulance personnel, which shall be 13 based on certain requirements; and 14 (3) Appropriating funds from the compliance resolution 15 fund for hiring a 0.5 full time equivalent permanent 16 position for the purposes of this Act. 17 SECTION 2. Chapter 453, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 18 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 19 and to read as follows: 20 Licensure consistent with levels of practice; "§453-21 licensure of emergency medical technician 1. (a) The Hawaii

20	SECT	ION 3. Section 321-229, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
21	amended b	y amending subsections (a) to (c) to read as follows:



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1 "(a) The University of Hawaii shall provide training 2 courses in basic, intermediate, and advanced life support for 3 emergency medical services personnel. The curricula and syllabi 4 of these courses shall be approved in advance by the department 5 of health. The curricula and syllabi of courses for ambulance 6 personnel shall be consistent with the scope and level of the 7 practice of emergency medical services associated with emergency 8 ambulance personnel [certification] licensure defined by the 9 Hawaii medical board under part II of chapter 453.

10 (b) The University of Hawaii, or other accredited 11 community college, college, or university, or any professional 12 organization that is approved by the department of health to 13 provide emergency medical services training, shall consult with 14 the department of health to determine the number and type of 15 emergency medical services courses necessary to support the 16 staffing requirements for emergency medical services. The basic 17 life support and advanced life support training programs shall 18 be relevant to and consistent with the training course required 19 for [certification] licensure under chapter 453.

20 (c) The department shall develop standards for emergency
21 medical services course instructors and standards for emergency

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1 medical services training facilities for all basic life support 2 personnel, advanced life support personnel, users of the 3 automatic external defibrillator, and emergency medical dispatch 4 personnel that shall be at least equivalent to or exceed the 5 standards necessary to meet the requirements, pursuant to 6 part II of chapter 453, for the [certification] licensure of 7 basic life support personnel and advanced life support 8 personnel." 9 SECTION 4. Section 453-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 10 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows: 11 "(b) Nothing herein shall: 12 (1) Apply to so-called Christian Scientists; provided that 13 the Christian Scientists practice the religious tenets of their church without pretending a knowledge of 14 15 medicine or surgery; 16 (2) Prohibit service in the case of emergency or the 17 domestic administration of family remedies; 18 (3) Apply to any commissioned medical officer in the 19 United States armed forces or public health service 20 engaged in the discharge of one's official duty, 21 including a commissioned medical officer employed by



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1 the United States Department of Defense, while 2 providing direct telehealth support or services to 3 neighbor island beneficiaries within a Hawaii National 4 Guard armory on the island of Kauai, Hawaii, Molokai, 5 or Maui; provided that the commissioned medical 6 officer employed by the United States Department of 7 Defense is credentialed by Tripler Army Medical 8 Center;

9 (4)Apply to any practitioner of medicine and surgery from 10 another state when in actual consultation, including 11 in-person, mail, electronic, telephonic, fiber-optic, 12 or other telehealth consultation with a licensed 13 physician or osteopathic physician of this State, if 14 the physician or osteopathic physician from another 15 state at the time of consultation is licensed to 16 practice in the state in which the physician or 17 osteopathic physician resides; provided that: 18 (A) The physician or osteopathic physician from 19 another state shall not open an office, or


appoint a place to meet patients in this State,

or receive calls within the limits of the State

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1			for the provision of care for a patient who is
2			located in this State;
3		(B)	The licensed physician or osteopathic physician
4			of this State retains control and remains
5			responsible for the provision of care for the
6			patient who is located in this State; and
7		(C)	The laws and rules relating to contagious
8			diseases are not violated;
9	(5)	Proh	ibit services rendered by any person [certified]
10		lice	nsed under part II of this chapter to provide
11		emer	gency medical services, or any physician
12		assi	stant, when the services are rendered under the
13		dire	ction and control of a physician or osteopathic
14		phys	ician licensed in this State except for final
15		refr	action resulting in a prescription for spectacles,
16		cont	act lenses, or visual training as performed by an
17		ocul	ist or optometrist duly licensed by the State.
18		The	direction and control shall not be construed in
19		ever	y case to require the personal presence of the
20		supe	rvising and controlling physician or osteopathic
21		phys	ician. Any physician or osteopathic physician who



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1		employs or directs a person [certified] licensed under
2		part II of this chapter to provide emergency medical
3		services, or a physician assistant, shall retain full
4		professional and personal responsibility for any act
5		that constitutes the practice of medicine when
6		performed by the [certified] licensed person or
7		physician assistant;
8	(6)	Prohibit automated external defibrillation by:
9		(A) Any first responder personnel certified by the
10		department of health to provide automated
11		external defibrillation when it is rendered under
12		the medical oversight of a physician or
13		osteopathic physician licensed in this State; or
14		(B) Any person acting in accordance with
15		section 663-1.5(e); or
16	(7)	Prohibit a radiologist duly licensed to practice
17		medicine and provide radiology services in another
18		state from using telehealth while located in this
19		State to provide radiology services to a patient who
20		is located in the state in which the radiologist is
21		licensed. For the purposes of this paragraph:

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1 "Distant site" means the location of the 2 radiologist delivering services through telehealth at 3 the time the services are provided. 4 "Originating site" means the location where the 5 patient is located, whether accompanied or not by a 6 health care provider, at the time services are 7 provided by a radiologist through telehealth, 8 including but not limited to a radiologist's or health 9 care provider's office, hospital, health care 10 facility, a patient's home, and other non-medical 11 environments such as school-based health centers, 12 university-based health centers, or the work location 13 of a patient. 14 "Radiologist" means a doctor of medicine or a 15 doctor of osteopathy certified in radiology by the 16 American Board of Radiology or the American Board of 17 Osteopathy.

18 "Telehealth" means the use of telecommunications,
19 as that term is defined in section 269-1, to
20 encompass four modalities: store and forward
21 technologies, remote monitoring, live consultation,



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1 and mobile health; and which shall include but not be 2 limited to real-time video conferencing-based 3 communication, secure interactive and non-interactive 4 web-based communication, and secure asynchronous 5 information exchange, to transmit patient medical 6 information, including diagnostic-quality digital 7 images and laboratory results for medical 8 interpretation and diagnosis, for the purpose of 9 delivering enhanced health care services and 10 information while a patient is at an originating site 11 and the radiologist is at a distant site. Standard 12 telephone contacts, facsimile transmissions, or e-mail 13 texts, in combination or by themselves, do not 14 constitute a telehealth service for the purposes of 15 this paragraph." 16 SECTION 5. Section 453-31, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

17 amended to read as follows:

18 "§453-31 Emergency ambulance service personnel. The
19 practice of any emergency medical services by any individual
20 employed by an emergency ambulance service who is not licensed
21 under part I of this chapter or under chapter 457 shall be

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subject to [certification] licensure under this part. In the
 event of any conflict between this part and any rules adopted
 under section 453-2, this part shall control with regard to
 emergency ambulance service personnel.

5 The Hawaii medical board shall define the scope of the 6 practice of emergency medical services, different levels of the 7 practice, and degree of supervision required of a supervising 8 physician or osteopathic physician when a person [certified] 9 licensed under this part provides services within the practice 10 of medicine."

SECTION 6. Section 453-32, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

13 "§453-32 [Certification of emergency ambulance personnel.]
14 License requirements for emergency medical services. (a) The
15 Hawaii medical board shall [certify] issue licenses to
16 individuals [as] qualified in emergency medical services, upon
17 application therefor; provided that the applicant for
18 [certification:] licensure:

19 (1) Holds a <u>current</u> certificate from the National Registry
 20 of Emergency Medical Technicians [, has] for the
 21 requisite level of practice, has satisfactorily passed



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1		a course of training in emergency medical services for
2		emergency ambulance services personnel [which] <u>that</u>
3		shall be based on and may exceed the national
4		curriculum of the United States Department of
5		Transportation and approved by the board[$-$] <u>if</u>
6		required for the applicable level of practice, and
7		meets other standards and qualifications, including
8		passage of an examination, set by the Hawaii medical
9		board pertinent to the practice of emergency medical
10		services in Hawaii;
11	(2)	Meets continuing education requirements [which] that
12		shall be set by the Hawaii medical board; and
13	(3)	Meets other qualifications set by the Hawaii medical
14		board.
15	<u>(b)</u>	The board shall directly review the credentials of
16	applicant	s and administer examinations required.
17	[Certific	ation] Licensure under this section shall be a
18	prerequis	ite to the practice of emergency medical services as an
19	employee	of an emergency ambulance service.
20	(c)	The Hawaii medical board shall provide standard
21	applicati	on forms for the [certification of emergency ambulance

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1 personnel] licensure under this part, and shall provide for the 2 periodic renewal of such [certification.] license. The Hawaii 3 medical board shall assess a fee for such application, 4 [certification,] licensure, and renewal. The Hawaii medical 5 board shall provide for the revocation, suspension, or 6 limitation of [certification] licensure in the event an 7 individual once [certified] licensed under this section fails to 8 maintain or meet requirements for continued [certification,] 9 licensure, or for good cause shown. 10 (d) For purposes of this section, "emergency ambulance 11 personnel" means emergency medical technicians, advanced 12 emergency medical technicians, mobile intensive care 13 technicians, or paramedics." 14 SECTION 7. Section 453-32.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 15 amended to read as follows: 16 "§453-32.1 Renewal of [certification.] licensure. (a) 17 Every person holding a [certificate] license under this part 18 shall renew the [certificate] license with the board no later 19 than January 31 of each even-numbered year, pay a renewal fee, 20 and comply with the continuing education requirements set forth 21 in the board's rules.

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(b) To determine compliance, the board may conduct a
 random audit. A person selected for audit shall be notified by
 the board. Within sixty days of notification, the person shall
 provide to the board documentation to verify compliance with the
 continuing education requirements.

6 (c) Failure to renew, pay the renewal fee, and, in the
7 case of audited persons, provide documentation of compliance
8 shall constitute a forfeiture of the [certificate] license which
9 may only be restored upon the submission of written application,
10 payment to the board of a restoration fee, and in the case of
11 audited persons, documentation of compliance.

12 (d) A [certificate] license that has been forfeited for 13 one renewal term shall be automatically terminated and cannot be 14 restored, and a new application for [certification] licensure 15 shall be required."

16 SECTION 8. Section 453-32.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 17 amended to read as follows:

18 "§453-32.5 [Temporary certification.] Provisional
19 <u>licensure. (a)</u> The board shall approve [temporary
20 certification] provisional licensure of an applicant under
21 section 453-32 if the applicant has graduated from a board

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approved training program within twelve months of the date of
 application and has never taken the written and practical
 examination of the National Registry of Emergency Medical
 Technicians for that level of practice but otherwise meets the
 requirements of section 453-32, has filed a complete application
 with the board, and has paid all required fees.

7 (b) If the applicant fails to apply for, or to take, the 8 next succeeding examination or fails to pass the examination or 9 fails to receive a [certificate,] license, all privileges under 10 this section shall automatically cease upon written notification 11 sent to the applicant by the board. A [temporary certificate] 12 provisional license for each level of practice may be issued 13 only once to each person.

14 (c) Prior to practicing under [temporary certification,]
15 any provisional license, applicants shall notify the board in
16 writing of any and all employers under whom they will be
17 performing services."

18 SECTION 9. Section 453-32.51, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 19 amended to read as follows:

20 "§453-32.51 Limited [temporary certification.] provisional
 21 licensure. (a) The Hawaii medical board shall approve limited

18	(6)	Has paid all the required fees.
19	(b)	Limited [certification] <u>licensure</u> of any applicant
20	shall be	restricted to a maximum of one year.

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(c) All privileges under this section shall automatically
 cease if the applicant receives [certification] <u>licensure</u> under
 section 453-32 or 453-32.1 or is no longer participating in a
 period of peer review."

5 SECTION 10. Section 453-32.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
6 amended to read as follows:


7 "§453-32.6 Delegation to committee of practicing emergency
8 physicians or osteopathic physicians and emergency ambulance
9 personnel. The Hawaii medical board shall establish a committee
10 consisting of practicing emergency physicians or osteopathic
11 physicians and emergency ambulance personnel to assist the board
12 in the performance of duties under this part.

13 The board, by written order, may delegate to the committee 14 any of its powers and duties for administration of this part, 15 except that the board shall not delegate any authority to adopt, 16 amend, or repeal rules, take disciplinary action against a 17 [certificate] license holder, or restore a [certificate] license 18 which has been revoked."

19 SECTION 11. There is appropriated out of the compliance 20 resolution fund the sum of \$31,000 or so much thereof as may be 21 necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 and the same sum or so much



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thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for the
 Hawaii medical board to establish and hire a 0.5 full-time
 equivalent (0.5 FTE) permanent position for the purposes of this
 Act.

5 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 6 of commerce and consumer affairs for the purposes of this Act. 7 SECTION 12. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 8 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 9 SECTION 13. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2021;

provided that section 2 shall be repealed on July 1, 2027.

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Report Title:

Emergency Medical Responders; Emergency Ambulance Service Personnel; Licensure; Hawaii Medical Board; Appropriation; Compliance Resolution Fund

Description:

Authorizes the Hawaii medical board to license emergency ambulance service personnel. Creates an additional licensure category for emergency medical technicians 1 who are certified at a higher practice level than emergency medical technicians but do not provide ambulance services. Appropriates funds from the compliance resolution fund for hiring a 0.5 full-time equivalent (0.5 FTE) permanent position. Effective 7/1/2021. (CD1)

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
