A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. Act 54, Session Laws of Hawaii 2009, enacted
 the complete streets law, codified as section 264-20.5, Hawaii
 Revised Statutes, to require the department of transportation
- 4 and the county transportation departments to adopt a complete
- 5 streets policy that seeks to reasonably accommodate convenient
- 6 access and mobility for all users of the public highways within
- 7 their respective jurisdictions, including pedestrians,
- 8 bicyclists, transit users, motorists, and persons of all ages
- 9 and abilities.

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- The legislature finds that clarification of the complete streets policy is necessary to assure its proper implementation
- 13 The purpose of this Act is to:

and ensure its effectiveness as intended.

14 (1) Require the department of transportation to submit an
15 annual report to the legislature detailing compliance
16 with complete streets policy and principles;

1	(2)	Require the department of transportation to establish
2		and publish performance standards with measurable
3		benchmarks reflecting the capacity for all users to
4		travel safely and conveniently along state roadways;
5	(3)	Require that the complete street policies of the state
6		apply to new construction, reconstruction, repaving,
7		operations, and maintenance activities;
8	(4)	Require the department of transportation to create a
9		complete streets policy checklist for each project and
10		post the checklist on its website; and
11	(5)	Require the counties to consider complete street
12		policies when adopting or amending land use
13		ordinances.
14	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 264, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
15	amended by	y adding a new section to be appropriately designated
16	and to rea	ad as follows:
17	" <u>§</u> 26	4- Ground transportation infrastructure project
18	planning,	design, and implementation. (a) When planning,
19	designing	, and implementing ground transportation
20	infrastru	cture, the department shall consider and pursue goals
21	for each	project that:

1	(1)	Assess and maximize the total throughput of persons
2		using all modes of transportation;
3	(2)	Meet complete streets goals as defined in section
4		264-20.5;
5	(3)	Reduce vehicle miles traveled;
6	(4)	Provide capacity to meet future mode share goals
7		established by the State;
8	(5)	Provide equity for all communities and users;
9	(6)	Consider the zero vision policy goals pursuant to
10		section 286-7.5;
11	(7)	Reduce user cost of transportation and living;
12	(8)	Improve public health;
13	(9)	Reduce carbon emissions and greenhouse gasses to meet
14		state climate and zero emissions clean economy goals
15		as defined in sections 269-92 and 225P-5;
16	(10)	Reduce urban temperatures by incorporating tree canopy
17		and foliage over hardened surfaces; and
18	(11)	Beautify public infrastructure.
19	(b)	On or before December 31, 2021, and on or before
20	December	31 of each year thereafter, the director of
21	transport	ation shall submit to the legislature a report

1	detailing	progress towards compliance with the complete streets
2	policy an	d principles during the preceding fiscal year."
3	SECT	ION 3. Section 264-18, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended b	y amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
5	" (a)	Out of the state highway fund amounts, whether state
6	funds or	federal funds, shall be expended as necessary by the
7	State for	the establishment of bikeways; provided that bikeways
8	shall be	established, whenever practicable, wherever a new or
9	existing	highway, road, or street is being designed, planned,
10	construct	ed, reconstructed, relocated, or rehabilitated. At
11	least [tw	e] eight per cent of eligible federal funds, and in
12	addition,	other state highway fund moneys as available, shall be
13	expended	to:
14	(1)	Establish multi-use paths, bicycle paths, and bicycle
15		lanes; and
16	(2)	Install signage and safety devices along bikeways;
17		provided that the department of transportation shall
18		include the bicycling community in a public
19		involvement process to determine the location of
20		multi-use paths, bicycle paths, bicycle lanes, and

1 installation of signage and safety devices along 2 bikeways. 3 Planning for any mass transit system shall include 4 appropriate accommodation for bicycle lanes, bikeways, and 5 bicycle routes, including bicycle racks on mass transit 6 vehicles, to enable mass transit users to connect conveniently 7 by bicycle to transit stations and bus stops. 8 This subsection shall not be construed as requiring the 9 expenditure of a county surcharge on state tax under section 46-16.8, on bicycle paths if the application of this subsection 10 conflicts with section 46-16.8." 11 12 SECTION 4. Section 264-20.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 13 amended to read as follows: 14 "§264-20.5 Complete streets. (a) The department of 15 transportation and the county transportation departments shall 16 adopt a complete streets policy that seeks to reasonably 17 accommodate convenient access and mobility for all users of the 18 public highways within their respective jurisdictions as 19 described under section 264-1, including pedestrians, 20 bicyclists, transit users, motorists, and persons of all ages 21 and abilities.

1	(b)	This section shall apply to new construction,
2	reconstru	ction, and maintenance of highways, roads, streets,
3	ways, and	lanes located within urban, suburban, and rural areas,
4	if approp	riate for the application of complete streets.
5	(c)	This section shall not apply if:
6	(1)	Use of a particular highway, road, street, way, or
7		lane by bicyclists or pedestrians is prohibited by
8		law, including within interstate highway corridors;
9	(2)	The costs would be excessively disproportionate to the
10		need or probable use of the particular highway, road,
11		street, way, or lane;
12	(3)	There exists a sparseness of population, or there
13		exists other available means, or similar factors
14		indicating an absence of a future need; or
15	(4)	The safety of vehicular, pedestrian, or bicycle
16		traffic may be placed at unacceptable risk.
17	(d)	On or before December 31, 2021, and on or before
18	December :	31 of each year thereafter, the director of
19	transport	ation shall submit to the legislature a report
20	detailing	compliance with the complete streets policy and

1	principle	s during the preceding fiscal year. The report shall
2	include:	
3	(1)	A list of transportation facilities and projects
4		initiated during that fiscal year as well as the
5		complete streets features incorporated therein;
6	(2)	Exceptions made under subsection (c);
7	(3)	Beginning July 1, 2023, measurable performance
8		standards and benchmarks, as established in
9		conjunction with the Moving Ahead for Progress in the
10		21st Century Act process applicable to each project;
11		<u>and</u>
12	(4)	Problems and suggested solutions and recommendations
13		to improve the process.
14	(e)	The department of transportation shall establish and
15	publish p	erformance standards with measurable benchmarks
16	reflectin	g the capacity for all users to travel with appropriate
17	safety an	d convenience along roadways under the jurisdiction of
18	the State	<u>.</u>
19	(f)	The department of transportation shall ensure that:

1	(1)	Complete streets policies of the State apply to new
2		construction, reconstruction, repaving, operations,
3		and maintenance activities;
4	(2)	A complete streets policy checklist of duties of the
5		department of transportation is published in
6		accordance with section 1-28.5. The complete streets
7		checklist shall apply from initial planning through
8		final design, construction and operation for all new
9		construction, reconstruction, and repaving surface
10		transportation initiatives. The complete streets
11		checklist shall be updated from time to time as
12		necessary to facilitate the implementation of the
13		complete streets policy. As used in this paragraph,
14		"complete streets checklist" refers to a tool to
15		collect data and information about the status of the
16		roadway and the surrounding area, as well as the
17		details of the transportation facility or project,
18		with a goal of identifying specific elements that car
19		be incorporated to support and balance the needs of
20		all users; and

1	(3)	The complete streets policy checklist with
2		accompanying documentation shall become a public
3		record and shall be accessible on the department of
4		transportation's website within sixty days of
5		completion of the checklist and accompanying
6		documentation.
7	(g)	In adopting or amending land use ordinances, the
8	counties	shall consider complete street policies to ensure that:
9	(1)	A context-sensitive and multi-modal approach is
10		considered in ordinances;
11	(2)	Consideration is given to allow flexibility in the
12		zoning requirements; and
13	(3)	Other factors peculiar to the community are considered
14		when:
15		(A) The application of this section conflicts with
16		the context of the particular community; or
17		(B) A land use ordinance conflicts with the
18		principles of complete streets."
19	SECT	TON 5. The director of transportation shall provide
20	training	for the department of transportation's design,
21	operation	s, and maintenance staff in complete streets policies,
