A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The complete streets law, codified as section 2 264-20.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, requires the department of 3 transportation and the county transportation departments to 4 adopt a complete streets policy that seeks to reasonably accommodate convenient access and mobility for all users of the 5 public highways within their respective jurisdictions, including 6 pedestrians, bicyclists, transit users, motorists, and persons 7 8 of all ages and abilities.

9 The legislature finds that clarification of the complete 10 streets policy is necessary to assure its proper implementation 11 and ensure its effectiveness as intended.

12 The purpose of this Act is to:

13 (1) Require the department of transportation to submit an
14 annual report to the legislature detailing compliance
15 with complete streets policy and principles;

16 (2) Require the department of transportation to establish17 and publish performance standards with measurable



1		benchmarks reflecting the capacity for all users to
2		travel safely and conveniently along state roadways;
3	(3)	Require that the complete street policies of the state
4		apply to new construction, reconstruction, repaving,
5		operations, and maintenance activities;
6	(4)	Require the department of transportation to create a
7		complete streets policy checklist for each project and
8		post the checklist on its website; and
9	(5)	Require the counties to consider complete street
10		policies when adopting or amending land use
11		ordinances.
12	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 264, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated	
14	and to read as follows:	
15	" <u>§26</u>	4- Ground transportation infrastructure project
16	planning,	design, and implementation. (a) When planning,
17	designing	, and implementing ground transportation
18	infrastru	cture, the department shall consider and pursue goals
19	for each	project that:
20	(1)	Assess and maximize the total throughput of persons
21		using all modes of transportation;



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1	(2)	Meet complete streets goals as defined in section
2		264-20.5;
3	(3)	Reduce vehicle miles traveled;
4	(4)	Provide capacity to meet future mode share goals
5		established by the State;
6	(5)	Provide equity for all communities and users;
7	(6)	Consider the vision zero policy goals pursuant to
8		section 286-7.5;
9	(7)	Reduce user cost of transportation and living;
10	(8)	Improve public health;
11	(9)	Reduce carbon emissions and greenhouse gasses to meet
12		state climate and zero emissions clean economy goals
13		as defined in sections 269-92 and 225P-5;
14	(10)	Reduce urban temperatures by incorporating tree canopy
15		and foliage over hardened surfaces; and
16	(11)	Beautify public infrastructure.
17	(b)	On or before December 31, 2021, and on or before
18	December	31 of each year thereafter, the director of
19	transport	ation shall submit to the legislature a report
20	detailing	progress towards compliance with the complete streets
21	policy an	d principles during the preceding fiscal year."

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1 SECTION 3. Section 264-18, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows: 3 "(a) Out of the state highway fund amounts, whether state 4 funds or federal funds, shall be expended as necessary by the 5 State for the establishment of bikeways; provided that bikeways 6 shall be established, whenever practicable, wherever a new or 7 existing highway, road, or street is being designed, planned, 8 constructed, reconstructed, relocated, or rehabilitated. At 9 least [two] five per cent of eligible federal funds, and in 10 addition, other state highway fund moneys as available, shall be 11 expended to:

12 (1) Establish multi-use paths, bicycle paths, and bicycle13 lanes; and

14 Install signage and safety devices along bikeways; (2)15 provided that the department of transportation shall include the 16 bicycling community in a public involvement process to determine 17 the location of multi-use paths, bicycle paths, bicycle lanes, 18 and installation of signage and safety devices along bikeways. 19 Planning for any mass transit system shall include 20 appropriate accommodation for bicycle lanes, bikeways, and 21 bicycle routes, including bicycle racks on mass transit

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1 vehicles, to enable mass transit users to connect conveniently 2 by bicycle to transit stations and bus stops. 3 This subsection shall not be construed as requiring the 4 expenditure of a county surcharge on state tax under section 5 46-16.8, on bicycle paths if the application of this subsection 6 conflicts with section 46-16.8." 7 SECTION 4. Section 264-20.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 8 amended to read as follows: 9 "§264-20.5 Complete streets. (a) The department of 10 transportation and the county transportation departments shall adopt a complete streets policy that seeks to reasonably 11 accommodate convenient access and mobility for all users of the 12 13 public highways within their respective jurisdictions as described under section 264-1, including pedestrians, 14 15 bicyclists, transit users, motorists, and persons of all ages 16 and abilities. 17 This section shall apply to new construction, (b) 18 reconstruction, and maintenance of highways, roads, streets, 19 ways, and lanes located within urban, suburban, and rural areas, 20 if appropriate for the application of complete streets.

21 (c) This section shall not apply if:



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1	(1)	Use of a particular highway, road, street, way, or
2		lane by bicyclists or pedestrians is prohibited by
3		law, including within interstate highway corridors;
4	(2)	The costs would be excessively disproportionate to the
5		need or probable use of the particular highway, road,
6		street, way, or lane;
7	(3)	There exists a sparseness of population, or there
8		exists other available means, or similar factors
9		indicating an absence of a future need; or
10	(4)	The safety of vehicular, pedestrian, or bicycle
11		traffic may be placed at unacceptable risk.
12	(d)	On or before December 31, 2021, and on or before
13	December	31 of each year thereafter, the director of
14	transport	ation shall submit to the legislature a report
15	detailing	compliance with the complete streets policy and
16	principle	s during the preceding fiscal year. The report shall
17	include:	
18	(1)	A list of transportation facilities and projects
19		initiated during that fiscal year as well as the
20		complete streets features incorporated therein;
21	(2)	Exceptions made under subsection (c);



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1	(3)	Beginning July 1, 2023, measurable performance
2		standards and benchmarks, as established in
3		conjunction with the Moving Ahead for Progress in the
4		21st Century Act process applicable to each project;
5		and
6	(4)	Problems and suggested solutions and recommendations
7		to improve the process.
8	(e)	The department of transportation shall establish and
9	publish p	erformance standards with measurable benchmarks
10	reflectin	g the capacity for all users to travel with appropriate
11	safety an	d convenience along roadways under the jurisdiction of
12	the State	<u>.</u>
13	<u>(f)</u>	The department of transportation shall ensure that:
14	(1)	Complete streets policies of the State apply to new
15		construction, reconstruction, repaving, operations,
16		and maintenance activities;
17	(2)	A complete streets policy checklist of duties of the
18		department of transportation is published in
19		accordance with section 1-28.5. The complete streets
20		checklist shall apply from initial planning through
21		final design, construction and operation for all new



1		construction, reconstruction, and repaving surface
2		transportation initiatives. The complete streets
3		checklist shall be updated from time to time as
4		necessary to facilitate the implementation of the
5		complete streets policy. As used in this paragraph,
6		"complete streets checklist" refers to a tool to
7		collect data and information about the status of the
8		roadway and the surrounding area, as well as the
9		details of the transportation facility or project,
10		with a goal of identifying specific elements that can
11		be incorporated to support and balance the needs of
12		all users; and
13	(3)	The complete streets policy checklist with
14		accompanying documentation shall become a public
15		record and shall be accessible on the department of
16		transportation's website within sixty days of
17		completion of the checklist and accompanying
18		documentation.
19	(g)	In adopting or amending land use ordinances, the
20	counties	shall consider complete street policies to ensure that:

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1	(1) A context-sensitive and multi-modal approach is
2	considered in ordinances;
3	(2) Consideration is given to allow flexibility in the
4	zoning requirements; and
5	(3) Other factors peculiar to the community are considered
6	when:
7	(A) The application of this section conflicts with
8	the context of the particular community; or
9	(B) A land use ordinance conflicts with the
10	principles of complete streets."
11	SECTION 5. The director of transportation shall provide
12	training for the department of transportation's design,
13	operations, and maintenance staff in complete streets policies,
14	principles, and implementation procedures that may be applicable
15	to the performance of their duties.
16	SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
17	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
18	SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
