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# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The complete streets law, codified as section 2 264-20.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, requires the department of 3 transportation and the county transportation departments to 4 adopt a complete streets policy that seeks to reasonably 5 accommodate convenient access and mobility for all users of the 6 public highways within their respective jurisdictions, including 7 pedestrians, bicyclists, transit users, motorists, and persons 8 of all ages and abilities. 9 The legislature finds that clarification of the complete 10 streets policy is necessary to assure its proper implementation 11 and ensure its effectiveness as intended. 12 The purpose of this Act is to: 13 (1)Require the department of transportation to submit an 14 annual report to the legislature detailing compliance 15 with complete streets policy and principles; 16 Require the department of transportation to establish (2)17 and publish performance standards with measurable



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1		benchmarks reflecting the capacity for all users to
2		travel safely and conveniently along state roadways;
3	(3)	Require that the complete street policies of the state
4		apply to new construction, reconstruction, repaving,
5		operations, and maintenance activities;
6	(4)	Require the department of transportation to create a
7		complete streets policy checklist for each project and
8		post the checklist on its website; and
9	(5)	Require the counties to consider complete street
10		policies when adopting or amending land use
11		ordinances.
12	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 264, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	amended by	y adding a new section to be appropriately designated
14	and to rea	ad as follows:
15	" <u>§</u> 26	4- Ground transportation infrastructure project
16	planning,	design, and implementation. (a) When planning,
17	designing	, and implementing ground transportation
18	infrastru	cture, the department shall consider and pursue goals
19	for each project that:	
20	(1)	Assess and maximize the total throughput of persons
21		using all modes of transportation;



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1	(2)	Meet complete streets goals as defined in section
2		264-20.5;
3	(3)	Reduce vehicle miles traveled;
4	(4)	Provide capacity to meet future mode share goals
5		established by the State;
6	(5)	Provide equity for all communities and users of the
7		public highways;
8	(6)	Consider the vision zero policy goals pursuant to
9		section 286-7.5;
10	(7)	Reduce user cost of transportation and living;
11	(8)	Improve public health;
12	(9)	Reduce carbon emissions and greenhouse gasses to meet
13		state climate and zero emissions clean economy goals
14		as defined in sections 269-92 and 225P-5;
15	(10)	Reduce urban temperatures by incorporating tree canopy
16		and foliage over hardened surfaces; and
17	(11)	Beautify public infrastructure.
18	(b)	On or before December 31, 2021, and on or before
19	December	31 of each year thereafter, the director of
20	transport	ation shall submit to the legislature a report

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1 detailing progress towards compliance with the complete streets 2 policy and principles during the preceding fiscal year." 3 SECTION 3. Section 264-18, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows: 5 "(a) Out of the state highway fund amounts, whether state 6 funds or federal funds, shall be expended as necessary by the 7 State for the establishment of bikeways; provided that bikeways 8 shall be established, whenever practicable, wherever a new or 9 existing highway, road, or street is being designed, planned, 10 constructed, reconstructed, relocated, or rehabilitated. At 11 least [two] five per cent of eligible federal funds, and in 12 addition, other state highway fund moneys as available, shall be 13 expended to: 14 (1)Establish multi-use paths, bicycle paths, and bicycle 15 lanes; and 16 Install signage and safety devices along bikeways; (2) 17 provided that the department of transportation shall include the 18 bicycling community in a public involvement process to determine 19 the location of multi-use paths, bicycle paths, bicycle lanes, 20 and installation of signage and safety devices along bikeways.

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1 Planning for any mass transit system shall include 2 appropriate accommodation for bicycle lanes, bikeways, and 3 bicycle routes, including bicycle racks on mass transit 4 vehicles, to enable mass transit users to connect conveniently 5 by bicycle to transit stations and bus stops. 6 This subsection shall not be construed as requiring the 7 expenditure of a county surcharge on state tax under section 8 46-16.8, on bicycle paths if the application of this subsection 9 conflicts with section 46-16.8." 10 SECTION 4. Section 264-20.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 11 amended to read as follows: 12 "[+] §264-20.5[+] Complete streets. (a) The department of 13 transportation and the county transportation departments shall 14 adopt a complete streets policy that seeks to reasonably

15 accommodate convenient access and mobility for all users of the

16 public highways within their respective jurisdictions as

17 described under section 264-1, including pedestrians,

18 bicyclists, transit users, motorists, and persons of all ages 19 and abilities.

20 (b) This section shall apply to new construction,
21 reconstruction, and maintenance of highways, roads, streets,

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1	ways, and	lanes located within urban, suburban, and rural areas,
2	if approp	riate for the application of complete streets.
3	(c)	This section shall not apply if:
4	(1)	Use of a particular highway, road, street, way, or
5		lane by bicyclists or pedestrians is prohibited by
6		law, including within interstate highway corridors;
7	(2)	The costs would be excessively disproportionate to the
8		need or probable use of the particular highway, road,
9		street, way, or lane;
10	(3)	There exists a sparseness of population, or there
11		exists other available means, or similar factors
12		indicating an absence of a future need; or
13	(4)	The safety of vehicular, pedestrian, or bicycle
14		traffic may be placed at unacceptable risk.
15	(d)	On or before December 31, 2021, and on or before
16	December 3	31 of each year thereafter, the director of
17	transporta	ation shall submit to the legislature a report
18	detailing	compliance with the complete streets policy and
19	principles	s during the preceding fiscal year. The report shall
20	include:	

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1	(1)	A list of transportation facilities and projects
2		initiated during that fiscal year as well as the
3		complete streets features incorporated therein;
4	(2)	Exceptions made under subsection (c);
5	(3)	Beginning July 1, 2023, measurable performance
6		standards and benchmarks, as established in
7		conjunction with the Moving Ahead for Progress in the
8		21st Century Act process applicable to each project;
9		and
10	(4)	Problems and suggested solutions and recommendations
11		to improve the process.
12	<u>(e)</u>	The department of transportation shall establish and
13	publish p	erformance standards with measurable benchmarks
14	reflecting	g the capacity for all users of the public highways to
15	travel wi	th appropriate safety and convenience along roadways
16	under the	jurisdiction of the State.
17	<u>(f)</u>	The department of transportation shall ensure that:
18	(1)	Complete streets policies of the State apply to new
19		construction, reconstruction, repaving, operations,
20		and maintenance activities: and

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1	(2)	A complete streets policy checklist of duties of the
2		department of transportation is published in
3		accordance with section 1-28.5. The complete streets
4		checklist shall apply from initial planning through
5		final design, construction and operation for all new
6		construction, reconstruction, and repaving surface
7		transportation initiatives. The complete streets
8		checklist shall be updated from time to time as
9		necessary to facilitate the implementation of the
10		complete streets policy. The complete streets policy
11		checklist with accompanying documentation shall become
12		a public record and shall be accessible on the
13		department of transportation's website within sixty
14		days of completion of the checklist and accompanying
15		documentation. As used in this paragraph, "complete
16		streets checklist" refers to a tool to collect data
17		and information about the status of the roadway and
18		the surrounding area, as well as the details of the
19		transportation facility or project, with a goal of
20		identifying specific elements that can be incorporated
21		to support and balance the needs of all users.



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1	(g) In adopting or amending land use ordinances, the
2	counties shall consider complete street policies to ensure that:
3	(1) A context-sensitive and multi-modal approach is
4	considered in ordinances;
5	(2) Consideration is given to allow flexibility in the
6	zoning requirements; and
7	(3) Other factors peculiar to the community are considered
8	when:
9	(A) The application of this section conflicts with
10	the context of the particular community; or
11	(B) A land use ordinance conflicts with the
12	principles of complete streets."
13	SECTION 5. The director of transportation shall provide
14	training for the department of transportation's maintenance
15	staff in complete streets policies, principles, and
16	implementation procedures that may be applicable to the
17	performance of their duties.
18	SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
19	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
20	SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on May 6, 2137.
