A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that article X, section 2 4, of the Hawaii State Constitution provides that "[t]he State 3 shall promote the study of Hawaiian culture, history and 4 language." The legislature further finds that article XV, 5 section 4, of the Hawaii State Constitution establishes Hawaiian 6 as one of two official languages of the State. In recognition 7 of these distinctions, the legislature finds that the Hawaiian 8 language should be featured prominently in communications of 9 specified state officials.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to require that the official stationery and website of designated state officials include the Hawaiian translation of the office's or department's name.

14 SECTION 2. Section 1-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 15 amended to read as follows:

16 "\$1-13 Official languages. English and Hawaiian are the
17 official languages of Hawaii. Whenever there is found to exist

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1	any radical and irreconcilable difference between the English
2	and Hawaiian version of any of the laws of the State, the
3	English version shall be held binding. Hawaiian shall not be
4	required for public acts and transactions[+]; provided that if
5	Hawaiian words or names are included in such documents, then
6	section 1-13.5 shall apply."
7	SECTION 3 Section 1-13.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
8	amended to read as follows:
9	"[{]§1-13.5[]] Hawaiian language; spelling. [Macrons and
10	glottal stops may be used in the spelling of words or terms in
11	the Hawaiian language in] (a) Effective January 1, 2022, all
12	documents and letterheads prepared by or for state or county
13	agencies or officials[+], to the extent that the documents and
14	letterheads contain Hawaiian language words or names, shall
15	include accurate, appropriate, and authentic Hawaiian names and
16	words, including proper Hawaiian spelling and punctuation,
17	including but not limited to macrons and glottal stops that
18	punctuate the English word to which they relate; provided that
19	any revision to conform any document or letterhead existing on
20	or before January 1, 2022, to the requirements of this section,
21	may be implemented when the document or letterhead requires

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1	replaceme	nt or reprinting, or otherwise requires revision. Any
2	rule, ord	er, policy, or other act, official or otherwise, that
3	prohibits	or discourages the use of [these symbols] <u>accurate,</u>
4	appropria	te, and authentic Hawaiian names and words, as required
5	by this s	ection, shall be void.
6	(b)	Hawaiian names and words shall be deemed accurate,
7	appropria	te, and authentic when printed in conformance with:

14	(3)	"Place Names of Hawaii", by Mary Kawena Pukui,
15		Samuel H. Elbert, and Esther T. Mookini, University of
16		Hawaiʻi Press, copyright 1974.
17	(c)	Any Hawaiian names and words that are misspelled or
18	incorrect	ly punctuated within a document or letterhead subject
19	to this s	section shall not be deemed to invalidate the document
20	or render	t it unenforceable. No cause of action shall arise
21	<u>against t</u>	the State, any county, or any state or county agency,

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1	official, or employee for any Hawaiian names and words that are
2	misspelled or incorrectly punctuated."
3	SECTION 4. Section 5-6.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended to read as follows:
5	"[[]§5-6.5[]] State language. (a) The Hawaiian language
6	is the native language of Hawaii and [may], effective January 1,
7	2022, shall be used on all emblems and symbols representative of
8	the State, its departments, agencies, and political
9	subdivisions [-]; provided that for emblems and symbols existing
10	prior to January 1, 2022, conformance with this section may be
11	delayed until a replacement for the emblem or symbol otherwise
12	is required.
13	(b) The governor, lieutenant governor, state legislators,
14	and heads of the principal departments shall prominently display
15	a Hawaiian translation of the name of their office or department
16	at least once on the main page of their official website and in
17	the letterhead of their stationery. The University of Hawaii Ka
18	Haka 'Ula o Ke'elikōlani or Kawaihuelani Center for Hawaiian
19	Language may consult with each office or department prior to
20	implementing the translation on the appropriate use of the
21	Hawaiian language and its spelling. The University of Hawaii

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1	shall consult with native speakers to determine the appropriate
2	use of the Hawaiian language and its spelling in translations.
3	(c) The Hawaiian language as used on all emblems and
4	symbols shall conform to the requirements of section 1-13.5(b).
5	(d) This section shall not be construed to require that
6	the full text of legislative bills and other official documents
7	to be written in Hawaiian."
8	(e) For the purpose of this section, "native speaker" are
9	speakers of Hawaiian language who come from an unbroken lineage
10	of primary speakers of Hawaiian language."
11	SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
12	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
13	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
14	provided that any revision to conform letterhead that was
15	printed prior to the effective date of this Act need not be
16	implemented until the letterhead requires replacement or
17	reprinting.



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Report Title: Hawaiian Language; Official Websites and Letterhead of State Officials; Translation

Description:

Requires the governor, lieutenant governor, state legislators, and heads of principal departments to prominently display a Hawaiian language translation of the name of their office or department at least once on the main page of their official website and in the letterhead of their stationery. Requires all letterheads, documents, symbols, and emblems of the State and other political subdivisions that include Hawaiian words or names to include accurate and appropriate Hawaiian names, spelling, and punctuation. Establishes references for accurate, appropriate, and authentic Hawaiian names and words, including proper Hawaiian spelling and punctuation. Clarifies that the full text of bills and other official documents are not required to be written in Hawaiian and that misspelled or incorrectly punctuated Hawaiian words and names shall not invalidate the documents or render them unenforceable and no cause of action shall arise accordingly.
