A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO DUAL USE TECHNOLOGY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that dual use technology
- 2 companies in Hawaii are vital to economic growth and a
- 3 diversified economy. Dual use refers to technologies that can
- 4 be used for both peaceful and military aims. The legislature
- 5 further finds that Hawaii businesses are in an exceptional
- 6 position to take advantage of the strong presence of the
- 7 military in the State and the research conducted on its behalf.
- 8 However, the legislature additionally finds that the state's
- 9 focus on tourism has taken away from potentially innovative
- 10 concepts, new approaches to technology, and the leveraging of
- 11 existing facilities and military funding. Technologies
- 12 developed for military use have been appropriated by businesses
- 13 in the past with extraordinary success and such technologies
- 14 have the potential to significantly contribute to Hawaii's
- 15 economic recovery and subsequently decrease its reliance on
- 16 tourism.

1	Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to establish a task		
2	force to	explore how dual use technology can be used to promote	
3	the State's economic recovery and diversify its economy.		
4	SECTION 2. (a) The dual use technology task force is		
5	established within the department of business, economic		
6	developme	nt, and tourism. The dual use technology task force	
7	shall have the following objectives:		
8	(1)	Explore potential dual use technology research and	
9		development projects for technology companies;	
10	(2)	Establish high-growth new venture company	
11		infrastructure development for dual use technology	
12		companies; and	
13	(3)	Create ideas for high-income job opportunities for	
14		Hawaii's residents and graduates of Hawaii's	
15		educational institutions.	
16	(b)	The dual use technology task force shall consist of	
17	the following:		
18	(1)	One representative from the department of business,	
19		economic development, and tourism designated by the	
20		department's director;	

(2) One representative from the University of Hawaii;

1	(3)	One representative from the Economic Development
2		Alliance of Hawaii, Inc.;
3	(4)	One representative from the Hawaii technology
4		development corporation;
5	(5)	One representative from the department of labor's
6		workforce development task force; and
7	(6)	One representative from Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii.
8	Task	force members may recommend additional members with
9	appropria	te specialized expertise to the dual use technology
10	task force	e.
11	(c)	Members of the dual use technology task force shall be
12	exempt from	om section 26-34, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and shall
13	serve with	hout compensation but shall be reimbursed for
14	reasonable	e expenses necessary for the performance of their
15	duties, in	ncluding travel expenses.
16	(d)	The dual use technology task force shall:
17	(1)	Submit a preliminary report of its findings and
18		recommendations, including any proposed legislation,
19		to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to
20		the convening of the regular session of 2023; provided

1		that the preliminary report shall discuss the
2		objectives and issues listed in subsection (a); and
3	(2)	Submit a final report of its findings and
4		recommendations, including any proposed legislation,
5		to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to
6		the convening of the regular session of 2025.
7	(e)	The department of business, economic development, and
8	tourism s	hall provide administrative and clerical support
9	required	by the dual use technology task force.
10	(f)	For the purposes of this section, "dual use
11	technolog	y" means technology that has military and civilian
12	applicati	ons; provided that this definition may be amended and
13	refined b	y the task force over time as part of its findings and
14	recommend	ations.
15	SECT	ION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2021.

Report Title:

Dual Use Technology; Economic Recovery; Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism; University of Hawaii; Task Force

Description:

Creates a task force within the department of business, economic development, and tourism consisting of representatives from the University of Hawaii, Hawaii Technology Development Corporation, and the State's technological and business community that explores how dual use technology can be used to promote economic recovery and diversify the State's economy. Requires the task force to submit reports to the legislature in 2023 and 2025. (SD1)
