## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PROTECTIVE ORDERS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that promoting the safety 2 of persons granted long-term protective orders is inherent in 3 the objective of the orders. The legislature further finds that 4 the current method by which protected individuals can prove the existence of an order is cumbersome. Protected individuals, 5 including minors, are required to carry the nine-page document 6 7 on their person at all times. Doing so is not only inconvenient 8 but may quickly render the order illegible due to wear and tear. 9 The legislature believes that a better alternative has been 10 implemented in other states: the option to carry an 11 identification card the size of a driver's license that provides 12 all the information needed for law enforcement agencies to 13 verify a long-term protective order's existence. The 14 legislature finds that these types of cards, known as "hope 15 cards", are durable, waterproof, and easily portable. The cards' functionality serves to increase the safety of the 16

persons protected by these orders by making it easy to carry
 proof of protection.

3 The Hawaii hope card program would be responsible for issuing hope cards to grantees of a long-term protective order, 4 5 at a grantee's request, for the purpose of allowing law 6 enforcement agencies to quickly verify the existence of, and 7 more easily obtain information on, the long-term protective 8 order. It is the legislature's intent that hope cards provide a 9 more convenient method by which protected individuals can prove 10 that a protective order is in place. The legislature does not 11 intend that the cards replace the original protective orders 12 granted by the court.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to establish a Hawaii hope card program within the department of the attorney general.

16 SECTION 2. Chapter 28, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended 17 by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and to read 18 as follows:

(d) Hope cards and duplicates shall be issued at no charge
 to applicants.

3 (e) For the purposes of this part, "long-term protective
4 order" means a protective order that is to remain in effect for
5 a period of more than ninety days under section 604-10.5, or for
6 a period of more than one hundred eighty days under chapter 586.

7 §28- Access to Hawaii hope card program information;
8 verification. (a) The Hawaii hope card program shall notify
9 the Hawaii criminal justice data center when a hope card has
10 been issued regarding a protective order. This information
11 shall be made available to law enforcement personnel seeking to
12 verify the validity of the hope card or its underlying
13 protective order.

14 (b) Access authorized by this section may be provided in
15 coordination with the Hawaii criminal justice data center
16 established under chapter 846.

17 §28- Prohibitions; penalty. (a) No hope card
18 applicant or program participant shall knowingly provide false
19 information on an application.

20 (b) An applicant or program participant who violates this21 section shall be fined not more than \$500.

§28- Rulemaking authority. The attorney general shall
 adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 as necessary to carry out the
 purposes of this part."

SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 and
the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
year 2022-2023 for the department of the attorney general to
administer the Hawaii hope card program.

10 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department11 of the attorney general for the purposes of this Act.

SECTION 4. No later than January 1, 2022, the department of the attorney general shall develop and implement the Hawaii hope card program established by section 2 of this Act.

15 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on May 1, 2029.
