A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the agribusiness
 development corporation was established in 1994, to address the
 issues of large tracts of land becoming available due to the
 downsizing of the sugar and pineapple industries.

5 The legislature further finds that Hawaii now faces 6 different issues in agriculture, mainly sustainable agriculture 7 and local food production. According to the agribusiness 8 development corporation's 2019 report to the legislature, the 9 corporation manages over 22,000 acres of public agricultural 10 lands with significant potential to shape the State's 11 agricultural public policy toward the goal of food self-12 sufficiency. The lack of affordable agricultural land with 13 long-term leases is cited as a key inhibitor of the growth and 14 expansion of local agriculture.

15 The purpose of this Act is to:

16 (1) Ensure that the agribusiness development corporation
17 prioritizes food production for local consumption; and



(2) Ensure transparency and accountability by requiring
 the department of agriculture and agribusiness
 development corporation to submit reports to the
 legislature on the department's and corporation's
 leasing activities.

6 SECTION 2. Section 163D-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7 amended to read as follows:

8 "[+] §163D-1[+] Findings and purpose. The legislature 9 finds that the downsizing of the sugar and pineapple industries 10 is presenting an unprecedented opportunity for the conversion of agriculture into a dynamic growth industry [-], including local 11 12 food production. Within the next decade, seventy-five thousand 13 acres of agricultural lands and fifty million gallons per day of 14 irrigation water are expected to be released by plantations. 15 The downsizing of the sugar and pineapple industries will idle a 16 valuable inventory of supporting infrastructure including 17 irrigation systems, roads, drainage systems, processing facilities, workshops, and warehouses. The challenge to 18 19 government and business is to conserve and convert the arable 20 lands and their associated production infrastructure in a timely 21 manner into new productive uses, including local food

1 production, that are based upon strategies developed from 2 detailed marketing analysis and monitoring of local, national, and international opportunities. Constantly evolving economies 3 4 require an aggressive and dynamic leadership for the promotion 5 and development of agricultural enterprises, and centralized 6 leadership to coordinate industry development, provide industry-7 wide services, provide marketing assistance, and facilitate 8 investments and coventures in viable enterprises.

9 The purpose of this chapter is to create a vehicle and 10 process to make optimal use of agricultural assets for the 11 economic, environmental, and social benefit of the people of 12 Hawaii. This chapter establishes a public corporation to 13 administer an aggressive and dynamic agribusiness development 14 program. The corporation shall coordinate and administer 15 programs to assist agricultural enterprises to facilitate the 16 transition of agricultural infrastructure from plantation 17 operations into other agricultural enterprises, including those 18 promoting local food production, to carry on the marketing 19 analysis to direct agricultural industry evolution, and to 20 provide the leadership for the development, financing,

1 improvement, or enhancement of agricultural enterprises [-] and 2 local food production." SECTION 3. Section 163D-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 3 4 amended by adding two new definitions to be appropriately 5 inserted and to read as follows: 6 ""Local food production" means crops, livestock, poultry, 7 and other foods that are grown and raised in Hawaii, at least in 8 part, for direct consumption by Hawaii residents and visitors. 9 "Primary business" as used in this subchapter means at 10 least fifty percent of the entity's production or harvest shall 11 be distributed for local consumption in Hawaii." SECTION 4. Section 163D-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 12 13 amended to read as follows: 14 "§163D-3 Agribusiness development corporation; board of There is established the 15 directors; established. (a) agribusiness development corporation, which shall be a public 16 body corporate and politic and an instrumentality and agency of 17 18 The corporation shall be headed by a board of the State. 19 The corporation shall be placed within the directors. 20 department of agriculture for administrative purposes, but the 21 corporation may later incorporate as a nonprofit corporation if

this proves desirable to further its objectives; provided that
 such reorganization as a nonprofit corporation shall not
 adversely affect the federal tax status of the interest on any
 bonds issued to finance any project or project facility.

(b) The board of directors of the corporation shall
consist of eleven voting members, of whom eight shall be
appointed by the governor. The terms of these eight members
shall be four years; provided that, commencing on July 1, 2005,
the governor shall reduce the terms of those initially appointed
so as to provide, as nearly as can be, for the expiration of an
equal number of terms at intervals of one year.

12 The eight members shall be selected on the basis of their 13 knowledge, experience, and proven expertise in small and large 14 businesses within the agricultural industry, agricultural 15 economics, banking, real estate, finance, promotion, marketing, 16 and management.

17 Of these eight members:

18 (1) [one] One shall be from the city and county of 19 Honolulu $[\tau]$;

20 (2) [one] One shall be from the county of Hawaii $[\tau]$; 21 (3) [one] One shall be from the county of Maui $[\tau]$;

1	(4)	$[one]$ One shall be from the county of Kauai $[\tau]$;	
2	(5)	Two shall be representatives of local farmers' or

6	(6)	[four] <u>Two</u> shall be appointed at-large.	
7	The director of business, economic development, and tourism; the		
8	chairperson of the board of agriculture; and the chairperson of		
9	the board of land and natural resources, or their designated		
10	representatives, shall be ex-officio, voting members of the		
11	board. A	ll members shall continue in office until their	
12	respective successors have been appointed and qualified. The		
13	board shall annually elect its chairperson from among its		
14	members; provided that the chairperson shall not be an ex-

16	(c)	The members of the board shall serve without	
17	compensat	ion, but shall be reimbursed for actual expenses	
18	incurred	in the performance of their duties.	
19	(d)	The board shall appoint an executive director, who

from chapter 76. The salary of the executive director shall be
 set by the board.

3 (e) The board, through its executive director, may appoint
4 officers, agents, and employees; prescribe their duties and
5 qualifications; and fix their salaries, without regard to
6 chapter 76.

7 (f) Meetings of the board shall be subject to the
8 requirements set forth in part I of chapter 92."

9 SECTION 5. Section 163D-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

"(a) The corporation shall prepare the Hawaii agribusiness
plan which shall define and establish goals, objectives,
policies, and priority guidelines for its agribusiness
development strategy. The plan shall include but not be limited
to:

16 (1) An inventory of agricultural lands with suitable
17 adequate water resources that are or will become
18 available due to the downsizing of the sugar and
19 pineapple industries that can be used to meet present
20 and future agricultural production needs;

1 meeting local, national, and international market 2 needs; 3 (8) Proposals to improve the gathering of data and the 4 timely presentation of information on market demands 5 and trends that can be used to plan future harvests 6 and production; and 7 Strategies for federal and state legislative actions (9) 8 that will promote the development and enhancement of 9 Hawaii's agricultural industries [-], and in particular 10 local food production." 11 SECTION 6. Section 163D-15.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 12 amended to read as follows: 13 "§163D-15.6 Commitment and preservation of agricultural 14 **leases.** (a) The [agribusiness development] corporation shall 15 work toward obtaining commitments from landowners in the leeward 16 and central districts of Oahu that their agricultural leases 17 shall be for a duration of twenty or more years and shall not be 18 amended or revoked to allow for a nonagricultural use of the 19 land; provided that for lands in central Oahu acquired under Act 20 234, Session Laws of Hawaii 2008, the agricultural leases shall 21 be for no more than fifty-five years.

1 To further ensure the preservation of agriculture in (b) the leeward and central districts of Oahu, the [agribusiness 2 3 development] corporation shall monitor the agricultural leases 4 of lands using the water from the Waiahole water system. In the 5 event of any proposed amendment or revocation of any lease, the 6 corporation shall do all things within its powers under this 7 chapter to protect and defend the interests of the agricultural 8 leaseholders to ensure the continuation of agricultural use for 9 those lands. 10 (c) Beginning January 1, 2022, the department of 11 agriculture and corporation shall annually lease or license at least fifty per cent of land eligible for lease or license or 12 13 lease or license renewal, to agricultural operations whose 14 primary business is food or crop production for local 15 consumption, or for purposes that support food or crop 16 production for local consumption." 17 SECTION 7. Chapter 141, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 18 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 19 and to read as follows:

20 "141- <u>Reporting requirements; leased lands.</u> (a) The
21 department of agriculture shall submit an annual report to the

4	SECTION 8	. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
5	and stricken.	New statutory material is underscored.
6	SECTION 9	. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Requires the department of agriculture and agribusiness development corporation to annually lease at least fifty per cent of land leased or up for lease renewal to operations whose primary business is, or supports, local food production beginning 1/1/2022. Requires the department of agriculture and agribusiness development corporation to submit reports to the legislature on leasing activities. (SD1)
