A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LAW ENFORCEMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

2	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that public trust in law					
3	enforcement	is critical to ensuring justice for all under the				
4	law. The lea	gislature further finds that the difficult and often				
5	dangerous job	o of law enforcement is safer, easier, and more				
6	effectively executed when citizens trust those empowered to					
7	serve and pro	otect them.				
8	The purp	pose of this Act is to enhance the public's trust in				
9	law enforceme	ent and standardize best practices between the				
10	counties by:					
11	(1) Amending the law enforcement officer independent					
12	re	view board to:				
13	(A)	Require review of any specific incident of				
14		alleged misconduct recommended by certain				
15		officials;				
16	(B)) Require members to serve four-year terms; and				
17	(C)) Make it a permanent board; and				



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1	(2) Amending the membership of the law enforcement				
2	standards board and extending member's terms to four				
3	years.

5	SECTION 2. Section 28-152, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is				
6	amended as follows:

8	"(a) There is established a law enforcement officer				
9	independent review board that is placed within the department of				
10	the attorney general for administrative purposes only. The				
11	board shall be responsible for reviewing [criminal]:				
12	(1) Criminal investigations of incidents of officer-				
13	involved death conducted by law enforcement agencies				
14	and issuing recommendations to the prosecuting				
15	attorney of the county in which the incident				
16	occurred[+]; and				
17	(2) Any specific incident of alleged misconduct				
18	recommended by one or more of the following officials				
19	as deserving of review:				
20	(A) The attorney general;				
21	(B) The director of public safety;

8	SECTION 5. Section 139-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is				
9	amended t	o read as follows:			
10	"§13	9-3 Powers and duties of the board. The board shall:			
11	(1)	Adopt rules in accordance with chapter 91 to implement			
12		this chapter;			
13	(2)	Establish minimum standards for employment as a law			
14		enforcement officer and to certify persons to be			
15		qualified as law enforcement officers;			
16	(3)	Establish criteria and standards in which a person who			
17		has been denied certification, whose certification has			
18		been revoked by the board, or whose certification has			
19		lapsed may reapply for certification;			
20	(4)	Establish minimum criminal justice curriculum			
21		requirements for basic, specialized, and in-service			




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1		courses and programs for schools operated by or for	
2		the State or a county for the specific purpose of	
3		training law enforcement officers;	
4	(5)	Consult and cooperate with the counties, agencies of	
5		the State, other governmental agencies, universities,

8		schools and programs of criminal justice instruction;	
9	(6)	Employ, subject to chapter 76, an administrator and	
10		other persons necessary to carry out its duties under	
11		this chapter;	
12	(7)	Investigate when there is reason to believe that a law	
13		enforcement officer does not meet the minimum	
14		standards for employment, and in so doing, may:	
15		(A) Subpoena persons, books, records, or documents;	
16		(B) Require answers in writing under oath to	
17		questions asked by the board; and	
18		(C) Take or cause to be taken depositions as needed	
19		in investigations, hearings, and other	
20		proceedings,	
21		related to the investigation;	



1	(8)	Establish and require participation in continuing
2		education programs for law enforcement officers;
3	(9)	Have the authority to charge and collect fees for
4		applications for certification as a law enforcement
5		officer;
6	(10)	Establish procedures and criteria for the revocation
7		of certification issued by the board;
8	(11)	Have the authority to revoke certifications; [and]
9	(12)	Review and recommend statewide policies and procedures
10		relating to law enforcement, including the use of
11		force[-] <u>;</u>
12	(13)	Consider studies relevant to the board's objectives,
13		including but not limited to the study that examines
14		consolidating the law enforcement activities and
15		responsibilities of various state divisions and
16		agencies under a single, centralized state enforcement
17	×	division or agency, conducted pursuant to Act 124,
18		Session Laws of Hawaii 2018; and
19	(14)	Conduct its own study to evaluate how to efficiently
20		and effectively satisfy its duties in accordance with
21		the law."
