A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HOSPITAL SUSTAINABILITY PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the hospital
- 2 sustainability program, established by Act 217, Session Laws of
- 3 Hawaii 2012, has served a critical role in strengthening the
- 4 health care system in Hawaii. In the nine years since its
- 5 inception, the hospital sustainability program has helped acute
- 6 care facilities treat the most vulnerable patients in the State,
- 7 especially low-income individuals who require hospital services.
- 8 The program has been carried out in a public-private partnership
- 9 to ensure that patients in Hawaii can access quality, affordable
- 10 care.
- 11 The legislature further finds that, even with this program,
- 12 hospitals in the State face major financial challenges. These
- 13 challenges are due in part to the health and financial pressures
- 14 related to the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic.
- 15 Medicaid is jointly financed by the federal and state
- 16 governments by statutory formula. The federal government pays
- 17 between fifty per cent and seventy-four per cent, with



- 1 assistance levels determined by each state's per capita income.
- 2 States with the lowest per capita income receive higher federal
- 3 matching rates. Under federal rules, the state share must be
- 4 paid from public funds that are not federal funds. The
- 5 legislature finds that provider fees may be established to
- 6 provide public funding to help financially sustain Hawaii's
- 7 hospitals.
- 8 The legislature further finds that provider fees are used
- 9 in forty-nine states and the District of Columbia to draw down
- 10 federal funds to sustain medicaid programs. The fees have been
- 11 employed due to rising state budget deficits, increasing health
- 12 care costs, and expanding medicaid enrollment. Provider fees,
- 13 which are collected from specific categories of health care
- 14 providers that agree to the fee, may be imposed on nineteen
- 15 different classes of health care services, including inpatient
- 16 and outpatient hospital and nursing facility services.
- 17 The legislature therefore finds that, in Hawaii, a hospital
- 18 provider fee can result in substantial increases in medicaid
- 19 payments without putting additional constraints on the State's
- 20 budget. The additional federal funds obtained via the fee
- 21 program authorized by the hospital sustainability program can

- 1 maintain access to care for medicaid recipients. This will
- 2 allow hospitals in the State to continue to serve uninsured or
- 3 underinsured patients in a timely, effective manner. This helps
- 4 to ensure the overall sustainability of the health care system
- 5 in Hawaii during the challenging time of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- 6 The purpose of this Act is to preserve access to health
- 7 care for medicaid recipients by extending the hospital
- 8 sustainability program.
- 9 SECTION 2. Section 346G-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 10 amended by adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted
- 11 and to read as follows:
- ""Net benefit" means total payments using prevailing
- 13 federal medical assistance percentage rates made to private
- 14 hospitals, less the taxes paid under the hospital sustainability
- 15 program."
- 16 SECTION 3. Section 346G-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 17 amended to read as follows:
- 18 "[f]\$346G-4[f] Hospital sustainability program special
- 19 fund. (a) There is created in the state treasury the hospital
- 20 sustainability program special fund to be administered by the

3	(b)	Moneys in the hospital sustainability program special

5	(1)	All revenue received by the department from the
6		hospital sustainability fee;

12	(4)	Any designated appropriations, federal funds,

15	fund shal	l be used exclusively as follows:
16	(1)	No less than [eighty-eight] ninety per cent of the
17		revenue from the hospital sustainability fee shall be
18		used for one or more of the following[+] purposes:
19		(A) [Match] To match federal medicaid funds, with the
20		combined total to be used to enhance capitated
21		rates to medicald managed care health plans for

1		the sole purpose of increasing medicaid payments
2		to private hospitals;
3	(B)	[Match] To match federal medicaid funds for
4		Hawaii's medicaid disproportionate share hospital
5		allotment, as authorized by current federal law
6		for private hospitals;
7	(C)	[Match] To match federal medicaid funds for a
8		private hospital upper payment limit pool; [or]
9	(D)	[Match] To match federal medicaid funds with the
10		combined total to be used to enhance capitated
11		rates to medicaid managed care health plans for
12		the purpose of increasing medicaid payments to
13		private hospitals through $[a]$ quality or access
14		incentive [pool; programs; or
15	(E)	To match federal medicaid funds with the combined
16		total to fund medicaid services, including
17		supportive housing, behavioral health,
18		vaccinations, preventive health, primary care,
19		and home and community-based services;

1	(2)	[Twelve] Ten per cent of the moneys in the hospital
2		sustainability program special fund may be used by the
3		department for other departmental purposes; and
4	(3)	Any money remaining in the hospital sustainability
5		program special fund six months after the repeal of
6		this chapter, shall be distributed to hospitals within
7		thirty days in the same proportions as received from
8		the hospitals.
9	(d)	The department shall [utilize] use federal funds
10	derived f	rom state hospital certified expenditures to make
11	supplemen	tal payments to state hospitals and [is authorized to]
12	may recei	ve intergovernmental transfers from the state hospitals
13	to suppor	t direct supplemental payments and increased capitation
14	rates to	health plans for the benefit of the state hospitals.
15	During an	y period in which the hospital sustainability fee is in
16	effect, c	ertified expenditures of state hospitals shall not be
17	used to m	ake or support direct payments to private hospitals.
18	<u>(e)</u>	The aggregate net benefit for private hospitals shall
19	not be le	ss than the aggregate net benefit provided by the
20	hospital	sustainability program for fiscal year 2021. If
21	factors a	ffecting the calculation of the aggregate net benefit,

- 1 including medicaid membership, differ materially from the
- 2 assumptions used to determine aggregate net benefit in a given
- 3 fiscal year, the department shall consult with the hospital
- 4 trade association on potential changes to the aggregate net
- 5 benefit and changes shall be made if agreed to in writing by
- 6 both parties."
- 7 SECTION 4. Section 346G-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 8 amended by amending subsections (c) and (d) to read as follows:
- 9 "(c) The hospital sustainability fee for inpatient care
- 10 services may differ from the fee for outpatient care services
- 11 but the fees charged to the hospital shall not in the aggregate
- 12 exceed [four] five and one-half per cent of the hospital's net
- 13 patient service revenue. The inpatient hospital sustainability
- 14 fee shall not exceed [four] five and one-half per cent of net
- 15 inpatient hospital service revenue. The outpatient hospital
- 16 sustainability fee shall not exceed [four] five and one-half
- 17 per cent of net outpatient hospital service revenue. Each fee
- 18 shall be the same percentage for all affected hospitals, subject
- 19 to subsection (d).
- (d) The department shall exempt [children's hospitals,]
- 21 federal hospitals[7] and public hospitals[7 and psychiatrie

- 12 SECTION 5. Section 346G-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 13 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
- "(b) The department shall collect, and each hospital shall
- 15 pay, if so required, the hospital sustainability fee [not] no
- 16 later than the [thirtieth] sixtieth day after the end of each
- 17 calendar month; provided that if required federal approvals have
- 18 not been secured by the end of a calendar month, the fees for
- 19 that month shall be paid within ten days after notification to
- 20 the hospitals that the required approvals have been received."

- 7 SECTION 12. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2060;
- 8 provided that sections 9 and 10 of this Act shall take effect on
- 9 July 1, 2021.

Hospital Sustainability Program; Extension; Special Fund; Appropriation

Description:

Extends the hospital sustainability program through 6/30/2024. Increases the maximum fee for inpatient care services to five and one-half per cent. Increases the amount of time hospitals have to pay the hospital sustainability fee from thirty days to sixty days. Increases the pool of medicaid services that can be used for matching purposes. Appropriates moneys. Effective 7/1/2060. (HD2)
