### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE NURSING FACILITY SUSTAINABILITY PROGRAM.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the nursing facility 2 sustainability program was established in 2012 and has served a 3 critical role in strengthening the long-term care system in 4 Hawaii. In the nine years since its inception, the nursing 5 facility sustainability program has helped long-term care 6 facilities treat the most vulnerable patients in the State, especially low-income individuals who require these services. 7 8 The program has been carried out via a public-private 9 partnership to ensure that patients in Hawaii can access 10 quality, affordable care.

11 The legislature further finds that, even with this program, 12 nursing facilities in the State face major challenges. These 13 challenges are due in part to the health and financial pressures 14 related to the COVID-19 pandemic. Medicaid is jointly financed 15 by the federal and state governments by statutory formula; the 16 federal government pays between fifty per cent and seventy-four 17 per cent, with assistance levels determined by each state's per

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1 capita income. States with the lowest per capita income receive 2 higher federal matching rates. Under federal rules, the state 3 share must be public funds that are not federal funds. The 4 legislature notes that public funding to help sustain Hawaii's 5 nursing facilities financially may be accessed through a 6 provider fee.

7 The legislature also finds that provider fees exist in 8 forty-nine states and the District of Columbia as a means of 9 drawing down federal funds to sustain their medicaid programs 10 due rising state budget deficits, increasing health care costs, 11 and expanding medicaid enrollment. Provider fees, which are 12 collected from specific categories of health care providers, may 13 be imposed on different classes of health care services, 14 including inpatient and outpatient hospital and nursing facility 15 services.

16 The legislature therefore finds that, in Hawaii, a provider 17 fee on nursing facilities can result in a substantial increase 18 in medicaid payments, without putting additional constraints on 19 the State's budget. The additional federal funds obtained via 20 the fee program authorized by the nursing facility 21 sustainability program can maintain access to care for medicaid

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1 recipients, which will allow nursing facilities in the State to 2 continue to serve under-insured or uninsured patients in a 3 timely, effective matter and help ensure the overall 4 sustainability of the health care system in the State during the 5 challenging time of the COVID-19 pandemic. 6 The purpose of this Act is to preserve access to health 7 care for medicaid recipients by extending the nursing facility 8 sustainability fee program. 9 SECTION 2. Section 346F-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 10 amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows: 11 "(c) Revenue from the nursing facility sustainability fee 12 shall be used exclusively as follows: 13 (1)No less than eighty-eight per cent of the revenue from 14 the nursing facility sustainability fee shall be used 15 for one or more of the following: 16 (A) To match federal medicaid funds, with the 17 combined total to be used to enhance capitated 18 rates to medicaid managed care health plans for 19 the purpose of increasing medicaid payments to 20 private nursing facilities to support the 21 availability of services and ensure access to

In accordance with title 42 Code of Federal Regulations 7 part 438, the department shall use revenues from the nursing 8 facility sustainability fee and federal matching funds to 9 enhance the capitated rates paid to medicaid managed care health 10 plans for [state fiscal years 2019-2020 and 2020-2021,] the 11 period of July 1 through December 31, 2021, and calendar years 12 2022 and 2023, consistent with the following objectives: 13 The rate enhancement shall be used exclusively for (1)14 increasing reimbursements to private nursing 15 facilities to support the availability of services and 16 to ensure access to care to the medicaid managed care 17 health plan enrollees; 18 (2) The rate enhancement shall be made part of the monthly 19 capitated rates by the department to medicaid managed 20 care health plans, which shall provide documentation 21 to the department and the nursing facility trade

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1		association located in Hawaii certifying that the
2		revenues received under paragraph (1) are used in
3		accordance with this section;
4	(3)	The rate enhancement shall be actuarially sound and
5		approved by the federal government for federal fund
6		participation;
7	(4)	The department shall modify the fee-for-service
8		reimbursement rates of the nursing facilities to
9		recognize the medicaid portion of the nursing facility
10		sustainability fee as an additional cost of serving
11		medicaid patients, and to provide a uniform percentage
12		increase in preexisting facility-specific rates; and
13	(5)	Payments made by the medicaid managed care health

4	facility sustainability program special fund the sum of
5	\$33,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
6	year 2021-2022 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be
7	necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for uses consistent with
8	section 346F-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes.
9	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
10	of human services for the purposes of this Act.
11	SECTION 9. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
12	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
13	SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on June 29, 2021;
14	provided that section 7 and 8 shall take effect on July 1, 2021.

#### Report Title:

Nursing Facility Sustainability Program; Special Fund; Department of Human Services; Appropriation

#### Description:

Extends the nursing facility sustainability program to 2024. Allows the nursing facility sustainability fee to be used to enhance capitated rates for the purpose of paying quality incentives. Specifies that the nursing facility sustainability fee limit is 5.5 per cent of overall net patient service revenue. Removes the per resident daily maximum fee of \$20 for each facility. Specifies facilities that meet certain exceptions shall pay a reduced daily fee in comparison to other participating facilities. Appropriates funds.
