SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH'S ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT DIVISION TO ENSURE THAT DESTINATIONS TO WHICH THE STATE'S RECYCLABLE WASTE IS TRANSPORTED FOR OUT-OF-STATE PROCESSING ABIDE BY THE ENVIRONMENTAL STANDARDS AS OUTLINED BY THE BASEL CONVENTION.

1 WHEREAS, prior to China's import ban on recyclable plastics 2 in January 2018, seventy percent of the world's plastic waste 3 was exported to China; and 4 5 WHEREAS, since China's import ban on recyclable plastics, recyclable plastic waste shipments to Southeast Asian countries 6 have increased exponentially; for example, exports of recycling 7 from the United States to Thailand increased almost seven 8 9 thousand percent in one year; and 10 WHEREAS, in 2019, Hawaii exported approximately 10,500,000 11 12 pounds of plastic, 8,500,000 pounds of aluminum, and 32,100,000 pounds of glass and bi-metal for recycling; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, Hawaii collection companies choose where to send the State's recyclable waste based on factors including shipping 16 costs, contracts, and the amount the buyer is willing to pay; 17 18 and 19 20 WHEREAS, in 2019, Hawaii shipped its recyclable plastics, aluminum, glass, and bi-metal nationally to states including 21 California, Georgia, Maryland, and Oregon, and internationally 22 23 to China, India, Indonesia, Malaysia, Saudi Arabia, and South 24 Korea; and 25 26 WHEREAS, much of the recyclable waste that is shipped to United States destinations from Hawaii is subsequently sent 27 overseas for end-of-life processing; and 28 29



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WHEREAS, end-of-life processing for recyclable plastics and 1 2 waste in many of the countries in which Hawaii's recyclable waste ultimately arrives are often handled in a manner that 3 cause harm to human health and local environments; and 4 5 6 WHEREAS, in response to public outcry following the 7 discovery in the 1980s of deposits of toxic wastes imported from abroad in Africa and other parts of the developing world, the 8 Basel Convention on the Control of Transboundary Movements of 9 Hazardous Wastes and their Disposal, commonly referred to as the 10 11 Basel Convention, was adopted on March 22, 1989, and entered into force in 1992; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, the objective of the Basel Convention is to protect human health and the environment from the effects of 15 hazardous wastes and other wastes; and 16 17 WHEREAS, the Basel Convention is a multilateral 18 19 environmental agreement under the auspices of the United Nations Environmental Program and was created to reduce the movement of 20 21 hazardous and other wastes between nations, specifically with the intent of preventing transfer of hazardous waste from 22 23 developed to less developed countries; and 24 25 WHEREAS, the United States of America is a signatory to the Basel Convention but not a party; and 26 27 28 WHEREAS, effective January 1, 2021, the Basel Convention 29 was amended to require trade controls for all mixed plastic 30 waste not destined for environmentally-sound recycling; and 31 32 WHEREAS, the Department of Health oversees waste disposal and recycling in the State; and 33 34 35 WHEREAS, each county in the State handles its respective 36 waste processing independent of the other counties; now, therefore, 37 38 39 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first 40 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2021, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of 41 42 Health's Environmental Management Division is urged to ensure



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that destinations to which the State's recyclable waste is 1 transported for out-of-state processing abide by the 2 environmental standards as outlined by the Basel Convention; and 3 4 5 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the counties are urged to 6 ensure that destinations to which their respective county's recyclable waste is transported for out-of-state processing 7 8 abide by the health and safety standards as outlined by the 9 Basel Convention; and 10 11 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 12 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Director

13 of Health, and mayors of each county.
