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SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

DECLARING A CLIMATE EMERGENCY AND REQUESTING STATEWIDE COLLABORATION TOWARD AN IMMEDIATE JUST TRANSITION AND EMERGENCY MOBILIZATION EFFORT TO RESTORE A SAFE CLIMATE.

1	WHEREAS, global warming has now raised the average global
2	air temperature about one degree Celsius, and scientists have
3	documented that this extra heat is already having a dramatic
4	impact on the environment, as demonstrated through larger and
5	stronger hurricanes, increased drought and flooding, shifting
6	rain patterns, more and larger wildfires, a hotter and more
7	acidic ocean, and damaged ecosystems, both marine and
8	terrestrial, across the planet; and
9	
10	WHEREAS, in April 2016, world leaders recognized the urgent
11	need to combat climate change by signing the Paris Agreement,
12	agreeing to keep global warming "well below 2°C (3.6°F) above
13	pre-industrial levels" and to "pursue efforts to limit the
14	temperature increase to 1.5°C (2.7°F)"; and
15	
16	WHEREAS, in 2017, over fifteen thousand scientists
17	published a "Warning to Humanity", declaring that greenhouse
18	gases produced from human activities have "pushed Earth's
19	ecosystems to their breaking point"; and

21	WHEREAS, 13,784 scientists from one hundred fifty-six
22	countries have signed a declaration, unequivocally affirming
23	that "planet Earth is facing a climate emergency" and it will now take "an immense increase of scale in endeavors to conserve
24 25	our biosphere" to avoid untold suffering; and
25 26	our prosphere to avoid uncord surrering, and
26 27	WHEREAS, in the absence of action to reduce greenhouse gas
27 28	emissions, reports indicate that warming is likely to accelerate
28 29	in the next decade and reach 1.5 degrees Celsius by 2030 -
30	ten years earlier than projected by the 2014 Intergovernmental

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Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), and two degrees Celsius by 2045; 1 2 and 3 WHEREAS, based upon the scientific information and 4 expertise available, Hawaii remains particularly vulnerable to 5 the dangers of disaster occurrences as a result of the effects 6 of global warming, thereby endangering the health, safety, and 7 welfare of the people, warranting preemptive and protective 8 9 action; and 10 11 WHEREAS, the Hawaii State Constitution adopts the public trust doctrine for the benefit of the people and the right of 12 each person to a clean and healthful environment; and 13 14 WHEREAS, as of January 26, 2021, 1,864 jurisdictions in 15 16 thirty-three countries have already declared a climate emergency; now, therefore, 17 18 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first 19 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2021, the 20 21 House of Representatives concurring, that this body acknowledges that an existential climate emergency threatens humanity and the 22 natural world, declares a climate emergency, and requests 23 statewide collaboration toward an immediate just transition and 24 emergency mobilization effort to restore a safe climate; and 25 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that entities statewide are requested to pursue these climate mitigation and adaptation 28 efforts and mobilize at the necessary scale and speed: 29 30 A statewide commitment to a just transition toward a (1)31 decarbonized economy that invests in and ensures clean 32 33 energy, quality jobs, and a statewide commitment to a climate emergency mobilization effort to reverse the 34 climate crisis, which, with appropriate financial and 35 regulatory assistance from state authorities, will 36 transform the economy; and 37 38 39 (2) Facilitation of investments in beneficial projects and infrastructure such as zero emissions energy; electric 40 vehicles, including clean fleet transitions for the 41 State and counties; energy efficiency; reforestation; 42

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afforestation; climate-smart agriculture; and climate-1 2 friendly land use; and 3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the State commits to statewide 4 action that is rooted in equity, self-determination, culture, 5 tradition, and the belief that people locally and around the 6 world have the right to clean, healthy, and adequate air, water, 7 land, food, education, and shelter; and 8 9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that nothing in this measure 10 constitutes a declaration of an emergency for purposes of any 11 act authorizing the exercise of any special or extraordinary 12 power during the period of a state emergency or other type of 13 14 declared emergency; and 15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 16 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor; Attorney 17 General; Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources; 18 Director of the Office of Planning; and mayors of the City and 19

Director of the Office of Planning; and mayors of the CityCounty of Honolulu and counties of Hawaii, Kauai, and Maui.
