SENATE RESOLUTION

URGING THE STATE TO CONSIDER AND ADOPT INNOVATIVE POLICIES TO IMPROVE TRANSIT AND REDUCE TRAFFIC CONGESTION.

1 WHEREAS, traffic congestion is a major issue that costs the State millions of dollars annually and negatively contributes to 2 3 the health and welfare of residents; and 4 WHEREAS, Honolulu consistently ranks among the worst cities 5 nationally for traffic congestion; and 6 7 8 WHEREAS, the average commuter on Oahu spends sixty-four hours each year sitting in traffic congestion; and 9 10 WHEREAS, the Department of Business, Economic Development, 11 and Tourism estimates the cost of traffic congestion, including 12 time lost and the excess fuel consumed sitting in traffic, at 13 more than \$753,000,000 annually; and 14 15 WHEREAS, there are currently more than 1,275,000 motor 16 vehicles registered in the State, including cars, trucks, 17 18 motorcycles, and scooters; and 19 WHEREAS, as of December 2019, there are only 944,159 20 residents with a valid driver's license, which means there are 21 22 approximately 330,841 more vehicles than drivers in the State; 23 and 24 WHEREAS, there are only 4,476 miles of roads, paved and 25 unpaved, in the State; and 26 27 WHEREAS, the State spends on average \$82,000,000 annually 28 on road repairs; and 29 30 WHEREAS, between 1995 and 2017 Oahu added one hundred 31 32 ninety miles of new roadways and during that same time period Oahu added 190,000 more registered vehicles while the population 33 on Oahu only grew by approximately twelve percent; and 34



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1 2 WHEREAS, between 1993 and 2017, the nation's one hundred 3 largest urbanized areas added 30,511 new freeway lane-miles, an increase of forty-two percent, and over that same time period 4 the population in those regions increased by thirty-two percent 5 6 while traffic delays and congestion exploded by one hundred forty-four percent, proving that "widening the freeways" won't 7 solve the traffic problems in the State; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, a new focus on affordable housing development will add tens of thousands of commuters to the roads in the years to 11 12 come; and 13 14 WHEREAS, the only effective way of improving transit and reducing traffic in the State is to shift away from spending 15 limited resources on adding lane miles for vehicles and instead 16 investing in alternative transit infrastructure and adopting 17 18 policies that reduce the number of vehicles on the roads; now, 19 therefore, 20 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first 21 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2021, 22 that the State is encouraged to consider and adopt innovative 23 policies to invest in alternative transit infrastructure and 24 reduce the number of vehicles on the road; and 25 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Transportation is requested to convene a working group to 28 examine and consider innovative policies to invest in 29 alternative transit infrastructure and reduce the number of 30 vehicles on the road; and 31 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group be comprised of the following members, or their designees: 34 35 36 (1)The Chairperson of the Senate Standing Committee on Transportation, who should serve as co-chair of the 37 working group; 38 39 40 (2) The Chairperson of the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Transportation, who should serve 41 as co-chair of the working group; 42
