SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THAT A WORKING GROUP BE CONVENED TO DEVELOP RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMPLEMENTING THE REVITALIZING ECONOMY AND AGRICULTURE LEADERSHIP INITIATIVE.

WHEREAS, for Hawaii to achieve food and energy security, 1 2 timely and catalytic actions must be taken to establish solid aina-connected foundations and provide viable pathways for 3 4 growers to succeed in expanding markets; and 5 WHEREAS, catalytic actions are coordinated efforts, 6 7 conducted according to the following principles: 8 9 (1) Farming needs to be profitable; 10 11 (2) Farming needs to be practical and a vital component of economic and environmental recovery; and 12 13 14 (3) Farming needs to be a priority in order to achieve food and energy security; and 15 16 17 WHEREAS, restorative agriculture increases local food production by one hundred per cent, sustainably diversifies the 18 19 economy, and culturally and environmentally connects to the people and eco-system of Hawaii; and 20 21 22 WHEREAS, the Revitalizing Economy and Agriculture Leadership (REAL) initiative is a multi-phased, catalytic change 23 initiative that empowers Hawaii farmers to become 24 self-sustaining, for-profit businesses with local, nutritional 25 grass feedstock production and direct access to local and export 26 27 off-taker markets; and 28 29 WHEREAS, this multi-phased, transformative initiative 30 creates entrepreneurial businesses with industry partners; 31 provides market connections to attract capital assets to Hawaii; facilitates access to a sustainable food supply and feedstock 32 for ranching; promotes clean energy, restorative and precision 33 agriculture, and environmental conservation; and provides jobs 34 for skilled agricultural technology workers; and 35



1 2 WHEREAS, the REAL initiative is currently underway and its proponents are taking necessary actions with community and 3 industry partners to stabilize Hawaii's small farming businesses 4 impacted by the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic; 5 6 and 7 WHEREAS, there is an urgent need for the completion of the 8 9 initiative, and the intended timeline for the initiative is as follows: 10 11 Immediate efforts, to be completed in a six-month 12 (1)period, would concentrate on: jump-starting Hawaii's 13 agricultural economy through cost-effective, 14 restorative agriculture; stabilizing Hawaii 15 agriculture by connecting farming and ranching; and 16 keeping revenue flowing inside, rather than outside, 17 Hawaii; 18 19 20 (2) The next phase of efforts, to be completed over a three-month period, would: coordinate farmers and 21 22 ranchers to revitalize fallow and unproductive 23 agricultural and pastoral lands; facilitate local production of grass-fed beef; facilitate the export of 24 products; increase production capacity; secure proper 25 equipment; and make connections that are necessary to 26 obtain expert advice from researchers, marketers, and 27 water and conservation experts; and 28 29 The last phase of efforts, to be completed over a 30 (3) six-month period, would: replicate restorative 31 agriculture in farming and ranching communities and 32 groups across the State; provide technical assistance 33 in building communities of practice; and provide 34 workforce training in agricultural technology, 35 sciences, marketing, and brand thought leadership; and 36 37 WHEREAS, the timing and urgency of the initiative requires 38 39 immediate attention, action, and collaboration from governmental regulatory agencies, landowners, and industry participants, so 40 that the initiative may; 41 42
