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SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE GOVERNOR TO CONVENE A WORKING GROUP TO DEVELOP RECOMMENDATIONS FOR EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATIONS WITH LIMITED ENGLISH PROFICIENT PERSONS AND PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES BEFORE, DURING, AND AFTER EMERGENCIES AND NATURAL DISASTERS.

WHEREAS, the 2019 State of Hawaii Data Book reported that 1 the portion of Hawaii's total population that is five years old 2 and above is 1,331,641; and 3 4 WHEREAS, roughly one in four people in the State, or 5 348,139, speak a language other than English at home; and 6 7 WHEREAS, the 2019 State of Hawaii Data Book also reported 8 that 161,055, or approximately one in nine of Hawaii's residents 9 indicated that they speak English "less than very well", 10 classifying them as limited English proficient persons; and 11 12 WHEREAS, Hawai'i has one of the highest proportions of 13 non-English speakers in the United States; and 14 15 WHEREAS, language access is a civil right that derives from 16 Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which provides that 17 "[n]o person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, 18 color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be 19 denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under 20 21 any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance"; and 22 23 WHEREAS, in Lau v. Nichols, 414 U.S. 563 (1974), the United 24 States Supreme Court held that failure to ensure meaningful 25 access to services for limited English proficient persons is a 26 form of national origin discrimination prohibited by Title VI of 27 the Civil Rights Act of 1964; and 28 29 WHEREAS, Executive Order 13166 issued by President Clinton 30 on August 11, 2000, directed all federal agencies and entities 31



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that received federal funding to examine their services and to 1 develop and implement systems to provide meaningful access to 2 limited English proficient persons; and 3 4 WHEREAS, the Office of Language Access, established in 5 2006, reaffirmed Hawaii's commitment to civil rights and 6 inclusive access to services regardless of national origin; and 7 8 WHEREAS, the State has been cited repeatedly by the federal 9 court, federal offices of civil rights, including the Department 10 of Justice, and Hawai'i Civil Rights Commission, for its failure 11 to provide language accessible services for limited English 12 proficient persons; and 13 14 WHEREAS, during the pandemic, Hawaii's limited English 15 proficient community has expressed concern and dismay regarding 16 17 non-existent or limited access to essential state services, including health related information and unemployment benefits, 18 in a language they understand; and 19 20 WHEREAS, the 2018 Disability Status Report by Cornell 21 University reported that 51,300 Hawai'i residents are hearing 22 disabled and 25,100 Hawai'i residents are blind or experience 23 serious difficulty seeing, even when wearing glasses; and 24 25 WHEREAS, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 bars entities 26 receiving federal funds from discriminating against individuals 27 with any disability in the provision of programs and requires 28 that all electronic and information technology resources 29 30 developed with federal funds be completely accessible; and 31 32 WHEREAS, Title II of the American with Disabilities Act 33 prohibits discrimination by state or local governments and requires that state and local governments ensure that their 34 communications, including emergency communications, are fully 35 36 accessible to people with disabilities; and 37 38 WHEREAS, bridging the language divide experienced by the limited English proficient, deaf, blind, and disabled 39 communities is essential to ensuring equitable access to 40 services, programs, and activities for all Hawai'i residents; and 41 42



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WHEREAS, effective and appropriate communication that 1 reaches these communities during natural disasters or emergency 2 events is critical to protecting lives, families, and the 3 State's diverse communities; and 4 5 WHEREAS, providing accessible communication and services in 6 7 emergency and disaster management services, health care services, public benefit services, unemployment benefits, and 8 other services critical to ensuring the safety, health, and 9 welfare of limited English proficient and disabled persons in 10 natural disasters and emergency events is required by federal 11 and state laws; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, convening a working group of stakeholders is a significant step toward sharing information and solutions, 15 developing and leveraging resources, and formulating action 16 17 steps to ensure meaningful access for limited English proficient, deaf, blind, and disabled persons; now, therefore, 18 19 20 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2021, 21 that the Governor is requested to convene a working group to 22 develop recommendations for effective communications with 23 limited English proficient persons and persons with disabilities 24 25 before, during, and after emergencies and natural disasters; and 26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group is requested 27 28 to: 29 Develop a plan to ensure that communication services, 30 (1) 31 including translation, are accurate, culturally appropriate, meaningful, and timely; 32 33 34 (2) Assess the current status of communication access for persons with a disability and limited English 35 proficient persons during natural disasters and 36 37 emergencies; (3) Assess the current communication needs and challenges 38 across government entities during natural disasters 39 40 and emergencies; 41
