SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO PROVIDE FREE MENSTRUAL PRODUCTS TO STUDENTS ON ALL HAWAII PUBLIC SCHOOL CAMPUSES.

WHEREAS, the Hawaii Board of Education policy number 1 2 1110-10 states that "gender equity extends the doctrine of fairness to all areas of activity in the public school system"; 3 4 and 5 WHEREAS, in 2014, the United Nations declared menstrual 6 7 hygiene a public-health, gender-equality, and human rights 8 issue; and 9 WHEREAS, half the population will experience menstruation 10 while at school; and 11 12 WHEREAS, Hawaii public schools are insufficiently funded; 13 14 and 15 WHEREAS, the funding that is allocated by the Legislature 16 and expended by the Department of Education should be equitably 17 allocated among students who menstruate and those who do not; 18 19 and 20 WHEREAS, the Department of Education's budget allocation 21 for extracurricular activities, including athletics, 22 23 disproportionately benefits students who do not menstruate; and 24 WHEREAS, the Department of Education maintains a healthy 25 school environment by providing free products to students such 26 as toilet paper and hand soap in restrooms, yet the Department 27 of Education does not provide students with free menstrual 28 29 products; and 30 31 WHEREAS, students who are menstruating are burdened with the additional cost of menstrual products to maintain a healthy 32 school environment for everyone, including students who do not 33 34 menstruate; and 35

WHEREAS, some students who are menstruating do not come to 1 2 school or leave school early because they cannot afford the 3 menstrual products that maintain a healthy school environment; 4 and 5 WHEREAS, a 2019 nationwide study conducted by the 6 7 University of Richmond found that students who were unable to 8 afford menstrual products were 5.89 times more likely to miss 9 school, 5.82 times more likely to be late to school, and 4.14 10 times more likely to leave school early compared to those who could afford menstrual products; and 11 12 WHEREAS, the Department of Education has identified that 13 forty seven percent of public school students in the 2019-2020 14 school year were considered "economically disadvantaged"; and 15 16 17 WHEREAS, the 2020 ALICE Report by Aloha United Way states that almost sixty percent of Hawaii's local families are 18 struggling to meet basic needs due to the economic impact of the 19 20 coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic; and 21 WHEREAS, according to the nationwide survey conducted by 22 Always of Proctor and Gamble, since the pandemic, one out of 23 three parents are worried about their ongoing ability to afford 24 25 menstrual products; and 26 27 WHEREAS, a 2016 New York City pilot program found that 28 access to free menstrual products in public schools increased attendance by 2.4 percent, leading to a package of legislation 29 30 providing free access to menstrual products for New York City's 31 students; now, therefore, 32 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-first 33 34 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2021, that the Department of Education is requested to provide free 35 36 menstrual products to students on all public school campuses; 37 and 38 39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Education is requested to include criteria in the evaluation tool of the 40 Superintendent based on minimizing factors of achieving true 41 42 gender equity; and
