Construction worker arrested for allegedly entering Manoa home

A construction worker who made improvements to a Manoa home four years ago was arrested for allegedly intruding there Thursday, police said.

The resident, a 34-year-old man, had gone to bed about 10 p.m. when he heard a noise from another room. He got up and found a man standing in front of his bedroom and recognized him as a man who had done work in the house, police said.

The men struggled before the suspect ran off and was stopped by officers less than a block away on Huelani Drive, police said.

Officers booked the suspect, a 34-year-old man with no local address, on suspicion of unauthorized entry into a dwelling and three contempt warrants.



Incident spurs patrols around school

Police are conducting twice-daily patrols around Manoa Elementary School, and parents and teachers are taking extra care after a possible attempted abduction.

School administrators say the incident happened shortly after school Monday when a girl was walking to her grandfather's car near Manoa Valley District Park behind the campus.

Police say a man standing next to a black Honda sedan called the girl over and "began talking to her." She then ran to her grandfather's car.

The girl's father reported the incident the next day.

As a precaution, police are conducting patrols near the school in the mornings and afternoons. School staff are also standing along the perimeters of the campus after school lets out to watch for suspicious people.

Jeanette Uyeda, school principal, said the incident has shaken parents and staff, but added the steps the school has taken are being done in an abundance of caution.

"There hasn't been any panic," she said.

Counselors have also visited classes to go over safety tips.

About 570 kids attend Manoa Elementary.

Terror Suspect Lived In Upper Manoa

Neighbors Were Suspicious Of Young Man In Million-Dollar Home <u>Daryl Huff</u> KITV 4 News Reporter

HONOLULU -- A young man suspected of being an Islamic terrorist was living in a million dollar house in Manoa, with no obvious source of income.

Neighbors on Huelani Drive in upper Manoa valley said Abdel Hammeed Shehadeh, 21, stuck out on the tranquil cul-de-sac because he looked like a student, with his moped, hooded sweatshirts and reversed baseball cap, but seemed to live on his own in the large house with a dramatic view of the valley behind it.

Neighborhood watch block captain Grant Merritt, who lives on the same street, said he questioned Shehadeh not long after he moved in in about April of last year.

"Something kind of didn't add up," Merritt said. "It felt kinda weird."

"He said he was doing a deep sea fishing operation and he was doing the web site," Merritt said, but said Shehadeh said he and his "boss" had yet to find a boat or hire a captain.

The split-level house is valued at about a \$1 million on city tax records. The family which owns it rents it out through a real estate company which said Shehadeh was not the renter on the lease. Neighbors wondered how he could afford to live in a house that would rent for several thousand dollars a month.

"He was the only guy who was there all the time," said Merritt.

The FBI searched the house after arresting Shehadeh on Friday. He's charged with making false statements about why he wanted to travel to Pakistan in 2008. The FBI said he made statements he wanted to be trained there as a terrorist or guerrilla fighter and advocated violent jihad on the internet.

Similar statements at a Manoa mosque not far from the rented house led the Muslim association to ask him not to return, according to association chairman Hakim Quansafi.

"Our teachings are very clear about peace, love and compassion," Ouansafi said. "So when we hear something like that we get uncomfortable. We don't tolerate it. We don't allow it in our community."

Through a front window in the Huelani house Friday empty packaging for a Craftsman 1088 pellet pistol could be seen on a kitchen counter. The FBI affidavit said last October Shehadeh went to a Waikiki gun club and tried several types of firearms.

That was about the same time neighbors said Shehadeh expressed interest in the neighborhood watch.

"He stopped by on his putt-putt one day and said they told me you're the block captain and I'd like to get on the list," Merrit said. Merritt said he considered letting Shehadeh to join, but neither he nor Shehadeh followed up.

Shehadeh was in custody in the Honolulu federal detention center Friday, waiting for a seat on one of the regular flights that transport local inmates to federal correctional facilities on the mainland. He will be flown to New York, where the FBI said he was born, raised and charged last week.

A Neighborhood Security Watch is a Crime Prevention Program that:

- Sponsored by the Honolulu Police Department.

- **Teaches** participants how to make their homes more secure and properly identify their belongings.

The Coordinator

The NSW program is spearheaded by the **Program Coordinator**. Like all other participants, is a volunteer, working as the liaison between the community and the police. They work directly with the beat officer in that geographical area, the assigned district resource officer, the designated block captain and community members.



The Block Captain

The **Block Captain(s)** are directly responsible to the Coordinator. They **receive information from the members and relay that information to the Coordinator**. Information that is received from the Coordinator is likewise, passed to the members.



The Members

The **Members** are the ever important hub of this wheel of security. Their **eyes and ears**, what the observe and hear in terms of suspicious activity most often are a vital link to solving crime.
