Avoiding COVID-19 scams

The one thing we know about scammers is that they follow the headlines. So it is not surprising that we have seen so many coronavirus-related scams. From scammers selling fake COVID-19 cures and treatments to people posing as government officials offering coronavirus stimulus checks - nothing seems to be off-limits.

Here's how you can spot the scam.

Real contact tracers will not ask you for money.

Only scammers insist on payment by gift card, money transfer, or cryptocurrency.

Watch out for phishing emails and text messages.

Don't click on links in emails or texts unfamiliar to you.

Contact tracing does not require your bank account or credit card number.

Never share account information with anybody who contacts you asking for it.

Research before you donate.

Do not let anyone rush you into making a donation. Get tips on donating wisely at ftc.gov/charity.





Legitimate contact tracers will never ask for your Social Security number.

Never give any part of your Social Security number to anyone who contacts you.

Hang up on robocalls.

Scammers use illegal sales call to get your money and your personal information.

Ignore offers for vaccinations and home test kits.

Scammers are selling products to treat or prevent COVID-19 without proof that they work

Watch for emails claiming to be from the CDC or WHO. Do not click on a link in a text or email.

Doing so can download malware onto your device.

Waikapū Park Complex improvements

The Maui County Department of Parks and Recreation has announced improvements and expansion of the Waikapū Community Center, which will include replacement of the ballfield irrigation and other park upgrades. The construction work will require closure of the Waikapū Park Complex from Nov. 16, 2020, through Sept. 12, 2021.

The project will include improvements to and expansion of the existing community center, building for ADA accessibility compliance, and the addition of two covered lanais. Site work improvements include alterations to the existing parking and replacing the ballfield irrigation system, along with utility



improvements at the driveway connection to Waiko Road.

The Waikapū Community Center remains closed for public health and safety reasons related

to the COVID-19 pandemic. The park closure will affect the entire Waikapū Park Complex, including the ballfield and basketball court.

The project consultant is Riecke, Sunnland, Kono Architects Ltd., and the general contractor is Betsill Brothers LLC. The public is asked to stay outside of the construction area for safety reasons, and the department apologizes for any inconvenience.

Released CIP Funding

Governor David Ige and the legislature have worked together to release funding for Capital Improvement Project (CIP) statewide. Most CIP projects are paid for with borrowed bond funds and to qualify, it must be a large scale renovation or repair to existing facilities, landscape improvements, new construction, land acquisition, or utility modifications. Here are the projects for Central Maui that have had funding released since August 2020:

- ✓ \$800,000 for design of a girls' athletic locker room at H.P. ✓ \$125,000 for renovating the Maui Academy of Performing **Baldwin High School.**
- √ \$1 million for design and construction of a roof replacement √ \$500,000 for the construction of a maintenance and event for Building B at H.P. Baldwin High School.
- ✓ \$1.1 million for installation of air conditioning in Building A at 'Iao Intermediate School.
- ✓ \$3.5 million for design and construction for covered walkways and drainage at Waihe'e Elementary.
- ✓ \$3.9 million for campus wide air conditioning and electric upgrade at Wailuku Elementary.
- ✓ \$1.2 million for re-roofing of Buildings G and J at Wailuku **Elementary.**

- Arts existing space for a new theater.
- equipment storage building at the Maui Arts & Cultural Center.
- √ \$350,000 for plans and design of an affordable housing project by the Mission Grounds Development by the Wailuku Union Church.
- \checkmark \$300,000 for the construction of a pavilion enclosure and other related improvements at the Nisei Veterans Memorial Center.

Pu'unani Subdivision moves forward

The Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) has published its final Environmental Assessment (EA) with a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) for the Pu'unani Subdivision in Waikapū, Maui.

The Hawaiian Homes Commission (HHC) evaluated the final EA and issued a FONSI determination at its October 2020 meeting. The final EA and FONSI were published in the Office of Environmental Quality Control's (OEQC) November 8 Environmental Notice. In June 2019, DHHL acquired an approximately 48-acre parcel in Waikapū that would become the future Pu'unani Homestead Subdivision based on an agreement to transfer affordable housing credits to the developer.



The Pu'unani Subdivision is anticipated to be comprised of a maximum of 161 residential lots, including 137 turnkey single-family homes and 24 vacant lots. The turn-key homes are currently anticipated to range from approximately 1,088 square feet to 1,674 square feet in size and feature six model types with three to four-bedrooms and two or three-bath options.

Infrastructure improvements will include internal roadways, curbs, gutters and sidewalks, a drainage detention basin, grading, water, sewer, drainage, utility connections, walls, fences, landscaping improvements, as well as roadway frontage improvements along Honoapi'ilani Highway. In addition, Honoapi'ilani Highway will undergo widening at the project's entrances for the provision of turning lanes, a median refuge lane, the maintenance of an existing bike lane, and sight distance requirements.

Upon project completion, the residential lots will be offered to Waiohuli Undivided Interest lessees in their original selection order based on a 2019 HHC decision allowing the relocation of these leases. Any remaining lots will be offered to the Maui Island residential waiting list.

Ka'ahumanu Community Corridor Project



Maui County residents are invited to participate in a study to create a new vision for the roadway corridor along Ka'ahumanu Avenue and Main Street in Wailuku. Maui is growing, and we are facing challenges like creating additional affordable housing and providing adequate transportation options. This project has the opportunity to provide economic development, new jobs, and homes, along with new travel options to keep Maui accessible. The project is made possible by a grant from the State Legislature and matching funds from the County of Maui. The project is led by the Maui County Department of Planning with a project team consisting of the Maui County and State officials.

Project details:

- The roadway corridor extends 2.5 miles from Ka`ahumanu Avenue in the vicinity of the Maui Mall to Main Street near the State Building in Wailuku town.
- The project will explore new housing options, transportation improvements, safe bike and pedestrian routes and opportunities for economic development.
- The community will be an important partner by engaging in this study to create a new vision.

The project will unfold in three major phases:

Wailuku Town Improvement Updates

Text steps for Vineyard Street

September 2020 - January 2021

Road improvements on W. Vineyard St. between Market St. and Church St. began on Sept. 28.

On Lower Vineyard Street, construction is anticipated to take 5 months to complete with crews starting from Market Street working towards Church



Street. Temporary parking will be available at Maui Lani Safeway with free shuttle transportation on Da Bee. Portions of the Municipal Parking Lot will also be open.

Phase IB Access Road improvements are slated to begin in December 2020, followed by construction of the new Parking Structure in April 2021.

Construction Upper on Vineyard Street is anticipated to start in March 2021 and will take approximately 5 months to complete with work starting from Church Street up to High Street. Portions of the Municipal Parking Lot will also be open until March 2021.

Jeed a Ride?

With all of the construction making parking a little more difficult, you can catch Da Bee to various stops in Wailuku. Anyone can hop on board for a quick ride to work or to other stops in town. Shuttles run from Monday through Friday, excluding holidays. Da Bee shuttle has two separate routes:



- Parking and bus pick up at Safeway (Wailuku side of parking lot).
- Nau Stop: Wells Street (fronting District Court).
- 'Ohia Lehua Stop: N. High Street (fronting State Office Building).
- 'Ilima Stop: Main Street (at South Market).
- Bus returns to Safeway. Vehicle cleaned & disinfected, then repeats route.



- 'Ohia Lehua Stop: N. ٠ High Street (fronting State Office Building).
- 'Ilima Stop: Main Street (at South Market).
- Ma'o Stop: Kemole Street (near Kehalani Makai Pkwy).
