UH WEST OAHU CAMPUS A GO







Remember Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young's song, "It's Been A Long Time Comin"? How about 30 years? The best news by far of the 2010 legislative session is that we were able to secure \$48 million in funding for the planned UH West Oahu campus, which will be located in Kapolei near Farrington Highway and Kualakai Parkway. It was critical that we funded the project this year, because otherwise the university could have lost the land. The former James Campbell Estate (now the James Campbell Company) had donated 202 acres to the university, but put in a stipulation that the land would revert back to them if construction on the campus doesn't begin by December 31, 2011.

With the \$48 million now secure, UH West Oahu will be on track to open Phase 1 of the campus by spring 2012. The plan is to have an enrollment of roughly 2,750 students at that point and the initial build out would include an administration building, campus center, library, and 2 classroom buildings. The UH West Oahu campus will offer 22 bachelor degree programs, which will include many subjects not offered at the Manoa campus, such as justice administration, health care administration, respiratory care, and computer, electronics, & networking technology.

A university campus for West Oahu is greatly needed. Right now, only 21% of the young people in the Leeward District of the DOE attend college compared to the statewide average of 38%. The campus will create jobs by employing more than 300 people during the construction phase and an additional 1,000 jobs over the next decade. Another big plus is that it will cut down on rush hour traffic on the H-1 by directing traffic flow away from the downtown area. Mahalo to Chancellor Gene Awakuni and his team for persevering and my colleagues at the Legislature for understanding the importance of providing better higher education opportunities for our community.

KEY ENERGY AND ENVIRONMENT LEGISLATION PASSED

Although this session could have been better, I was able, as the Senate Energy and Environment Chair, to work with my colleagues in getting several energy-related bills I introduced through the Legislature. Here is a short description of those bills.

On April 13th, Senator Gabbard test drove the all-new Mini-E electric vehicle by BMW, which can go up to 80 miles on one charge.



Later that day, he met with energy officials from Japan who plan to invest in Smart Grid projects on the Big Island.



SB 2817 – prevents homeowner associations from unreasonably restricting homeowners in installing solar energy devices, such as photovoltaic solar panels or solar water heaters. This is a common sense measure that will remove one of the last roadblocks in the path of homeowners in associations who want to take the positive step of installing solar energy devices on their homes. Distributed generation of energy from renewable sources is a key component in our state's ambitious quest to get off foreign oil.

SB 466 – limits the hours that a leaf blower can be used in a residential area and also establishes fines for violation. This is a quality of life issue for many people around the state who suffer from the loud noise and pollution this lawn equipment creates.

SB 2231 – prohibits a condominium association from preventing owners from installing an electric vehicle charging station on or near their parking stalls. It is likely that in the next couple of years we'll see a great increase in the number of electric vehicles on our roads.

SB 2563 – sets the goal that our state meet 30% of its fuel demand with renewable fuels, such as biofuels, by 2030. Also, allows the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism to collect fees from those who seek exemptions from the state's solar water heater mandate, which was the first such law in the nation.

SB 2357 (Act 30) – requires the Gas Company to report to the Public Utilities Commission the amount of renewable energy sources they are using to produce their synthetic natural gas. The hope is that they will continue moving in the "green" direction.

Next session, I hope to revisit two important energy bills that didn't make it through this time around. The first bill would set up a property assessed clean energy program in our state. This innovative program has been done in 18 other states and allows homeowners to install solar and small wind systems on their homes, and then pay for those improvements through their property tax bill.

Another measure would have greatly improved the state's net energy metering program, which allows homeowners and small businesses to lower or even eliminate their electricity bills through the use of renewable energy systems.



Even thoughthings were tight at the Legislature these past two years, our district was still able to get a big investment of \$201,066,000 in the 2009-2011 state budget to help fund important school, road, and other infrastructure improvements. Here's a list of those projects:

SEAGULL SCHOOLS FLIES INTO KO 'OLINA

It was great being a part of Seagull Schools' blessing and grand opening for its Stone Family Early Education Center in Ko 'Olina on April 3rd. This is the seventh Seagull Schools campus and will offer individualized, early childhood instruction for 180 children, ages 2 – 5 years old. The Education Center rests on a \$2 million acre of land donated by Jeff Stone. The Harry & Jeanette Weinberg Foundation provided a \$1.3 million grant; and several businesses, such as Kalaeloa Partners and Tesoro Petroleum, also chipped in with generous contributions.

The story of how Stone Family Early Education Center came to be is truly touching. In 1998, developer Jeff Stone lost his newborn son, Conner Jeffrey Stone, and also purchased the Ko 'Olina Resort & Marina. The loss of his son left Mr. Stone with a lasting impression and sparked a strong passion to provide for the most fragile and eager members of society, our keiki. As one door closed for the Stone Ohana, another opened when Mr. Stone was introduced to Seagull Schools' founder, Chuck Larson.

Seagull Schools began in 1971 as a private, non-profit corporation located in the Christ Church facility in Kailua, where it has continued to offer a rich educational experience for children of all socio-economic backgrounds. They have been a model collaborator with businesses and other nonprofits and are nationally recognized as pioneers in the development of intergenerational programs where children and seniors come together for their mutual benefit.


WEST OAHU FAMILY FAIR COMING SOON
