Internet Speed Test

Governor Abercrombie is forging ahead with the Hawai'i Broadband Initiative that was launched last August. The goal of this effort is to improve access and affordability of high-speed internet access around the state. As part of that Initiative, the state has created a website to collect data on residents' internet speeds. The plan is to identify areas where improvements need to be made. Governor Releases Construction Funding for UH West Oahu

I got word that Governor Abercrombie released \$92 million in construction funding on August 15th. Included in that amount were several projects that will continue improving the new UH West Oahu campus in Kapolei, which opened for classes on August 20th.

- \$2.5 million – sitework to complete the campus' first phase, including the creation of the Kaloi Gulch Greenway and fencing to protect a photovoltaic panel array
- \$1.25 million – construction of a 4-lane road that will serve as the main entrance to the campus
- \$900,000 – design of the Academy of Creative Media Building
- \$500,000 – design of the Allied Health Building

Queens to Buy and Reopen Hawai'i Medical Center – West

Great news this month that the State Health and Planning Development Agency approved Queen's Medical Center's plan to purchase and reopen the Hawai'i Medical Center – West (HMC-West) hospital in Ewa. As you know, HMC-West closed at the end of December 2011. This has left West Oahu without an acute-care hospital and has put a huge strain on other island hospitals to fill our emergency room service needs. Queen's will buy the hospital for \$73.2 million and plans to have it open for business by August 2013. They also plan to hire roughly 400 workers.

Asia Pacific Clean Energy Summit a Success

I participated in the 4th Annual Asia Pacific Clean Energy Summit, which was held at the Convention Center from August 13th to 15th. This year's theme was "Clean Energy Test Beds: Hawai'i and the Asia-Pacific Region." The Summit brought together government and energy industry leaders from 20 countries to focus on clean energy economic development. Some of the notable speakers were: Hideo Hato, President of Japan's New Energy and Industrial Technology Development Organization; Thomas Hicks, Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Energy; Jooho Whang, President of Korea Institute of Energy Research; and Dr. Kevin Geiss, Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Air Force for Energy. On the first day of the Summit, Governor Abercrombie signed a memorandum of understanding with the Secretary General of the China Council for the Promotion of International Trade (CCPIT). This agreement will allow CCPIT to refer Chinese clean energy investors and developers to our state Energy Office to facilitate investment in clean energy projects in the state.

Steve Fredette Honored for Service to St. Jude Catholic Church

I surprised Makakilo resident, Steve Fredette, with a certificate from the State Senate at a breakfast meeting of the **St. Jude Council #11293 of the Knights of Columbus** at the Wai-pahu Sizzler on August 5th. Steve was a fire fighter with the Air Force for 22 years. Since retiring in 2009, he has dedicated himself to protecting people and property from fire and other dangers at the Kalaeloa Airport. He has been married to his lovely wife, Kristin, since 2006. Outside of his work, Steve tries to help others in many ways. He is a very active and committed member of St. Jude Catholic Church. Thanks to the efforts of Steve and others who worked hard to fundraise, 7 parish youth were able to attend the L.A. Religious Education Conference and 2 other members were given college scholarships. Steve is a friendly face who can often be seen on parking duty at the church or helping to organize Lenten fish fry events. Steve has been a Grand Knight at St. Jude's for 2 years. He has set an exemplary standard of the four core principles that all Knights strive to achieve--charity, unity, fraternity, and patriotism. He used his own money and time to purchase and install an automated external defibrillator at St. Jude for cardiac emergencies. Steve will always be kindly remembered for spending time comforting fellow Knight Billy Ingalls while in the hospital before he passed away. Mahalo to Steve for his untiring service and dedication to St. Jude's Catholic Church and our community.



Teachers' Contract Negotiations Back on Track

I was pleased to learn that on August 20th the Hawai'i State Teachers Association and Governor Abercrombie had agreed to start contract discussions again with the assistance of a Federal Mediator. It was back in June 2011 the Governor imposed the state's "last, best, and final offer" after contract negotiations stalled. In January 2012, teachers rejected a contract proposal by a vote of 67% to 33%. Specific details of that plan were: pay restored in 2013 to 2009 levels, new teacher evaluations in July 2013, performance-based pay raises, no change in the 50-50 health insurance contributions, and four extra days off through June 2013. The same contract proposal was again voted on by teachers with 66% of them supporting it in May 2012. However, that vote was considered invalid by the Governor because it had previously been rejected and was no longer on the table. I'm hopeful this round of discussions with the Federal Mediator will bear fruit and our teachers will get a contract they are satisfied with.

2012 Live & Let Live/Drive Safe 4 Ewa/Kapolei Campaign Aims to Make Roads Safer

My office will be participating on the planning committee for the Live & Let Live/Drive Safe 4 Ewa/Kapolei Campaign once again this year. Some of the others helping out are HPD, Ewa Weed & Seed, Ewa Boys & Girls Club, Waianae Military Civilian Advisory Council, area legislators, Leeward District high schools, Neighborhood Security Watch groups, and community leaders. We held our first meeting at the Kapolei Police Station on August 21st. I'll be organizing a poster contest with Leeward District high schools for the 5th time. The purpose of the campaign is to promote driver safety on our roads, especially during the upcoming Christmas and Holiday Seasons. HPD recently shared some alarming statistics: about how 43 lives have been lost on 'Oahu roads so far this year. Twenty-two deaths were speed related and eight involved alcohol. Eight of the fatalities happened in West Oahu. We'll have sign-holding events leading up to the Holidays after our Kick-Off at the Kapolei Police Station grounds on December 1st from 8:00am to 11:30am. Let's work together to reduce accidents on our roads. Both Board members and Councilman Nestor Garcia have worked to get this important traffic signal on the City's priority list. I recently got word from the City's Department of Transportation Services that the traffic signal will be completed within the next two months. This is great news for traffic safety in Waipahu.




Asia-Pacific Center for Regenerative Design Brings First Permaculture Design Certificate Courses to Oahu



My office honored the Asia-Pacific Center for Regenerative Design on the completion of their third Permaculture Design Certificate (PDC) course. These were the first ever taught on Oahu. The PDC has been taught all over the world to thousands and had been offered on the neighbor islands for many years, but never on Oahu until now. My staffer, Donna Lay, presented Honorary Certificates from the State Senate on my behalf to PDC instructors, Matt Lynch and Hunter Heavilin, at the graduation ceremony of the most recent courses on August 12, 2012 at Waihuena Farm on the North Shore. The PDC is a 72-hour curriculum developed by Bill Mollison and David Holmgren in the 1980's to teach the foundation of sustainable and regenerative design.

The Asia-Pacific Center for Regenerative Design is a nonprofit organization based in Hawai'i founded to share regenerative design education, systems, and working models in the Asia-Pacific region. Based on the permaculture principles of *Earth Care, People Care, and Resource Share*, regenerative design seeks to observe, understand, and emulate healthy, productive ecological systems to create positive feedback loops that increasingly flourish over time, thus enabling human systems such as food production, urban environments, infrastructure, economics, industry and settlements, to renew their own energy and material sources to produce restorative impacts on their environments.
