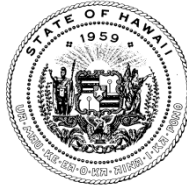

H.B. 459, H.D. 1
RELATING TO COMMERCIAL DRIVER'S LICENSE DISSQUALIFICATION FOR SEVERE FORMS OF TRAFFICKING IN PERSONS

House Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs

The Department of Transportation **supports** H.B. 459, H.D. 1 which will permanently disqualify from operating a commercial motor vehicle, individuals convicted of a felony involving a severe form of trafficking of persons while operating a commercial motor vehicle.

Effective September 23, 2019, Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) amended 49 Code of Federal Regulations Parts 383 and 384 to permanently disqualify from driving a commercial motor vehicle, individuals convicted of a felony involving a severe form of trafficking of persons, as defined in 22 United States Code (USC) 7102 (11) while operating a commercial motor vehicle. This definition is in section 2 of the bill. The federal amendments also mandate states to comply with the changes. The first year the State fails to comply will result in the withholding of 4% of funds required to be apportioned to Hawaii under USC 23, section 104(b), paragraphs (1) & (2). The second and subsequent years the State is out of compliance result in an 8% penalty. The dollar amounts that will be withheld respectively are \$6,185,220.00 and \$12,370,440.00.

This bill will put the State in substantial compliance with federal regulations. The FMCSA amendment sets a deadline of three years from the effective date of September 23, 2019 for States to come into substantial compliance with the Act as required by [49 USC 31311\(a\)\(15\)](#) which reads, "The State shall disqualify an individual from operating a commercial motor vehicle for the same reasons and time periods for which the Secretary shall disqualify the individual under subsection (b) – (e), (i)(1)(A) and (i)(2) of section 31310."

The Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration recently took steps of their own to combat this abhorrent situation, and we fully support its' further adoption by the State of Hawaii.
