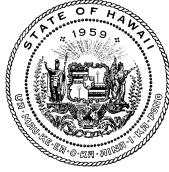

S.B. 246, S.D. 1

RELATING TO GOVERNMENT.

Chair McKelvey, Vice Chair Wildberger, and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify on S.B. 246, S.D. 1.

The Department of Accounting and General Services (DAGS) appreciates the intent of S.B. 246, S.D. 1 which establishes a state government alignment commission to periodically review State executive branch's departments, divisions, and agencies, including functions and services, and submit its findings and recommendations to the legislature. The DAGS offers the following comments:

1. Government needs to get more efficient.
2. Government should re-evaluate functions and duplication of efforts and assess the feasibility to consolidate and eliminate outdated processes.
3. Government should look at how technology can improve workflow and business processes that will mitigate risk and simplify getting things done to better serve the public.

4. Government needs to work with unions and update job descriptions of employees and help improve their knowledge and skills to match today's expectations. Employees should be compensated based on performance and being held accountable to achieve the results the legislature and administration are expecting.

DAGS has the following concerns:

- This bill does not provide for funding to achieve the intended results expected.
- The DAGS believes that the collective bargaining process is excellent to protect employee rights and provides a foundation of security for continued employment. Unfortunately, those same principles may produce counter results when trying to effect change, increasing duties to achieve more efficiency, and challenging employees to accept new and uncharted tasks that introduce risk.
- Consolidation of government to gain efficiency and results is a statewide initiative that will require all branches of government with a unified commitment to accept and practice the same principles of employment and accountability. Without unified support, silo and individual interests will prevail and produce inconsistent results from what the intended intent of this bill is trying to accomplish.

RELATING TO GOVERNMENT

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on Senate Bill (S.B.) No. 246, S.D. 1.

S.B. No. 246, S.D. 1, amends the HRS by adding a new chapter to Title 4 to establish a State government realignment commission, which shall be placed within the Department of Accounting and General Services for administrative purposes. The commission shall periodically review the State Executive Branch's departments, divisions, and agencies, including functions and services, and submit its findings and recommendations to the Legislature. The seven commission members are to be appointed and confirmed on or before July 1, 2022, and a new commission shall be appointed and confirmed on or before July 1 every ten years thereafter. The commission shall dissolve upon the adjournment sine die of the Legislature to which it submits the required evaluation and recommendations. Departments of the State government shall make available to the commission any data and facilities that are necessary for the commission to perform its duties.

B&F has concerns with S.B. No. 246, S.D. 1. A periodic, systematic, comprehensive review and report on all the State's Executive Branch departments, divisions, and agencies, including functions and services, will add significant staff support responsibilities to State departments since it appears that departments will need to provide substantial information to the commission. State departments may have some challenges with the burden of such increased information requirements on their regular workload. Further, State departments' time and resources, which will be needed for the research and submission of information to comply with this measure, may be better utilized for critical State operations and the delivery of program services.
