Chair Yamane and Members of the Committee:

My name is Ahlani Quiogue, and I am the Executive Officer of the Hawaii Medical Board (Board). The Board supports this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to clarify the definition of the practice of medicine to provide uniformity of practice for both medical physicians and osteopathic physicians.

This bill brings the definition of the practice of medicine to parity with the current practice of medicine and provides uniformity for medical doctors and osteopathic doctors. As the Committee is aware, the definition of the practice of medicine was last amended in 2008 by adding a separate, distinct definition of the practice of osteopathic medicine. The Board notes that medical doctors and osteopathic doctors receive the same education and training and should thus be treated equally. Further, the Board believes that this definition should be updated because the practice of medicine includes not only the treatment of disease, as the current definition provides, but also the prevention of disease.

Additionally, this bill deletes the proviso regarding care for the terminally ill because it is covered by a broader definition that now includes, among other things, palliative care. The addition of “surgery; manual medicine;”, “telehealth; the interpretation of tests, including diagnosis of pathology specimens, medical imaging, or any physical;”, “to diagnose, treat, prescribe for, palliate, or correct” disease, and “prevent any human disease, condition, ailment, pain, injury, deformity, illness, infirmity, defect, physical or mental condition” will encompass more activities of the current practice of medicine.

Chair Yamane and Members of the Committee:

My name is Esther Brown, and I am the Complaints and Enforcement Officer of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs' (Department) Regulated Industries Complaints Office (RICO). RICO supports this bill.

The purpose of this measure is to expand the scope of the practice of medicine and eliminate the distinction between osteopathic and medical physicians to promote uniformity in practice.

The practice of medicine is no longer limited to the treatment of disease and now includes telehealth, medical imaging, and preventing mental and physical diseases, conditions, injuries, and ailments. Expanding this scope of conduct will assist RICO in its enforcement responsibilities by providing tangible grounds for evaluating physician compliance with licensure laws, as well as enjoining a wider array of practices and behaviors as potential unlicensed practice of medicine.
