Bill Description: Removes the \$10 per visit per day cap on the dollar-for-dollar match received by Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program beneficiaries under the Hawaii Healthy Food Incentive Program, also known as the Double Up Food Bucks Program. Specifies that healthy proteins are eligible purchases under the program. Effective 7/1/2050. (SD2)

EXECUTIVE OFFICE ON EARLY LEARNING'S POSITION: Support the Intent

Good morning. I am Lauren Moriguchi, Director of the Executive Office on Early Learning (EOEL). EOEL supports the intent of S.B. 512 S.D. 2 and defers to the Department of Agriculture regarding program development and implementation.

EOEL is statutorily responsible for the development of the State's early childhood system that shall ensure a spectrum of high-quality development and learning opportunities for children throughout the state, from prenatal care until the time they enter kindergarten, with priority given to underserved or at-risk children.

According to the Scientific Report of the 2015 Dietary Guidelines Advisory Committee, healthy eating in childhood is important for children's growth and development and prevents various health conditions. The 2015-2020 Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommend that children ages 2 years and older follow a healthy eating pattern that includes fruits and vegetables, whole grains, fat-free and low-fat dairy products, and a variety of protein foods. Unfortunately, reports indicate that most children do not follow the recommendations set forth in those guidelines.

When COVID-19 hit the islands, it was clear that food insecurity has affected many homes. Young children who experience food insecurity may be at higher risk for health ailments as well as developmental risks and behavioral problems, including aggression, anxiety, and depression. All these issues impact the growth and development of our youngest children, impacting their ability to learn.

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) provides nearly 170,000 Hawaii residents with monthly benefits to purchase food. Nationally, almost half of SNAP beneficiaries are children. The popular national model, Double Up Food Bucks, which matches the purchase of locally-grown produce for produce, not only allows families and children access to healthy, nutritious food, but also supports local farmers. Additionally, DHS has indicated that as of January 2021, Hawaii experienced a 30.6% increase in households receiving SNAP benefits since the pandemic started in March 2020.

Because the EOEL Public Pre-K Program prioritizes underserved and at-risk children, we work with educators and families in the Program and across the early childhood system by providing them with information on resources that can help support their children’s health and well-being.

Recognizing the importance that nutrition plays in children’s growth, development, and learning experiences, the EOEL supports the intent of this bill, which would expand healthier food options through the Double Up Food Bucks Program to eligible families and children, while supporting local farmers, and invests in the local economy.

SB 512 SD2 – RELATING TO SUPPLEMENTAL NUTRITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM INCENTIVES

Chair Yamane, Vice Chair Tam, and members of the House Committee on Health, Human Services, and Homelessness:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of the intent of SB 512 SD2 relating to augmenting access to the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP).

The College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR), by way of its Human Nutrition program, has responsibility for SNAP Education via the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa (UHM), CTAHR Cooperative Extension Service. Therefore, CTAHR has a vested interest in this bill as it will affect our educational programs.

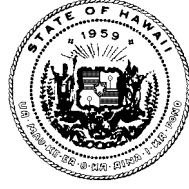
The State of Hawai'i, by initiating the Double Up Food Bucks program, made a significant impact on the health, nutrition, and poverty of citizens of Hawai'i. This current bill expands the value of the Double Up Food Bucks program by allowing recipients to use SNAP funds at a farmer's market, farm stand, mobile market, a community-supported agriculture project, grocery store or other direct retailer. Expanding access will only further assist those in need by making available more sources of nutritious food; while supporting Hawai'i agriculture. We recommend language be added to expand the use of SNAP resources at any of the food outlets mentioned above, when they are compliant with the food safety criteria of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Otherwise, the health objective of this bill could be compromised.

The bill's language says that the SNAP match can be used exclusively to buy Hawai'i-grown fresh fruits and vegetables. This puts an unrealistic onus on the recipient to search out specific sources of food. The primary purpose of the SNAP program is to effect the health and nutrition of those experiencing hard times. That should remain the main purpose of the SNAP and the Double Bucks program. We believe that assisting Hawai'i agriculture will be an obvious outcome when Hawai'i agriculture enhances its crop production.

UHM and CTAHR supports the intent of SB 512 SD2, but provides comments relative to food safety and the requirement to buy only Hawai'i-grown produce.

The University supports the intent of this bill as described above but is aware of the current financial climate of the State of Hawai'i and realizes that state funding is reduced. For the next fiscal biennium, the University of Hawai'i Board of Regents approved a budget request for the University that was flat, and did not seek any increased funding to the University. UH defers to the Hawai'i Department of Agriculture on their priorities.

DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services (DHS) supports the intent of this bill. DHS defers to the Department of Agriculture as to program development and implementation, and budget needs.

The Senate Committee on Agriculture and Environment made technical amendments, the Senate Committee on Ways & Means, removed the appropriation section and defected the date, and the House Committee on Agriculture passed the measure unamended.

PURPOSE: The purpose of the bill removes the \$10 per visit per day cap on the dollar-for-dollar match received by supplemental nutrition assistance program (SNAP) beneficiaries under the Hawaii healthy food incentive program, also known as the double up food bucks program. Specifies that healthy proteins are eligible purchases under the program. Effective 7/1/2050.

As of February 2021, 106,310 Hawaii households received SNAP benefits, a 33.6% increase since the pandemic started in March 2020. The Hawaii Healthy Food Incentive Program dollar-for-dollar matching program helps SNAP participants increase their purchase of

fresh fruits and vegetables by doubling the value of their benefits spent on Hawaii-grown fresh fruits and vegetables, supports local farmers, and keeps food dollars in the local economy.

SENATE BILL NO. 512 SD2
RELATING TO SUPPLEMENTAL NUTRITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM INCENTIVES

Chairperson Yamane and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to present testimony on Senate Bill 512 SD2. This bill removes the \$10 per visit per day cap on the dollar-for-dollar match received by Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) beneficiaries under the Hawaii Healthy Food Incentive Program also known as the Double Up Food Bucks Program (DA BUX) and specifies that healthy proteins are eligible purchases under the program.

The Department of Agriculture supports the bill to expand the double up food bucks program and will administer the program as provided in the bill to make locally-grown fruits and vegetables, and healthy proteins sold at farmers' markets, grocery stores and community-supported agriculture projects accessible to families or individuals who reside in this State and who receive assistance through the federal SNAP funding.

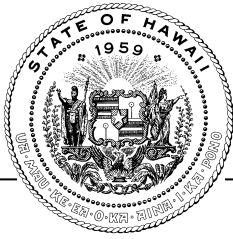
The DA BUX Program authorized by Act 153/SLH 2019 was appropriated \$50,000 which when leveraged through The Gus Schumacher Nutrition Incentive Program and CARES Act award matched by Philanthropy resulted in \$2.4 million in funds for redemptions for the DA BUX program by SNAP beneficiaries.

Since the launch in June 2020 of the statewide program, there have been 119,051 redemptions by unique household by County through December 15, 2020. Total redemptions



for DA BUX through January 2021 are estimated at \$1.4 million and the funds are expected to be exhausted by June 2021. This expectation is based on The Department of Human Services reporting a total of 197,958 SNAP recipients in February 2021, which is an increase of 30% compared to 152,252 recipients in February 2020 and an additional 18,753 recipients reported during the last six months, from September 2020 to February 2021.

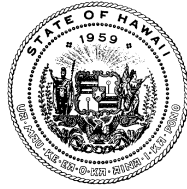
The Office of Planning **supports** SB512, SD2 that removes the \$10 per visit per day cap on the dollar-for-dollar match received by supplemental nutrition assistance program beneficiaries under the Hawaii healthy food incentive program, also known as the Double Up Food Bucks program and specifies that healthy proteins are eligible purchases under the program.

The Office of Planning's newly-established Statewide Sustainability Program recently held a series of public meetings in the Fall of 2020 to update the Hawai'i 2050 Sustainability Plan, which was revised by Act 146, SLH 2019 to "serve as the state's climate and sustainability strategic action plan."

Through this timely statewide public outreach during the COVID-19 global pandemic and its corresponding economic impacts, Hawai'i residents raised the vital importance of and need for: community food security, access to locally-produced food, and the availability of USDA certified food processing facilities. The need to improve Hawai'i's local food production and rural community food security was prevalent in nearly every Hawai'i 2050 Sustainability Plan public meeting.

This expansion of the Double Up Food Bucks Program (DA BUX Program) will help to increase SNAP beneficiaries' access to fresh and healthy dietary options and support the efforts of the agricultural industry. In addition to increasing fresh and healthy food options for hungry families, an expansion of the DA BUX Program will support economic revitalization efforts and household food security by incentivizing the purchase of locally produced foods.

1 **Fiscal Implications:** The Department of Health (DOH) defers to the Department of Agriculture
2 (DOA) regarding the implementation and fiscal impacts of this bill, and to the priorities set forth
3 in the Executive Budget Request.

4 **Department Testimony:** The DOH supports Senate Bill 512, Senate Draft 2 (S.B. 512, S.D. 2)
5 to expand the double up food bucks program administered by the DOA to make Hawaii-grown
6 fruits and vegetables, and healthy proteins sold at farmers' markets and grocery stores accessible
7 to families or individuals who reside in this State and who receive assistance through the federal
8 Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). This measure would remove the \$10 per
9 visit per day cap on the dollar-for-dollar match received by SNAP beneficiaries and adds healthy
10 proteins to the program.

11 Major health authorities (including the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Centers for
12 Disease Control, and the World Health Organization) recommend increasing fruit and vegetable
13 intake as a means to prevent chronic disease and improve overall health.^{1,2,3} However, access to
14 fresh produce for income-limited individuals can be difficult and is one of the reasons why they
15 often have poorer diets and higher rates of chronic disease than middle class and wealthy

1 individuals.^{4,5} This bill expands the double up food bucks program and removes the \$10 per visit
2 per day cap enabling SNAP recipients to double their purchasing power when they use their
3 benefits to purchase local fruits and vegetables, and healthy proteins.

4 Nutrition incentive programs similar to the one proposed in this bill are prevalent around
5 the United States, with twenty-eight states currently implementing a double up food bucks
6 program. In Hawaii, less than one in five adults reported eating five or more fruits and
7 vegetables a day (2015 Behavioral Risk Factors Surveillance System). Hawaii has the highest
8 cost of living in the nation with food costs that are 82% higher than the national average.⁶
9 Nutrition incentives are often touted as a “win-win-win” for farmers, families, and local
10 businesses. Data from these interventions have shown improvements in dietary behaviors,
11 reduction in household hunger and food insecurity, and increased sales of local produce (by more
12 than their dollar value alone).^{7,8,9} As a result of previous efforts around double up food bucks
13 between 2018 and 2020, the number of all SNAP-participating households in Hawaii with access
14 to a double up food bucks retailer near their homes increased by 272%.¹⁰ By the end of 2020,
15 program expansion resulted in two-thirds (77%) of all SNAP-participating households having a
16 double up food bucks retailer within a reasonable shopping distance of their homes.¹¹ The DOH
17 supports S.B. 512, S.D. 2 as one component of a comprehensive approach to improve the
18 availability and accessibility of healthy foods to improve health outcomes for people in Hawaii,
19 especially for those who face greater health disparities.

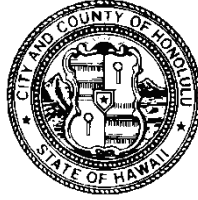

Chair Yamane, Vice Chair Tam, and Members of the Committee:

The City and County of Honolulu Department of Community Services supports SB 512 SD2, which removes the \$10 per visit per day cap on the dollar-for-dollar match received by Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) beneficiaries under the Hawaii Healthy Food Incentive Program, also known as the Double Up Food Bucks Program, and specifies that healthy proteins are eligible purchases under the program. Furthermore, makes an appropriation to the Department of Agriculture to expand funding for the program (SD2).

According to the State of Hawaii Department of Human Services report, and as referenced in the State of Hawaii Department of Agriculture's testimony dated February 5, 2021, there were 189,285 SNAP benefit recipients in December 2020, compared to 154,377 recipients in December 2019. This represents an increase of 19.54% attesting to the growing demand for food among our most vulnerable families in the State.

Therefore, removing the cap will not only increase the purchasing power of individuals and families to access fresh fruits and vegetables, but also support the local economy as more dollars are spent to address food security. Furthermore, the Bill will encourage increased leveraging of matching dollars and scaling of the Program for greater impact.

Dear Chair Yamane, Vice Chair Tam, and Members of the Committee:

The City and County of Honolulu (City) Office of Climate Change, Sustainability and Resiliency (CCSR) **supports and offers comments on** Senate Bill 512, SD2 which expands the Double Up Food Bucks program administered by the Hawai'i Department of Agriculture by removing the cap of \$10 per day in dollar-for-dollar match funding for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) beneficiaries through Double Up Food Bucks and expanding match funding eligibility to Hawai'i-grown healthy proteins.

In the O'ahu Resilience Strategy,¹ the community and City recognized the importance of an affordable future for our island with goals of reducing additional cost burdens and improving economic opportunity for residents. Additionally, with the passage of City Ordinance 20-47, CCSR is committed to encouraging community alignment to increase food security through its food security and sustainability program, especially to frontline communities that have historically lacked access to healthy and affordable local food supplies.

Prior to COVID-19, food insecurity was a persistent problem on O'ahu and throughout the State, and the pandemic has only exacerbated this issue. Per Aloha

United Way's 2017 ALICE report, even when income, government assistance, and non-profit food assistance were combined, there was still a 29 percent gap in resources for all Hawai'i households to meet the basic ALICE threshold for food, and eating less healthy food was among the main coping strategies for households struggling to remain food secure.² By making SNAP dollars go further on healthy, locally grown foods, SB512, SD2 can help not only fill that resource gap, but also help make healthy food more affordable and accessible to our low-income families.

CCSR further notes that SB512, SD2 is essential to pandemic recovery efforts, complementing work being done at the City level to support the intersection of food assistance and local agriculture. The majority of O'ahu's farms—707 out of 927, or about 76 percent—are between one and nine acres, and the majority are family-owned.³ Investing state dollars in locally-grown produce through increasing the purchasing power of SNAP recipients will grow the economic viability and market penetration of these small local farmers, as well as other local agricultural institutions. In this way, SB512, SD2 supports local job retention and growth while strengthening the local food economy.

SB512, SD2 is therefore essential to supporting affordability through economic and food security measures while simultaneously circulating more dollars in the local economy. However, given the importance of the Double Up Food Bucks program, CCSR recommends including language that identifies a funding mechanism for this measure, by either reinserting language from the original version of this bill that appropriated an unspecified amount of funding to the program, or including language that allows the program to leverage additional, alternative sources of funding, such as (1) funds from federal, state, private, or other funding sources; and (2) investments from public or private investors. Without funding provisions, this bill will be unable to deliver on its promise to either our local agricultural producers or our low-income families.

Aloha Chair Yamane and Members of the Committee:

My name is Keali'i Lopez and I am the State Director for AARP Hawai'i. AARP is a membership organization of people age fifty and over, with nearly 145,000 members in Hawai'i.

AARP Hawai'i supports S.B. 512, SD2 which expands the double up food bucks program administered by the Hawaii department of agriculture to make fresh fruits and vegetables sold at farmers' markets and grocery stores accessible to families or individuals who reside in this State and who receive assistance through the federal supplemental nutrition assistance program.

The COVID-19 pandemic amplified the food insecurity (a consistent lack of food due to inadequate financial resources) facing many kupuna who suddenly found themselves home-bound; unable to shop for groceries due to fear of exposure and facing empty grocery shelves from the panic buying, and loss of support from unemployed family members and access to congregate meal sites. However, we realize that many were struggling to purchase food even before the pandemic. Hawaii's high cost of living makes it difficult especially for people on fixed income in making ends meet.

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program is an important anti-hunger program and a vital lifeline for millions of Americans, including adults ages 50 and older at risk for food insecurity. In December 2020, there were over 189K SNAP recipients in Hawaii, a 20% increase from the year before. There are still more eligible individuals who could benefit from this program. Expanding this food assistance program through the double bucks program incentives double the purchasing power for healthy, Hawaii—grown produce, and while benefiting local farmers and Hawaii by keeping dollars in the local economy.

Thank you for the opportunity to support the intent of S.B. 512, SD2.

The Land Use Research Foundation of Hawaii (LURF) is a private, non-profit research and trade association whose members include major Hawaii landowners, developers, and utility companies. LURF's mission is to advocate for reasonable, rational, and equitable land use planning, legislation and regulations that encourage well-planned economic growth and development, while safeguarding Hawaii's significant natural and cultural resources, and public health and safety.

LURF appreciates the opportunity to express its **support of SB 512, S.D.2** and of the various agricultural stakeholder groups who defend the goals of viable agricultural operations and the conservation and protection of agriculture, including important agricultural lands in Hawaii. The bill demonstrates the need for, and benefit of collaboration amongst different sectors of the community - business, government, and agricultural stakeholders - and the importance for them to work together cooperatively to improve the economic viability of the State's agricultural industry.

SB 512, S.D.2. This purpose of this measure is to expand the Double Up Food Bucks Program administered by the DOA to remove the \$10 per visit per day cap on the dollar-for-dollar match received by SNAP beneficiaries, thereby making fresh locally grown fruits and vegetables sold at farmers' markets and grocery stores accessible to families or individuals who receive assistance through the federal supplemental nutrition assistance program.

LURF's Position. Expansion of the Double Up Food Bucks Program not only helps low-income Hawaii residents by promoting the consumption of healthy, locally grown food, but also assists farmers, ranchers and other stakeholders who own, maintain, and engage in agricultural enterprises, and who consider incentives such as that proposed by this bill significant to the conduct of their operations to help sustain their businesses, as well as to increase local food self-sufficiency and significantly heighten local food production in this State.

As this Committee is aware, the unsustainable costs which have already been cast upon agricultural stakeholders over the past years by various safety and security standards, programs and regulations, as well as the enactment of onerous regulations relating to water systems, infrastructure, and growing and processing machinery and facilities, are now greatly exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic, proving to be overwhelming, if not devastating to the agricultural industry and the long-term objective of sustainable agriculture.

Agricultural stakeholders therefore believe SB 512, S.D.2 will assist in the effort to achieve long-term sustainability of Hawaii's food supply and economic growth.

By promoting consumption of healthy food, recognizing the significance of assisting the local agriculture industry, and implementing incentives which help to support the growth and maintenance of agriculture in the State, this bill significantly helps to promote economically viable agriculture and food self-sufficiency in Hawaii.

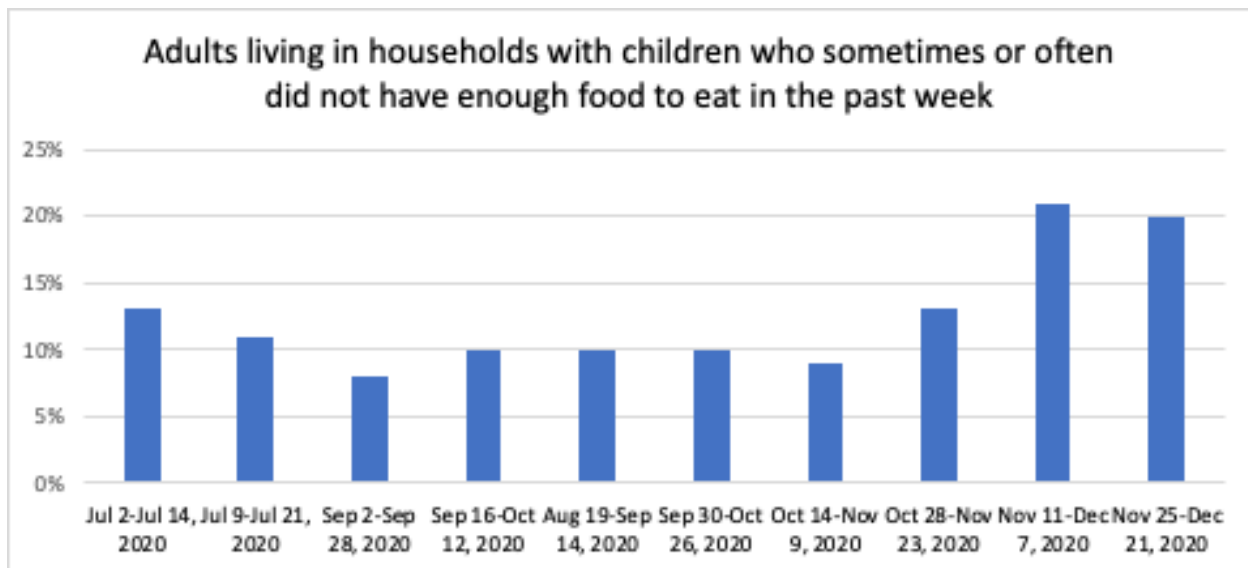

'Ohana Health Plan offers our **support** of SB 512 SD2, which removes the \$10 per visit per day cap on the dollar-for-dollar match received by Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program beneficiaries under the Hawaii Healthy Food Incentive Program, also known as the Double Up Food Bucks Program. Specifies that healthy proteins are eligible purchases under the program.

'Ohana Health Plan is a wholly owned subsidiary of Centene Corporation, a leading multi-national healthcare enterprise committed to helping people live healthier lives. Since 2008, 'Ohana Health Plan has provided government-sponsored managed care services to families—from keiki to kupuna—and individuals with complex medical needs primarily through QUEST Integration (Medicaid), Medicare Advantage and Medicare Prescription Drug Plans across the state.

As a Medicaid health insurer, many 'Ohana Health Plan members qualify for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits. During the COVID-19 public health emergency, the Hawaii Medicaid program saw an increase in enrollment due to the economic downturn. In December 2020, Hawaii had the highest unemployment rate in the nation at 9.3 percent. There were also more than 189K low-income SNAP recipients in the state, which is a 20 percent increase from 2019.

The Double Up Food Bucks program offers a solution to three pressing issues in Hawaii during the pandemic:

1. It makes healthy foods more affordable and feeds hungry families.

2. It supports local farmers by incentivizing the purchase of locally-produced food.
3. It simulates economic activity by keeping food dollars within the local economy.

The removal of the \$10 cap will encourage increased spending of SNAP dollars on local foods. SNAP spending helps to stimulate the economy during economic downturns, as these food dollars are often quickly spent for necessities and are federal dollars entering the state's economy. These dollars ripple throughout the supply chain, supporting farmers, retailers, and food distributor employees. Each SNAP dollar has an economic multiplier of 1.79, which means every SNAP dollar spent at food retailers contributes \$1.79 to Hawaii's economy.

Each free DA BUX incentive dollar issued has an economic multiplier of 2.3, which means every incentive dollar spent at food retailers contributes \$2.30 to Hawaii's economy.

HPH writes in support of SB 512, SD2 which removes the \$10 per visit per day cap on the dollar-for-dollar match received by supplemental nutrition assistance program beneficiaries, also known as the double up food bucks program.

HPH recognizes the strong connection between access to healthy foods with health and wellness. Hawai'i Pacific Health was pleased to contribute a cash match to support the 2019-2021 GusNIP-funded Double Up Food Bucks incentive fund. We chose to support the program to both encourage strengthening local food systems and allowing snap recipients to access good nutrition.

Through the national double up food bucks program, Hawai'i has the opportunity to expand access to healthy foods for low-income residents who are eligible for supplemental nutrition assistance program benefits. Fresh fruits and vegetables are an integral part of a healthy diet and central to the prevention of obesity and chronic disease. While every community should have access to fresh and healthy dietary options, the high cost of fresh produce often makes that difficult. This challenge is felt acutely by participants in the federal supplemental nutrition assistance program, a low-income population that struggles to afford healthy food. The double up food bucks program is a viable model that supports local farmers, helps low-income families that receive double the purchasing power for healthy, Hawaii-grown produce, and benefits Hawaii by keeping dollars in the local economy.

Expanding the double up food bucks program to make fresh fruits and vegetables sold at farmers' markets and grocery stores accessible to low-income residents who receive assistance through the federal supplemental nutrition assistance program is a holistic approach to supporting a healthier community as well as our local economy.

The American Heart Association supports the intent of SB 512, SD2 but suggests amendments. We ask that the original allocation of funding to maintain and potentially grow SNAP “Da Bux” programs be added back to the bill, and **that “healthy proteins” be more clearly defined.**

The Hawaii State Legislature in 2019 invested \$100,000 to supplement local grants to fund Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) incentive programs known in Hawaii as “Da Bux.” Da Bux supplements SNAP funding and incentivizes the purchase of locally grown fresh produce by SNAP recipients. The State’s investment was subsequently matched by an additional almost \$900,000 in local private grants and matched again through a federal GUSNIP matching grant bringing the total available for Da Bux programs to approximately \$2 million. By the end of 2020, program expansion resulted in more than two-thirds (77%) of all SNAP-participating households having a double-bucks retailer within a reasonable shopping distance of their homes. Then COVID-19 hit.

By Spring of 2020, the popular Da Bux funding was quickly being depleted as unemployment rates skyrocketed and more Hawaii residents became SNAP recipients. By summer, the American Heart Association and its health partners advocated to Governor Ige to supplement existing Da Bux funds with funding from federal CARES Act relief funding. In October, the Governor released an additional \$500,000 for the program which was again matched by local private grants. Even with that additional funding, Da Bux program funds are expected to be depleted by June 2021. Additional state funding, matchable by private grants and federal GUSNIP program matching funds (Congress recently allocated an additional \$75 million for matching funds) is needed to maintain, and potentially grow the program to make it available to a broader geographic area of Hawaii SNAP recipients. Currently, only Times and KTA supermarkets participate in the Da Bux program, along with some local farmers markets. Foodland Supermarkets has expressed interest in adding its 32 stores throughout the state to the program which would expand its availability to geographic areas currently not served, but additional program funds are needed for that to occur so as not to quickly deplete funds available for existing retail outlets.

The “Da Bux” program matches SNAP dollars spent on locally produced fresh fruits and vegetables with a financial benefit to local growers and food retailers. Low-income families bring home more healthy food, area farmers gain new customers and make more money, and more food dollars stay in the local economy. Food markets participating in the program have seen increases in fresh produce sales. In addition, state supplemental funding would be potentially matched by federal funding adding yet another benefit to Hawaii’s investment in these important programs.

For more than 50 years, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP – formerly Food Stamps) has been vital in addressing food insecurity and nutrition in the United States. It impacts health, educational attainment and economic self-sufficiency, and helps more than 45 million Americans struggling through underemployment and low or stagnant wages. The majority of benefits go to households with children, older adults or those with disabilities.

Food insecurity and poor nutrition remain problems for millions of American households. Research shows that SNAP benefits are often not adequate to last a family the entire month. A 2016 report by the Food Research and Action Center summarized the important role SNAP plays in addressing food insecurity. Importantly, the majority of SNAP recipients who are eligible for work do so while on the program, underscoring that many recipients are using the program to overcome underemployment or temporary job loss.

Although diet quality has been steadily improving in the U.S. during the past two decades, overall dietary quality is still poor. Most significantly, there is a widening gap associated with education and income. Despite the important role SNAP plays in addressing hunger, additional data indicate that SNAP recipients have worse diet quality than income-eligible non-participants. The incentives provided through “Da Bux” programs are helping to change that.

The American Heart Association does recommend an amendment to Section 2 (b) in SB 512 that reads “to be used exclusively for the purchase of Hawaii—grown fresh fruits and vegetables, or healthy proteins that are eligible for supplemental nutrition assistance as determined by the program,...” The Association feels that “healthy proteins” should be better defined to follow national dietary recommendations that limit consumption of proteins that can increase risk for heart disease and stroke.

American Heart Association guidance states:

“In general, red meats (beef, pork and lamb) have more [saturated \(bad\) fat](#) than chicken, fish and vegetable proteins such as beans. Saturated and trans fats can raise your blood cholesterol and make heart disease worse.

The unsaturated fats in fish, such as salmon, actually have health benefits. [Omega-3 fatty acids](#), found in fish and some plant sources, as part of a heart-healthy diet, can help reduce the risk of heart failure, coronary heart disease, cardiac arrest and the most common type of stroke (ischemic).

There are many types of beans – pinto, kidney, garbanzo, soybeans, etc. – and they’re all good for you.

Tips for People Who Like Meat

- *It's OK to eat meat as long as you limit the amount and choose healthier types.*
- *One portion of meat is two to three ounces or about the size of a deck of cards.*
- *Choose lean cuts of meat. Lean cuts usually contain the words "round," "loin" or "sirloin" on the package.*
- *Minimize processed red meats like bacon, ham, salami, sausages, hot dogs, beef jerky and deli slices."*

Therefore, we suggest this policy language, based on USDA guidelines, be used to define "healthy proteins" allowable under the Hawaii SNAP incentive program:

"Healthy protein" means lean meats, lean poultry, eggs, seafood, beans, peas, lentils, nuts, seeds, and soy products, with no added sugar or sodium.¹ Lean meats and lean poultry is defined as any meat or poultry that contains less than 10 grams of total fat, 4.5 grams or less of saturated fats, and less than 95 milligrams of cholesterol per 100 grams and per labeled serving size, based on the United States Department of Agriculture's definitions for food label use.²

By incentivizing the purchase of proteins without defining which proteins are considered "healthy" there is a danger that SNAP recipients might overconsume unhealthy choices, thereby reducing the intended health effects of the original intent of the "Da Bux" program—to incentivize more consumption of healthy fresh produce. Better definition of which "healthy" proteins would be covered by "Da Bux" state funding would help to reduce that risk.

It's important to note that any state or private funding used to apply for federal matching funds would not be allowable for the purchase of proteins and would only be able to be used for the purchase of fresh produce, the original intent of the program. Federal funding would also be limited to the purchase of produce.

Finally, we understand that finding funding during this difficult budget crisis will be challenging. However, the recent passage of federal relief funding legislation is expected to help address the state's budget concerns. We hope, at minimum, that legislators will be able provide funding to maintain existing "Da Bux" programs through this budget cycle. The rough estimated total cost to maintain existing programs will be \$4,250,000 to support fruit and vegetables incentives discounts


from July 2021-Aug 2023 (that figure could be met through combined state, private and federal funding). That would support approximately 12,500 Hawaii SNAP customers per month.

The estimated investment to add Foodland's 32 stores to the program will be \$7,240,000 to support fruit and vegetables incentives discounts from July 2021-Aug 2023. That would support a total of approximately 24,500 Hawaii SNAP customers per month.

The state Department of Human Services reported that the number of residents receiving SNAP benefits has risen from about 155,000 in 2019 to 179,000 in October 2020, a 15.4% increase.

The Association urges legislators to consider the American Heart Association's suggested amendments to SB 512, SD2 to help reduce health disparities in our state by expanding access to fresh fruit and vegetables to those who might be economically challenged to afford access to those foods vital to improved health and reduced obesity.

Chair Yamane, Vice Chair Tam, and committee members, thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony on SB 512 SD2, which removes the \$10 per visit per day cap on the dollar-for-dollar match received by Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program beneficiaries under the Hawaii Healthy Food Incentive Program, also known as the Double Up Food Bucks Program.

Kaiser Permanente Hawai'i SUPPORTS SB 512 SD2.

Kaiser Permanente Hawai'i is Hawai'i's largest integrated health system that provides care and coverage for approximately 260,000 members. Each day, more than 4,400 dedicated employees and more than 600 Hawai'i Permanente Medical Group physicians and providers come to work at Kaiser Permanente Hawai'i to care for our members at our 20 medical facilities, including Moanalua Medical Center, providing high-quality care for our members and delivering on our commitment to improve the health of the 1.4 million people living in the communities we serve.

Food insecurity and poor nutrition remain problems for many of our residents. Research shows that SNAP benefits are often not adequate to last a family the entire month. SNAP recipients who are eligible for work do so while on the program, underscoring that many recipients are using the program to overcome underemployment or temporary job loss.

Addressing food insecurity is a critical focus area for Kaiser Permanente. In 2020 Kaiser Permanente invested \$300,000 in grants to community-based organizations to support programs which increase food security for pregnant and postpartum mothers in low-income, underserved communities; and for Native Hawaiian communities on Maui and Molokai. Kaiser Permanente also provided a grant to the Department of Education's Hawaii Child Nutrition Program to increase participation in USDA food programs. In addition, Kaiser Permanente has hosted 16 community food distributions that provided over 280,000 pounds of food to more than 7,000 local families,

and also conducted text message campaigns to targeted populations to raise awareness of eligibility and enrollment in SNAP.

Kaiser Permanente Hawai‘i supports the SB 512 SD2 because it will increase the buying power for low-income families to fresh fruits and vegetables. This helps reduce food insecurity while concurrently supporting our local farmers, food distributors and retailers.

We ask the committee to PASS SB 512 SD2. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify on this important measure.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in **STRONG SUPPORT** of **SB 512**, which would remove the \$10/day purchasing cap under the Healthy Food Incentive Program.

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) is our country's most effective stimulus program, generating an estimated \$1.79 in economic activity for every \$1 spent.¹ Since the start of the pandemic, the number of Hawai'i SNAP recipients has increased from 154,000 in December 2019 to 189,000 in December 2020—a nearly 20 percent increase, resulting in a total of over \$700 million spent at Hawai'i food markets last year.

The Hawai'i Healthy Food Incentive Program keeps even more of those dollars circulating in the local economy for a longer amount of time, increasing the multiplier effect to over 2 percent.² Without it, many SNAP shoppers would still not be able to afford locally grown fruits and vegetables. This results in most of these economic stimulus funds leaving the islands—right into the pockets of major mainland food companies, rather than getting channeled into our local food and agriculture businesses. This program is an impact investment for the State, channeling much-needed capital into local businesses and farms.

The economic impact of SNAP incentives is hard to overstate. On top of the economic benefits detailed above, there are additional federal funds available for the program, which can only be unlocked through a match. While we understand that the appropriation was removed due to budget constraints, we're still hopeful of obtaining the match from Hawai'i's philanthropic community, and appreciate the state's former economic support.

The HPCA **SUPPORTS** Senate Bill No. 0512, Senate Draft 2, RELATING TO SUPPLEMENTAL NUTRITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM INCENTIVES.

AlohaCare appreciates the opportunity to provide testimony in **support** of SB512 SD2. This measure would expand the Double Up Food Bucks Program administered by the Department of Agriculture established in 2020, which enables SNAP recipients to double their purchasing power through a dollar for dollar match when they buy locally grown produce.

Founded in 1994, AlohaCare is a community-rooted, non-profit health plan serving 73,000 Medicaid and dual-eligible health plan members on all islands. It is the only state health plan exclusively serving Medicaid patients. Our mission is to serve individuals and communities in the true spirit of aloha by ensuring and advocating access to quality health care for all. We believe that health is about supporting whole-person care, including access to housing and food security, to build a stronger, healthier Hawaii.

The Double Up Bucks program has been especially critical during the pandemic. As of December 2020, there were 189,000 SNAP recipients, an increase of more than 20% from the previous year, and this number continues to rise. The program enables individuals and families to increase their ability to purchase healthy foods, generates income for local farmers, and benefits our local economy. By the end of 2020, program expansion resulted in more than 77% of all SNAP-participating households having a double bucks retailer within a reasonable shopping distance of their homes.

Statewide success has been a collaborative effort. All who contributed believe that healthy people are the fabric of strong, healthy communities. A variety of local funders contributed \$500,000, matching the state's \$500,000. That \$1M was matched by the federal government. In total, \$500,000 turned into \$2M for purchasing healthy, local foods, helping families, and positively impacting our local economy. Each \$1 SNAP generates \$1.79 of economic activity, which means \$2M generates \$3.58M of economic activity.

In the spirit of collaboration, we respectfully request for this committee to please consider reinserting the appropriation section in order to increase the fiscal amount that would be eligible for federal matching funds.

SB512 SD2 removes the \$10 cap per day and allows for the purchase of local, SNAP eligible healthy proteins. This measure increases a consumer's purchasing power, and it increases the money to local farmers, all of which positively impacts our local economy. Most importantly it increases access to healthy foods supporting Hawaii's families enabling them to more easily choose health for themselves and their families.

SNAP participation has increased drastically in the past year. In a time, when so many are faced with a multitude of health challenges, increasing access to healthy foods is critical. We hope that you support the health our state by passing SB512 SD2 to ensure this important program will continue to serve our community.

We are a Hawai'i-focused impact investment firm that strives to improve quality of life throughout the islands by helping our communities become more resilient and self-sufficient through locally produced food; renewable energy and clean transportation; and better management of freshwater and waste.

Ulupono strongly supports SB 512 SD 2, which removes the \$10 per visit per day cap on the dollar-for-dollar match received by Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) beneficiaries under the Hawai'i Healthy Food Incentive Program, also known as the Double Up Food Bucks Program. This bill also specifies that healthy proteins are eligible purchases under the program.

The Hawai'i Healthy Food Incentive Program is statutorily housed within the Department of Agriculture, who has partnered with The Food Basket to administer the program. This program is designed to increase SNAP household purchases of locally grown fruits and vegetables at grocery stores, farmers markets, mobile markets, retail outlets, and community-supported agriculture (CSA) subscriptions statewide. DA BUX, as the program has been labeled, has been instrumental in supporting local families, farmers and ranchers, and the economy during natural disasters and times of emergency, as has been the case during this pandemic. With increased SNAP eligibility due to unemployment and economic struggles, DA BUX incentives increased exponentially throughout 2020, starting at \$9,943 in January to \$164,678 in December (\$27,491 was attributed to expansion of DA BUX to include ground beef and eggs with CARES/philanthropic funds). Attached to our testimony is a 3-page flyer that sheds some light into the benefits of the program.

We recognize that you face many difficult decisions this year to balance the budget in the midst of this economic crisis, but we hope that this support for local agriculture and those suffering from hunger in our community can be considered. We strongly support moving

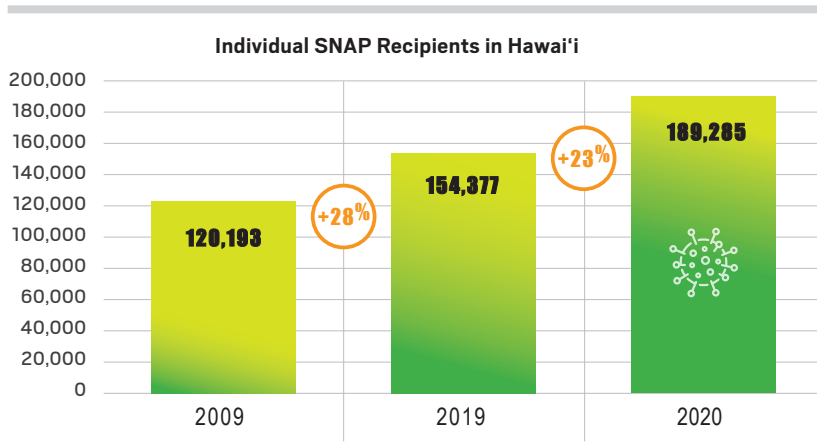

SNAP DA BUX Expansion Proposal

Feeding communities by uplifting local farmers

HAWAI'I IMPORTS APPROXIMATELY 90% of its food and has food costs that are 82% higher than the national average. Dependence on food imports threatens the sustainability of food producers throughout the islands and places the entire population directly at risk of food shortages in the event of pandemics, natural disasters, and economic disruptions. Furthermore, with the highest cost of living in the nation, Hawai'i has the highest unemployment rate at 9.3%, and 11% of its population received *Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program* (SNAP) before the pandemic.



THE PROBLEM

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the resulting unprecedented unemployment, there has been an enormous increase in SNAP participation and significant losses sustained by local farmers. Due to loss of employment and income, the actual increase of individual SNAP recipients in the state was nearly 35,000, representing a 23% increase. Meanwhile, Hawai'i's local agricultural food producers are losing an estimated \$2 million in sales per week as a result of the shutdown of restaurants and hotels. This situation creates a significant need to help feed low income families AND support local agricultural food producers.



THE SOLUTION

Invest **\$2.5 million** of state funds to bring in additional federal funds in order to expand and extend the statewide DA BUX Double Up Food Bucks program. In fall 2020, a combined commitment of \$500,000 from philanthropic partners was matched by the State of Hawai'i – thereby raising a total of \$1 million to grow the existing DA BUX program. **Based on the projected spend down rate, current funding of the DA BUX program will last through June 2021.**



By the Numbers

- 90%** Imported Food
- 82%** Higher Food Costs
- 1st** Highest Unemployment Rate in the Nation
- 11%** Received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Before COVID-19

PROJECT CONCEPT

The program offers SNAP participants a DA BUX Access Card or voucher at point of sale that doubles their purchasing power when they buy locally grown fruits and vegetables – \$10 of SNAP benefits would be worth \$20 of Hawai'i grown produce. Thus, each \$1 funded into the program provides \$2 worth of local food purchases.



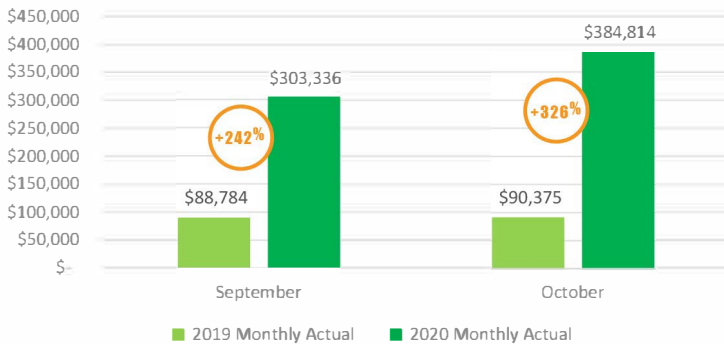

A \$2.5 MILLION INVESTMENT OF STATE FUNDS toward DA BUX Double Up Food Bucks can potentially generate an economic impact of \$23 million and spur 3x additional funding that supports local farmers (\$7.5 million).

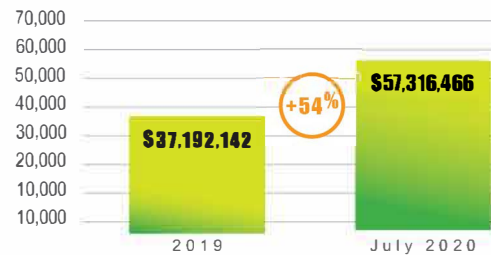

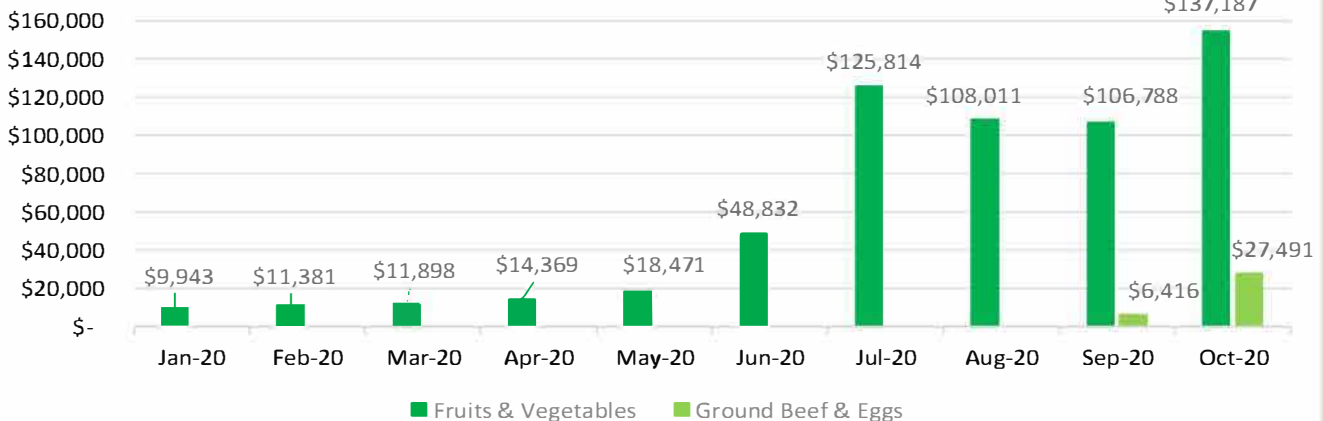

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawaii Farm Bureau supports SB 512, SD2, which removes the \$10 per visit per day cap on the dollar-for-dollar match received by Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program beneficiaries under the Hawaii Healthy Food Incentive Program, also known as the Double Up Food Bucks Program. It also specifies that healthy proteins are eligible purchases under the program.

SNAP offers nutrition assistance to eligible, low-income individuals and families, increasing their food purchasing power and improving their nutrition. SNAP also provides economic benefits to farmers participating at farmers' markets, roadside stands, CSA programs, grocery stores, and other food retailers.

Some of HFB's farmers' markets participate or have participated in the SNAP program. We believe that access to locally grown fresh fruits, vegetables, and protein to low-income individuals and families provides benefit to both SNAP participants and Hawaii farmers and ranchers.

Aloha Chair Yamane and Vice Chair Tam,

I have had the pleasure of managing the "DA BUX Double Up Food Bucks" program since its inception in August 2017. We started small on the Big Island with four farmers markets and two KTA Super Stores locations. As of today, there are 80 DA BUX retail locations statewide. As we grew, we collaborated with veteran "double bucks" programs across the state to unify them under the DA BUX brand, including programs run by Kokua Kalihi Valley, Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center, and Sustainable Molokai. Together with a handful of other community-based organizations, we formed the 501(c)(3) non-profit Hawai'i Good Food Alliance to strengthen the leadership guiding DA BUX implementation and to pursue other statewide initiatives that re-build community food systems.

Given the broad-based support for DA BUX, I firmly believe the program is providing a critical benefit for families and farmers suffering financial hardship due to the COVID-19 pandemic. While data on unique participants cannot be captured by most of our DA BUX retailers' point-of-sale software, we do know 77% of SNAP households in the state—41,939 households—live within normal shopping distance from a DA BUX retail location, according to a recent study conducted by Dr. Vanessa Buchthal of UH Manoa's Office of Public Health Studies.

Widespread DA BUX accessibility is encouraging SNAP recipients to shop at these participating retailers and purchase more local fruits and vegetables. In an analysis of thirty of our participating grocery stores, these stores experienced a 167% increase in revenue from SNAP purchases of local produce. And within the subset of seven grocery stores that

were able to track unique SNAP customers, these stores experienced a 165% increase in unique SNAP customers purchasing local produce (these percentage increases were calculated using December 2020 data compared to the monthly average for 2019).

The removal of the \$10 daily incentive cap on “Hawaii Healthy Food Incentive Program” State funds that can be issued to a DA BUX participant and the inclusion of healthy proteins as eligible items will expand SNAP beneficiaries’ purchase power to afford local foods, including higher-priced cultural foods like ‘ulu, taro leaves, and poi.

In December 2020, when DA BUX was awarded CARES Act funds to temporarily increase the incentive cap to \$50 per day and include local ground beef, eggs, and seafood as eligible items, the average incentive issued per SNAP customer per day was **\$21.44** (this calculation was based on available data reported by six participating retailers). Clearly, SNAP households can benefit from a higher cap above the current \$10 limit.

I fully support the passage of SB 512 SD2. I believe it will incentivize the spending of federal SNAP dollars on locally-sourced foods and stimulate growth in our state’s food and agriculture industry. I respectfully ask your committee to pass this bill. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

Chair Yamane, Vice Chair Tam, and members of the House Committee on Health, Human Services, and Homelessness.

I strongly support SB 512, SD2, especially in combination with a suite of policy options which I think can synergistically increase their collective impact and cost-effectiveness for local food producers, consumers, and taxpayers.

Removing the cap on the amount of healthy local food SNAP beneficiaries can purchase is one of several policy initiatives that can level the playing field--for local food producers who want to target local markets--with externally subsidized, artificially cheaper, and less medically healthy, as well as less environmentally friendly, imported food.

These policies include:

- food hubs**
- below fair-market land rental or purchase costs**
- one-time upfront ag infrastructure subsidization**
- exemption from state and local taxes on in-state food sales (e.g. the GET exemption enjoyed by ag exports from Hawaii), and**
- "buy local first" mandates for taxpayer-funded and subsidized institutional bulk food buyers.**

Collectively, when combined with increased use of "vertical" and urban food production capacity--ranging from commercial for-profit and community-based non-profit to neighborhood and household DIY local self-reliance--

these initiatives could gradually replace ever more imported food,

thereby **synergistically improving economies of scale for local food production for local consumption**

while also potentially keeping billions of dollars circulating in the local economy,

instead of being exported to buy imported food,

which would further amplify the local economic multiplier effect,

thereby further increasing the cost-effectiveness of this suite of policies, i.e.

the "bang for the buck" for local producers, consumers, and taxpayers.

Finally, I think the collective positive impacts of these measures could be enhanced even more if combined with more novel ways to increase affordable housing--e.g.

- Self-sufficient "Kauhale Villages" built with much faster and cheaper 3D-printed housing construction techniques, starting on Hawaiian Home Lands

which could cost-effectively further reduce both the cost of housing as well as Hawaii's over-dependence on imported goods.

Hawaii Foodbank *strongly supports* SB 512, which appropriates funds to the Hawai'i Healthy Food Incentive Program also known as Double Up Food Bucks program. This bill removes the \$10 per visit per day cap on the dollar-for-dollar match received by Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) beneficiaries and expands the program to allow beneficiaries to purchase healthy proteins such as local beef, eggs, and fish. Our mission as a food bank is to ensure that no one in Hawaii goes hungry, and this bill helps achieve that—providing local fruits and vegetables to those who otherwise could not afford it.

In April 2020, Hawaii Foodbank launched the Direct Purchase Produce Program in partnership with the Hawaii Farm Bureau with two goals in mind. The first goal is to help support local farmers and ranchers; the second is to provide local and healthy fruits, vegetables, and protein to the community. We have since spent more than 1 million dollars on more than 1 million pounds of produce. This partnership helped us respond to the needs of community in light of the COVID-19 pandemic and has shown us first-hand how programs similar to ours - such as the DA BUX Double Up Food Bucks program - are crucial, especially during particularly trying times. Many families who were already struggling are now also faced with a loss of income and faced with having to choose between paying their rent or buying healthy food. These families will often choose housing over having something healthy to eat. This bill will give the families the dignity of healthy choice.

The COVID-19 pandemic has confirmed the need for bills that not only benefit our community by helping our most vulnerable populations but also support our farmers - who are crucial suppliers to our islands' food supply chain.

The Obesity Prevention Task Force, a program of Hawai'i Public Health Institute¹, is in **Strong Support of SB 512, SD2**, which expands the Hawai'i Healthy Food Incentive Program by allowing the program to include healthy local proteins and removing the daily \$10 cap.

Double Up Food Bucks is a triple win for families, farmers, and the local economy.

The Hawai'i Healthy Food incentive program, also known as DA BUX Double Up Food Bucks (DA BUX), provides a dollar-for-dollar match on locally produced fresh fruits and vegetables for SNAP recipients. Through this program, low-income families are able to bring home healthy food, local farmers gain new customers and bring in more income, and more food dollars stay in the local economy.

Incentivizing the use of SNAP dollars for fresh fruits and vegetables not only stretches food dollars for families, but it also brings home nutritious food that the entire family can enjoy. Crediting SNAP dollars creates room in the families' budget for other household and healthcare expenses so that food dollars can be spent on locally grown food such as taro, papaya, Hamakua mushrooms, and other produce instead of cheaper, unhealthy alternatives.

While a \$10 match can purchase a SNAP household \$20 of local produce, Hawai'i families can benefit from a higher cap. Many struggle to feed multiple-generation households and to afford higher-priced cultural foods like 'ulu, taro leaves, and poi. During the pandemic, families are purchasing food in larger quantities as they reduce their trips to the grocery store to minimize their exposure to COVID-19.

DA BUX provides a strong return on investment.

In 2019, the Hawai'i State Legislature provided \$100,000 in funding to expand the DA BUX program statewide. This small investment grew to a nearly \$2 million through matches from philanthropic organizations and federal government. This funding allowed the program to expand to over 60 new retail locations, greatly increasing SNAP participants' access to the program. After the expansion, more than two-thirds (77%) of all SNAP-participating households having a Double Up Food Bucks retailer within a reasonable shopping distance of their homes, a 272% increase from 2018 to 2020ⁱⁱ.

SNAP itself is a program that is proven to stimulate the economy during economic downturns, as the food dollars are often quickly spent for necessities. These dollars ripple out to throughout the supply chain, supporting farmers, retailers, and food distributor employees. SNAP dollars have a multiplier effect, meaning that just \$1 of SNAP will generate \$1.79 in economic activityⁱⁱⁱ. In 2020 alone, DA BUX food retailers issued over \$978,000 of incentive discounts, translating to \$1.9 million in local food purchases. Removing the \$10 daily cap will encourage increased spending of SNAP dollars on local food.

The demand for DA BUX has risen significantly as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Hawaii's tourism-dependent economy has been devastated by the pandemic, with the highest rate of unemployment in the nation at 9.3% in December 2020^{iv}. There has also been a dramatic uptick in SNAP recipients – over 189,000 SNAP recipients in the state, a 20% increase from the year before^v. In December 2020, SNAP sales of incentivized local produce at 30 participating DA BUX grocery stores increased 167% compared to 2019 average sales.

DA BUX's focus on locally grown produce helps to feed hungry families healthy foods while supporting the local agricultural industry. The pandemic has created a paradox where food producers saw a decrease in revenue as tourism industry-dependent hotels and restaurants closed, while food banks faced unprecedented demand from the thousands of unemployed workers. Studies have found that a lack of food security is associated with diet-related chronic disease such as diabetes and high blood pressure^{vi}. Supporting local agriculture also aligns with the renewed calls to increase local food production and decrease Hawaii's dependence on imported goods for a more sustainable and resilient food system.

Double Up Food Bucks is a triple win for health, agriculture, and the local economy, and is a lifeline for many during the pandemic. We are in strong support of this measure and respectfully ask you to **pass SB 512, SD2** out of committee.

Lanakila Meals on Wheels is strongly in support of SB 512 which expands the double up food bucks program for food-insecure individuals and families. Lanakila Meals on Wheels is Hawaii's largest and only island-wide home delivered meal provider for kupuna and individuals with disabilities. In 2020, we launched a produce subscription service to make it convenient and affordable for our home-bound, meal recipients to receive fresh, local produce when they receive their meal delivery. The goal of the produce subscription service was to ensure our meal recipients—many of which rely on Lanakila Meals on Wheels as a primary source of food—have access to fresh fruits and vegetables to better their health and support Hawaii's farmers.

Approximately 70% of the kupuna and individuals with disabilities subscribed to our produce service utilize Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits to pay for their produce. With the double up food bucks program the produce subscription very affordable—just \$4 per produce bag. Because buying local tends to be more expensive than imported food. Our recipients have expressed how they would not be able to afford the local produce if not for SNAP and double up food bucks. The double up food bucks program makes it possible for kupuna and individuals with disabilities to enjoy the best our local farmers have to offer.

Please support Hawaii's kupuna and individuals with disabilities by passing SB 512 and ensuring they will be able to continue to enjoy local favorites like lychee, papaya, and apple bananas which bring them both health and happiness.

We ask you to support SB 512 SD2 which removes the \$10 per visit per day cap on the dollar-for-dollar match received by Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program beneficiaries under the Hawaii Healthy Food Incentive Program, also known as the Double Up Food Bucks Program and specifies that healthy proteins are eligible purchases under the program. We thank the legislature for passing Act 153 establishing the Double Up Food Bucks, known as “DA BUX”, Program in 2019. We support this bill which aims to address the socio-economic and health disparities that many of our lower income families experience. Health equity and access is one of many disparities that was highlighted as children and families navigated the challenges that the COVID-19 pandemic brought to our communities.

Health disparities continue to be exacerbated by the economic challenges brought on by COVID-19 and supporting healthy options will go a long way to strengthen not only the health of our community but the overall well-being of children and families for years to come. Health and socio-economic disparities plagued our communities and our families before COVID hit and have only increased. Families are experiencing food insecurity at alarming rates with families who have never needed the assistance seeking it for the first time. DHS has seen an increase in SNAP recipients of almost 20% since December of 2019, primarily as a result of growing pandemic stressors. The DA BUX program has already had over 100,000 redemptions and we can only expect the demand to increase.

As we seek to uplift individuals and families living in instability, we strongly support this bill which encourages healthy options for families and children. This program is a vital resource for families who are typically under-resourced and often forced to compromise when it comes to making healthy decisions for themselves and their families. This bill provides access to healthy food choices and supports healthy outcomes for children and families. Investments in prevention programs like this one can save on healthcare costs and other expenses in the long run.

As we look towards economic recovery and the potential for the expansion of economic drivers beyond tourism, this program will continue to stimulate our economy by keeping food dollars in Hawaii and support local agriculture. By encouraging the purchasing of locally grown produce, the program directly supports farmers and local businesses. While we understand that budget restraints are tight this year this program supports 1) families in need 2) long-term health outcomes 3) local agriculture and farmer and 4) local economy and economic recovery.

More than 40,000 households in Hawai'i struggle to put food on the table, and social safety net programs like SNAP help ensure that they can stay afloat.

I fully support the passage of SB 512 SD2. I believe it will incentivize the spending of federal SNAP dollars on locally-sourced foods and stimulate growth in our state's food and agriculture industry. I respectfully ask your committee to pass this bill.

PROBLEM

- Hawai'i imports approximately 90% of its food and has food costs that are 82% higher than the national average.
- In December 2020, there were over 189,000 low-income SNAP recipients in the state, a 20% increase from the year before.
- Hawai'i has the highest unemployment rate in the nation at 9.3% in December 2020.

POLICY SOLUTION

- SB 512 creates more flexibility in state funding provided to the DA BUX Double Up Food Bucks program by 1) removing the \$10 daily cap on incentives that can be issued to SNAP recipients for the purchase of local foods, and 2) allowing healthy local proteins to be eligible purchases.
- DA BUX Double Up Food Bucks offers a solution to three pressing issues in Hawai'i during the pandemic:
 - Makes healthy foods more affordable and feeds hungry families.
 - Supports local farmers by incentivizing the purchase of locally-produced food.
 - Stimulates economic activity by keeping food dollars within the local economy.
- The removal of the \$10 cap will encourage increased spending of SNAP dollars on local foods. SNAP spending helps to stimulate the economy during economic downturns, as these food dollars are often quickly spent for necessities and are federal dollars entering the state's economy. These dollars ripple throughout the supply chain, supporting farmers, retailers, and food distributor employees. [Each SNAP dollar has an economic multiplier of 1.79](#), which means every SNAP dollar spent at food retailers contributes \$1.79 to Hawaii's economy.

- [Each free DA BUX incentive dollar issued has an economic multiplier of 2.3,](#) which means every incentive dollar spent at food retailers contributes \$2.30 to Hawai'i's economy.
- While \$10 of State funding can purchase a SNAP household \$20 of local produce, our Hawaii families can benefit from a higher cap as many struggle to feed multiple-generation households and to afford higher-priced cultural foods like 'ulu, taro leaves, and poi. Additionally, families are needing to purchase food in larger quantities per grocery visit as a result of the pandemic—they are minimizing their trips to the grocery store to minimize their exposure to COVID-19 and are needing to purchase enough food to last them until their next grocery visit.
- The \$10 daily cap removal will better align with the flexibilities of the larger federal GusNIP grant providing funding to DA BUX and additional federal contributions that are anticipated.

CURRENT PROGRAM IMPACT

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 - Of this amount, over \$847,000 of incentive discounts were issued for local produce; this translates to \$1.7 million of local produce purchases.
- In December 2020, SNAP sales of incentivized local produce at 30 participating DA BUX grocery stores increased 167% compared to 2019 average sales.
