The historic Hawaii Theatre Center has played a significant role in Hawaii's cultural landscape since 1922, from its earliest days as a vaudeville house to its present incarnation as the states foremost historic performance venue. With 1,400 seats, the Theatre is the second largest proscenium performance facility in the state and the only remaining theatre of its type in Hawaii. After falling into disrepair and facing demolition by a wrecking ball, a group of concerned citizens formed the nonprofit organization Hawaii Theatre Center (HTC). In order to restore this historic treasure as a world-class presentation hall, over \$32 million was raised to acquire the property under the Theatre and adjoining properties. The beautifully restored Theatre reopened in 1996 with the mission to serve arts audiences, arts organizations and the community of Hawaii by:

Preserving Hawaii's historic Hawaii Theatre

Promoting Hawaiian culture and arts

Applicant: Hawaii Theatre Center

Presenting world class arts and cultural experiences

Providing arts education for Hawaii's youth

Creating a premier cultural destination at the Hawaii Theatre Center

Since 1996, HTC has served more than 2.5 million patrons of all ages, ethnicities and socio-economic backgrounds. In this past year, the Theatre has welcomed cultural programs, film screenings and other public events. HTC has continued to present performances with local, national and international performing artists.

### 2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The historic venue has not had a comprehensive exterior preservation treatment since 1996. As one of the earliest examples of poured concrete construction in the state, the building is ready for a significant repair and painting program that will repair areas where rusting rebar in the concrete walls will be removed, treated and then the concrete repacked. The exterior plaster surfaces will need to be removed, the concrete surface treated and plastered prior to being sealed and painted.

### GOALS:

- Preserve the 100 year-old concrete historic Hawaii Theatre building for the enjoyment of future generations
- 2. Provide economic support to the Chinatown Community through the continuation of arts programs held at the historic Hawaii Theatre
- 3. Enhance exterior of the historic Hawaii Theatre, one of the state's most photographed structures and iconic neon marquee, creating a strong brand presence for the state on a global stage
- 4. Ensure public safety by addressing concrete spalling and chipping of plaster surfaces that are being observed on the exterior of the building

### 3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Providing a safe, technically superb and sustainable venue for presenters and patrons will enable the Hawaii Theatre to continue to serve as the economic development catalyst for Chinatown, enhancing student learning, support of other non-profit organizations, sustain a historic landmark, and greatly enrich the lives of Hawaii residents and visitors well into the 21st century.

### 4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The project will benefit approximately 90,000 Hawaii residents and visitors to Oahu each year, including more than 10,000 students and their families; and an average of 30-40 presenters each year who bring their events to our historic Theatre,

including non-profit arts, cultural, civic and community organizations that perform at the Theatre at greatly reduced rates.

### 5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Located in the Downtown/Chinatown Honolulu, the historic Hawaii Theatre Center's primary geographic reach is the Island of Oahu, although Theatre patrons and performing artists come from across the state to attend many of the local, national, and international shows that do not travel to the others islands. The greatest impact of the Hawaii Theatre is with individual patrons on the island of Oahu. We have a database of more than 50,000 individual patrons on Oahu and patrons found on every major Hawaiian Island, as well as the United States mainland, Japan, Germany, Korea, China, the Philippines and Europe.

### **Project Scope:**

Exterior Painting: To pressure wash and paint the exterior walls, decorative columns, windows, doors, frames, railings, and metal stairs with one coat of specified primer and 2 coats of PPG Sunproof Exterior Finish. The stairwells will receive 1 coat of Amerlock Epoxy Primert and 2 coats of PPG devflex. Painting work along Bethel and Pauahi streets will require lane closures to allow for equipment access at the building exterior. Sidewalks will be closed and pedestrian and traffic control measure will be kept and maintained during the work and will be removed by the end of each shift.

**Spall Repair**: The concrete spalling on the exterior walls on Pauahi Street may be the result of having the most exposed to the weather elements including rain and wind. There may have been water intrusion issues that allow water to seep into the concrete and after a period of time, will eventually corrode the metal reinforcing within the concrete. The rust or corrosion will expand and create voids which results in the spalling issue. Repair work along Pauahi street will require lane closures to allow for equipment access at the building exterior. Sidewalks will be closed and pedestrian and traffic control measure will be kept and maintained during the work and will be removed by the end of each shift.

Cement Plaster Repair: There is approximately 500sf along the Pauahi Street Wall that needs to be repaired for safety reasons. In addition to the repairs of the windows, there will be sealant added to the window and door trim with Spika Flex 1a.

Water Damage Repair: There are number of window sill/frames that have affected by

extensive water damage and need to be replaced. Replacement sections will be profiled and matched to the existing to ensure that the historic elements are maintained.

**Bird Netting Repair**: Along the Pauahi Street wall, the current bird netting in the decorative archways and balcony balustrade have filled up with bird nests and debris that must be removed and the area treated, cleaned repairs, painted and the a new netting solution reaffixed to the frame.

**Bird Spikes**: To prevent further gathering of birds or other animals, bird spikes will be installs to ensure safety for all patrons, visitors and animals.

**Vertical Hawaii Signage Repair**: The stainless steel cables and steel sign attachments to the building are rusted, and are nearing the end of their useful life. After 26 years of exposure to the elements since they were last installed, these components will be evaluated for rehabilitation or replacement, and then finish painted where appropriate.

**Exterior Window Repair**: Several window sills and frames of both wood and steel construction are weather worn and required extensive repairs and then painting to ensure they are serviceable for future use. The sealants along the metal windows will be replaced to prevent water intrusion.

The work is anticipated to last for 5 months from the start of construction. The start of the project will depend on permit approvals.

The President and Chief Executive Officer, reports to the Board of Directors, and is responsible for all daily operations of the organization, including programs, facilities, programming, personnel and real estate.

The Theatre staff has a broad scope of skills and knowledge to administer and initiate programming and maintain the facilities. The Theatre has an exemplary history of exhibiting the capacity, skills, knowledge and experience necessary to complete major capital projects that comply with local building codes and preservation standards in a fiscally efficient and responsible manner.

Dunn is a former member of the Family Programs Hawaii Board of Directors, HDS Foundation and Hawaii Dental Service, Hawaii Alliance of Non-Profit Organizations, and the Waikiki Community Center. ### Avery Fukeda, Director of Development and Special Events

He brings a decade of combined experience in fundraising, event planning/management, high-level customer service, donor relations, and stewardship.

Avery is the interim lead on the Educational Programming series and works closely with all staff, partners and vendors to ensure the series is executed and achieves benchmarks. In addition, he is serving as the Centennial Celebration Director where he will oversee all aspects and components of the Centennial for the Hawaii Theatre.

An active young professional in the community, Fukeda serves on various non-profit boards including Aloha United Society of Young Leaders (President), Hawaii Pacific University Alumni Board (President), Hawaii Foodbank Alaka'i Young Leaders Board (Board Member & Event Chair), and Make-A-Wish Hawaii Wish Granting Committee (Member).

Through the generous support of the State of Hawaii Grant-In-Aid, the Hawaii Theatre Center has been able to achieve operation sustainability because the funding has allowed the Theatre to focus on attaining a break-even operation.

The renovations have allowed the Hawaii Theatre Center to increase the capacity on

the number of shows in the Theatre each year. This will allow the Theatre to keep up with the expenses. If funding is not secured, or not in the full amount, Hawaii Theatre Center may take a loan or postpone the project until funds can be raised.


