



The solar electricity and reroofed buildings will be used during school hours by the Public School children attending Innovations Public Charter School (240 students). During the evenings and weekends the facilities receiving these solar electrical and re-roofing upgrades shall be available to the community. After school and weekend services supported will be enrichment activities including music, dance, drama, gardening, cooking and cultural arts.

II. Background and Summary

Innovations Public Charter School Foundation (IPCSF) supports Innovations Public Charter School. The mission of IPCSF is to provide facilities, raise funds via capital campaigns, and to seek contributions to preserve the endowment for Innovations Public Charter School. IPCSF also seeks to improve community relations and invites the community to be part of the campus via school community partnership activities.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goal of this request is to seek funds for sustainable, environmental approach, green energy upgrades for the IPCSF Campus which include:

- Solar electricity system to create sustainable, clean energy for the entire 9.298 acre facility,
- Re-roofing of administrative building and adjacent after-school use / kindergarten building.

These sustainable, environmental approach, green energy upgrades will enable IPCSF to better serve the community. Innovations Public Charter School is located on 9.298 beautiful ocean view acres in the heart of Kailua-Kona. IPCSF is striving to utilize the campus as not only a top performing state charter school, but also as a thriving community center. The vision is to have community recreational facilities to serve all West Hawaii. In 2015, the Innovations Foundation installed a community soccer field, 3,000 sq. ft. pavilion and basketball court where afterschool and community teams can play and practice sports. In 2016, over one acre of new community gardens was planted. In 2022, a community recreational center pavilion is being constructed. This community recreational center pavilion will provide afterschool dance, music, drama, robotics, cultural arts, healthy cooking, and gardening classes. The recreational center will also be used by the school and garden teacher for healthy snack, lunch and afterschool meals. The recreational center construction costs are already fully funded. This request is for infrastructure upgrades which will allow for sustainable, green energy. Additionally, IPCSF will be replacing two roofs that are over 35 years old - all other buildings are new or have been fully renovated over the last five years.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Currently, Innovations Public Charter School serves 240 students (Kindergarten through 8th grade) in the heart of Kailua-Kona on the Big Island. Our rigorous project-based curriculum, rich in the arts and technology, has created and overwhelming demand for enrollment in our school. The sustainable, environmental approach, green energy improvements will allow us to better serve our community with weekend and afterschool programs throughout the year.

With the help of the West Hawaii community, Innovations has delivered excellence in education for the past 16 years. Innovations has received Public Charter School of the year, Most Improved Public Charter School of the year, and the Director of the Year Award. These awards were attributed to:

"Receiving a 20% higher performance rate for academic performance than comparable public schools in the same area as measured by the Hawaii State Assessment" - Innovations has small class size, rigorous project-based learning, and tutors in every classroom which translates to better student achievement.

"Strong willingness to partner with other schools and the surrounding community." - Innovations has partnerships with over 50 businesses in the community. All 7th and 8th grade students participate in community mentorships and service projects. 4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The community sustainable, environmental approach, green energy upgrades will serve all West Hawaii. The facility has the capacity and flexibility to serve all types of community groups. Community scouts, sports teams, community organizations and clubs will be invited to utilize the facilities. Additionally, numerous afterschool and weekend activities as well as healthy cooking classes and meals will be offered to Innovations' students and families, as well as open to the community at large. Innovations is a Title I school with over 55% of its students qualifying for free and reduced lunch.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

IPCSF is in the heart of Kailua-Kona. Innovations' students come from all over West Hawaii as far south as Ocean View and as far north as Waikoloa.

- October 2021- Board received cost and materials estimates for re-roofing of administrative building and adjacent after-school use / kindergarten building – Completed
- November 2021- Board worked to analyze energy usage and design the best location and system for upgrading to a solar clean energy facility – Completed

- August 2022 (Upon Funding) – Place ad in paper and advertise bid for both re-roofing and solar project. Begin competitive bid process for solar system and re-roofing
- October 2022 - Award all contracts for infrastructure upgrades.
- November 2022 - Secure all permits.
- December 2022 – Reroof buildings and install new solar system.
- January 2023 – Completion of project.

3. Describe its quality assurance and evaluation plans for the request. Specify how the applicant plans to monitor, evaluate, and improve their results; and

Innovations Public Charter School Foundation IPCSF secured in-kind, community donations, and commercial financing to purchase 9.298 beautiful fee simple ocean view acres in the heart of Kailua-Kona. With the help of community members, foundations and the USDA, Innovations has constructed over 30,000 square feet of state-of-the-art classroom, administrative and community recreational areas for its faculty, students and the West Hawaii Community.

All facilities are fully permitted and ADA compliant. The infrastructure upgrades are needed to keep the facility in excellent condition and provide green energy. The infrastructure upgrades will be the final piece tying in the gardens, soccer and basketball courts and outdoor pavilions and over 30,000 square feet of buildings together.

Innovations' Foundation board will take the same great care to provide the best quality infrastructure at the least cost to the state and community. The actual construction will be a bid process compliant with the Foundation's and the State of Hawaii procurement policies. All board members are non-compensated individuals that have no financial interest or conflict of interest in the project.

The IPCSF Board and Leadership Team have established a Construction Committee lead by Lee Nelson, Business Manager, Ed Rapoza, Board Member, William Wong, CPA, Board Member and Schel Leatherman, Board Secretary. The Building and Construction Committee will act as the agent to 1) manage contracts, 2) obtain permits, 3) review progress of construction, 4) review the quality of construction, including arranging interim inspections, 5) process clarification requests and produce submittals, 6) approve contractor payment requests, 7) ensure that all processes follow applicable laws and policies related to procurement of construction.

IPCSF has an independent financial audit performed annually.

The IPCSF strives to provide the best, state of the art facilities, for Innovations Public Charter School students and the West Hawaii Community to utilize in their journey of becoming lifelong learners and community contributors. Innovations' goal is to provide the highest quality facilities at the least cost to the state and the community.

The Construction Committee coordinated by Lee Nelson, Business Manager, Ed Rapoza, Board Member, William Wong, CPA, Board Member and Schel Leatherman, Board Secretary will review all proposals and make final recommendations to the board regarding the selection of general and subcontractors and to provide oversight of all phases and aspects of the project. The construction committee will meet regularly with contractors to keep abreast of progress, and ensure that any difficulties, both anticipated and unanticipated, will be resolved optimally to ensure the project continues on schedule.

The construction committee will prepare monthly budget to actual reports as well as track timeline progress.

After the construction is complete, the Foundation will log all community use of the facilities. The usage log will depict all those in the community benefiting from the community recreational facilities.

Innovations has a successful history of fund development. The foundation has purchased 9.298 acres and constructed over 30,000 sq. ft. of classroom and community use space.

We have been fortunate to be funded by Cooke Foundation, Atherton Foundation, Bill Healy Foundation and Change Happens Foundation. If a recipient of this grant in aid we will leverage the award by applying to our funding partners for additional landscaping and playground equipment to complete our campus and community facilities.

No other funds have been secured for this project. For the contract period 2/01/2020 – 1/31/2023, IPCSF received a \$200,000 State Grant Aid for a community recreational pavilion. For fiscal year 2022, IPCSF Received a \$5,300 County Grant in Aid to support its student wellness programs.

The IPCSF Board is composed of 50% real estate and financial experienced professionals including certified public accountant, real estate developers and business owners,

The IPCSF Board secured and purchased 9.298 fee simple ocean view acres in Kailua Kona. The board has previously built and/or retrofitted over 30,000 square feet of classroom and administrative space for the school and community. The board is currently going out to bid for a community recreational pavilion that is being funded by a state GIA. The project is progressing well with an estimated completion date of August 31, 2022. We have had no major issues and have met all state GIA contract requirements.

2. Facilities

Currently, IPCSF has a 9.298-acre campus with over 30,000 sq. ft. of buildings. All buildings are ADA compliant and comply with all state, county and school building codes. This project will be to install a solar electricity system to create sustainable clean energy for the entire 9.298 acre facility and also to re-roof the administrative building and adjacent after-school use / kindergarten building. This project will benefit the foundation campus by creating clean energy and replacing the two 35-year-old roofs of the original campus buildings – all other buildings have new roofs.

Lee Nelson has an extensive financial background which includes several construction industry projects. She has been managing Innovations' campus growth and expansion for the last fifteen years. She was integral in the financing and solicitation of funds for the 30,000 sq. ft. Innovations' Elementary Campus. William Wong, CPA, has served on the Innovations' Foundation Board for twelve years. He has been involved in several community and development projects and will be in charge of financial oversight for the

project. Ed Rapoza, has served on the Innovations Foundation board for seventeen years. Ed Rapoza is a commercial real estate development specialist. Ed will be responsible for ensuring timelines are met, overseeing quality of construction and interfacing with architect/project manager and general contractor.

IPCSF has no employees. There will be a competitive bid process for the construction phase following the IPCSF and State of Hawaii procurement requirements. The IPCSF board shall oversee the process.

Wong CPA, PFS, CVA, Mr. Wong graduated from the University of Hawaii with a degree in Finance with emphasis in Business Economics and attended the UH Graduate School of Business. He was honored and named the National winner of the U.S. Small Business Administration's Accountant Advocate of the Year in 1999. He has served as the Taxation Chair of the Governor's Task Force on Regulatory Relief and as a member of the Taxation Working Group of the Economic Revitalization Task Force for the State of Hawaii. He is a Certified Public Accountant, Personal Financial Specialist, Certified Valuation Analyst, and a Registered Investment Advisor.

Schel Leatherman, Secretary - Schel graduated from Stanford University with a BS in Biology. She has extensive experience with multiple school districts and educational philosophies. She is currently owner and operator of Kona Wine Market.

Kimberly Yamasaki, Board Member - Kimberly graduated from Chaminade University with a degree in business. She works as the office and accounting manager for Wes Thomas Associates.

Ed Rapoza, Board Member - Owner of Island Land Company Inc. Mr. Rapoza has extensive experience with residential and commercial real estate development. His skills include project marketing, sales, management, and operations. He brings to the

board expertise in the logistics of working with various governmental agencies, developers, and the business community.

Rebecca Morton, Board Member - Rebecca trained at Lines Institute of Choreography and the San Francisco Ballet before moving to Kona in 1996 to teach as West Hawaii Dance Academy. She has been a real estate broker since 2001. She is currently a broker for Coldwell Banker Real Estate.

Christina Collins, Board Member - Christina Collins is a physician in Kailua-Kona. She graduated from Dartmouth College in 1991. She brings both health and business expertise to the board.

Lee Nelson, Volunteer-Business Manager, Lee Nelson graduated from the University of California at Santa Barbara with a degree in Business Economics. She worked as a certified public accountant for Deloitte specializing in hi-tech companies for five years. She owned her own accounting and financial management services practice in Southern California servicing start up internet companies until 2004. In 2006, she joined the Innovations Public Charter School in the role of Business Manager.
