

Kanu o ka 'Āina Learning 'Ohana (KALO), a 501(c)3 since 2000, provides Native Hawaiian education and cultural experiences to Hawaii students in Pre-Kindergarten through its Malamapokii Preschool, Kindergarten to 12th graders attending Hawaiian focused charter schools across the state, through in- and out-of-school and summer school programming focusing on educational and socio-emotional well-being and college and career readiness, to aspiring Hawaii teachers through Kahoiwai Teacher Licensing Program, and for aspiring charter

school administrators via a Masters in Educational Leadership with Chaminade University of Honolulu. KALO also adds to Hawaii's educational research agenda by supporting four Ph.D. candidates.


KALO programs are accredited through the Western Association of Schools and Colleges or World Indigenous Higher Education Consortium and licensed/contracted by the Hawaii Teacher Standards Board, Hawaii Charter School Commission and Department of Human Services.

Each educational opportunity recognizes and supports the unique cultural and educational prerequisites of Hawaii's children and incorporates multi-generational knowledge and expertise of Native Hawaiian *kupuna* (elders) and cultural practitioners. KALO strives to nurture the needs and passions of students through educational and developmental learning experiences designed to advance the educational and cultural growth of participants.

Since its founding more than twenty years ago, KALO has emerged as a leader for the Hawaiian Focused Charter School (HFCS) movement providing advocacy and legislative support for all seventeen of the state's Hawaiian focused charter schools and the remaining charter schools statewide. KALO was instrumental in establishing an alliance of Hawaiian focused charter schools, Nā Lei Na'auao, sponsoring and facilitating participation of all alliance members, students and parents in annual conferences held on different islands throughout the state. A key component of these conferences includes visits to *wahi pana* (special places) and community service activities such as clean-up of sacred sites which aligns with project and place-based philosophies that guide Native Hawaiian educational institutions. The annual conferences provide a venue for sharing successes, cultural performances, and facilitating collective decision-making on important issues confronting these schools and communities.

Located in the rural community of Waimea on state lands on the Island of Hawaii, KALO has a diverse range of expertise in the Hawaiian language, cultural revitalization, Indigenous education, community sustainability, and non-profit management. Central to its belief system is a commitment to supporting children by revitalizing Hawaiian culture, language, and traditions and ultimately moving toward thriving communities. For over two decades, KALO has developed and nurtured a family of innovative programs, culturally driven and responsive to community needs through its Pedagogy of Aloha providing culturally relevant, academically rigorous education in a values-based learning environment where learners of all ages are cared for and challenged to meet high expectations.

KALO has benefited Hawaii by directly serving 102,000 participants through its programs. KALO has brought in \$88 million in other than Hawaii general funds, over the past 21 years and disbursed and served all the Hawaiian islands contributing to the economy and Hawaii education. CW Associates, CPA's external audit of KALO's financial management have validated through its "Ratio Analysis of Program Service Expenses to Total Expenses" that KALO uses more than 85% of its funding on direct program expenses. Additional audit ratios clarify KALO is a good investment and are available upon request. The graph below shows KALO's direct cumulative reach:



The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goal and objective of this project is to support KALO's financial viability by paying off its debt service for its community educational facilities owed to the United States Department of Agriculture Community Development. The facilities are used to house KALO's main office and provide educational programs to all ages ranging from preschool to students seeking master's degree in educational leadership and doctoral degrees.

The public purpose and need to be served;

The Covid-19 pandemic devastated communities across the globe, sparing neither large cities nor rural areas. Our community saw significant job loss, deteriorating mental well-being, educational setbacks, and increased family strife as the pandemic mandated isolation and demolished our economy. In May of 2020, Hawai'i claimed one of the nation's highest unemployment rates at nearly 22 percent and today boasts the highest unemployment rate in the nation at 8.1 percent (U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, 2021). Mandated isolation has exacerbated an already tenuous mental health crisis.

Dramatic changes in community well-being and family dynamics will likely have lasting effects on adult and children's mental health as they deal with grief from personal losses, food insecurity, economic hardships, and basic day to day survival. School communities have been profoundly changed. It is vital that educators and Hawaii educational organizations prepare to address the social and emotional well-being of their community of learners and re-focus them on

personal growth and emotional health to facilitate a smooth transfer back into safe, secure, and familiar learning environments.

KALO intends to ameliorate the impacts of these adversities utilizing a strengths-based approach incorporating academic and cultural practices implemented through our learning networks across Hawaii. This investment in KALO would allow \$682,000 in annual debt service payments to USDA to be reinvested in Hawaii communities through our educational programs and services.

All ages of students, from early learners to kupuna who are bettering their lives by committing to advancing their education to give back to Hawaii and serve our communities.

KALO recognizes the resilience and fortitude of Hawaii students and families throughout the pandemic and hopes to utilize their cultural assets to reduce the adverse impact of COVID-19. By building on community strengths, by engaging students across its network in meaningful activities that lead to thriving, resilient, children and families empowered by a renewed sense of purpose and well-being.

KALO has done the heavy lifting and hopes the legislature is willing to invest in KALO's mission to allow it to further serve Hawaii's communities with educational opportunities. KALO's annual audits with no findings validate its contribution to Hawaii's educational endeavors and attest to KALO's willingness to manage programs, funds, and facilities. This

request will be successful with one payment of \$11,200,000 to the US. Department of Agriculture unless the legislature funds the payments otherwise.

KALO designed Kauhale 'Ōiwi o Pu'ukapu as an intergenerational, culturally based learning destination located in the green pastures of Waimea on Hawai'i Island. Kauhale aligns with the State's needs for: creating jobs and income security, providing long term economic growth, empowering community development, addressing energy and the environment, improving the quality of life, and investing in public infrastructure.

The goal of Kauhale is to improve academic/job skills, facilitate the building of community learning networks, enhance knowledge and opportunities by establishing a locus for the perpetuation and advancement of Hawaiian culture and education. Utilizing computers and other technological tools, Kauhale's programs reach those who are isolated and serve as a major resource in the community; helping students, parents, families, and community organizations strengthen their capacities. Kauhale is a community asset providing individuals and community groups the resources to increase their self-sufficiency while building rural economic development and empowerment.

- 2013 the American Institute of Architects, Honolulu Chapter Jack C. Lipman Members' Choice Award.


