Strategy will direct implementation and growth of home and community-based services on island, ultimately improving health outcomes of elderly adults and lowering the overall cost of care.

II. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background:

The mission of 'Ohana Pacific Foundation (OPF), a 501(c)(3) corporation, is caring for kūpuna. This includes our clients, their families, our staff, and our community. OPF owns and operates Kaua'i Adult Day Health Center (KADH) which is currently located at the Līhu'e Christian Church, at 2943 Kress Street, Līhu'e, Hawaii 96766. The center provides a program and nursing care, if necessary for the elderly and/or disabled adults in the community by offering a well-rounded and stimulating program of recreational, social, creative, educational, and therapeutic activities. KADH offers a safe and protective environment in which impaired older adults who do not require intuitional care may receive preventive, remedial, and restorative services. The service also provides respite to caregivers by freeing their time for other activities while their family member is cared for in a supervised environment for the day.

OPF also represents the non-profit arm of 'Ohana Pacific Health, the largest post-acute care organization in the state of Hawai'i. A local company with local values, 'Ohana Pacific is seeking to meet the demand of care offered to elderly patients statewide. They are aiming to develop improved support through transitions of care for kūpuna. The company's vision is to transform the continuum of care which includes how services are offered, financed, and delivered so that as a health care community, we can best meet the desires and needs of kūpuna and their families. On the island of Kaua'i, the organization already offers a base of services for kūpuna to experience during their care journey including skilled nursing care, rehabilitation, home health services and an adult day health program.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

Goals:

The goals of this phase of OPF's improvement of the continuum of care are:

- 1. Identify gaps in continuum of care for kūpuna, their caregivers and their families on the island of Kaua'i.
 - Through relationships and partnerships with other existing resources, data-gathering will occur to inform the strategic planning process. Data will include both qualitative and quantitative information from all parties involved in the health care delivery system for elderly.
- 2. Develop a community-wide strategy to address the identified issues and fund operations.
 - The intergenerational, collaborative strategy to impact transitions in care and work to honor and care for our kūpuna will focus on building sustainable resources that will support the community and families on Kaua'i for future generations.
- 4. Build and implement a roadmap for strategy implementation and sustainability.
 - Using OPF's already existing resources, staff and operations, the organization will take the lead on ensuring quality care for elderly through their care journey.
- 3. The public purpose and need to be served;

The public purpose of this grant is to improve the continuum of care for elderly individuals and their families on Kaua'i by building a comprehensive strategy to identify gaps in care and develop a roadmap to build a sustainable healthcare workforce. This workforce will expand home and community-based services on island, ultimately improving health outcomes, educating on preventative methods and lowering the overall cost of care. Most Americans view nursing home living with dread, preferring to spend their later years at home. Community Health Workers (CHWs) are a cost-effective way to prevent the need for acute care by identifying problems rooted in social determinants of health and providing early intervention while acting as social service navigators. To expand this workforce effort, the proposed project supported by this grant will focus on growing the healthcare and social services workforce to meet the needs of our rapidly growing aging population. We will collaboratively build seamless career pathways on Kaua'i to successfully train and employ community health workers (CHWs), certified nursing assistants (CNAs), nurses (LPNs and RNs) and other needs in health-related fields (social workers and administrative staff).

A pilot project to train and compensate family caregivers would be included to increase the quality of care, reduce injuries, and recognize the true value they provide to society. Most senior care is provided in the home with an

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estimated 157,000 unpaid family caregivers providing 131 million hours of care a year (Source: AARP Hawai'i). In 2017, 15,200 community-dwelling adults aged 65 and older in Hawai'i had difficulty caring for themselves and their personal needs (Source: UH Center on the Family). This project will consider the needs of families with elderly loved ones at all levels of the delivery system, whether it is institutionalized care, respite care or in-home care, and will develop the tools and resources that they seek.

While efforts like these often take place in silos, this project depends on collaborative coordination across different governments, non-profits, institutions of higher learning, foundations, health care providers and insurers and businesses working together to meet these urgent needs. Working together on this island wide effort will accomplish improved health outcomes and prepares the community for the rapidly aging population with job creation in tandem with training and education, living wages and successful care support for families.

It is crucial to build these resources today because the state faces significant obstacles as it prepares for its aging population. Due to the booming population of high-risk, low-income elderly, there is a pressing need to develop a healthcare delivery system and workforce that can provide culturally appropriate services. The entire state is already currently experiencing significant workforce shortfalls and there are no indications that staffing shortages will be alleviated in the near future. This staffing crisis highlights the problems in the healthcare delivery system and simply hiring more people does not address the deficiencies in the continuum of care nor does it improve how care is delivered to kūpuna. Therefore, OPF seeks to develop a strategy to transform and transition the system which cares for our kūpuna while also providing navigation support and respite for caregivers.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

Target population to be served will be elderly or frail adults, usually aged 65 years or more who require short-term or long-term skilled care, high intensity rehabilitation, home health services, caregivers looking for respite and families in need of healthcare navigation support. In addition, the focus will be on the many high-risk and the most expensive patients that are frequently visiting the emergency room instead of receiving routine check-ups or regular medical care.

Population trends are rapidly increasing the need for expansion of home and community-based services and support in transitions of care. Most people enrolled in Medicare today have three or more chronic conditions (65 percent), half live below the poverty line, and nearly one-third (31 percent) have cognitive or mental impairment. Additionally, the growth in size of this population will occur quickly as seen by comparing the numbers of Americans aged 65 years and older in 2002 (35.5 million) and 2012 (43.1 million). Estimates for 2040 are that some 80 million Americans will be age 65 years and older and about 29 million of those individuals will have some degree of disability. Meanwhile, the number of

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Americans ages 85 years and older is projected to grow from 5.9 million to about 14.1 million in 2040. (Source: U.S. National Library of Medicine National Institute of Health, The Future of Home Health Care, A Strategic Framework for Optimizing Value). Finally, with housing costs rising across Hawai'i, seniors may find it increasingly difficult to make ends meet after retirement. A 2020 report on the best and worst places for seniors to live ranked Hawai'i 35th out of 50 states, with high housing costs for both general and senior-specific housing a primary factor driving down the ranking (Source: 2020 ALICE Report for Hawaii).

These trends can be seen directly correlating to the elderly population on Kaua'i. According to The Department of Business, Economic Development & Tourism 2014 report, Kaua'i County's Resident Population 60 years old and above was 24.9% or 17,563. By 2020, 25% of Hawaii's population will be over 60 years old and at least 37.7% will require home and community-based services in order to age in place. Kaua'i County's Agency on Elderly Affairs summarized data from the U.S. Census information for the Administration on Aging and found that 37.7% of Kaua'i's older adults had a disability, which included sensory and physical disability, self-care disability, or disability with going outside of the home. In 2017, 15,200 community-dwelling (defined as people who do not live in an institution or other group-living facility) adults aged 65 and older in Hawai'i had difficulty caring for themselves (Source: Hawai'i Business Magazine, Our Kūpuna, Our Kuleana: Senior Care Crisis in Hawai'i via UH Center on the Family). This number has increased, and acuity of illness has worsened since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic brought on a decrease in regular doctor visits and annual wellness visits.

The organization has been providing care for the elderly in the community since 1998. On Kaua'i, the organization employs 250 employees providing skilled nursing, rehabilitation, home health, adult day health services.

Current and ongoing operations on Kaua'i include the following services that are in place to provide post-acute care at differing levels, fostering seamless transitions:

- Stay at Home Healthcare Services We believe that health outcomes are best when cared for in the comfort of your home, surrounded by your loved ones. Our home health team serves individuals and families who need support in nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, home care aide services and medical social work.
- Kaua'i Adult Day Health Our programming offers daily enrichment for kūpuna who live at home and respite for caregivers. We understand that caregivers need a break from their daily duties and are happy to provide the venue for them to do so. Our Adult Day Health program include activities, social connection, and healthy meals and snacks throughout the day and help with personal needs. All of our programs include a nurse on the team to provide additional medical assistance and administer medication if needed.
- Garden Isle Rehabilitation & Nursing Located conveniently in Līhu'e, within Wilcox Medical Center. Housing 109 beds, Garden Isle provides an array of short-term and long-term services. The rehabilitation team provides a multidisciplinary approach to therapy with a goal of returning patients to the comfort of their own homes.
- Hale Kūpuna Heritage Home Located in beautiful, 'Ōma'o, Hale Kūpuna is tucked into a lush, green neighborhood outside of town. Hale Kūpuna has 84 beds that offer short-term and long-term care. The location provides a peaceful, comfortable home away from home during your transition from hospital to home.

Operations on Kaua'i include:

- Stay at Home Healthcare Services is the hub for home and community-based services on Kaua'i. Housing administrative offices for approximately 5 staff and meeting space for direct care staff, Stay at Home is in Lihue at 3-3367 Kuhio Highway.
- Kauai Adult Day Health is located at the Līhu'e Christian Church, at 2943 Kress Street and serves approximately 30-40 seniors with activities and medical care daily.
- Garden Isle Rehabilitation & Nursing is located conveniently in Līhu'e, within Wilcox Medical Center and houses 109 beds.
- Hale Kūpuna Heritage Home is in beautiful, 'Ōma'o at 4297A 'Ōma'o Road, with 84 beds.


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the project which will drive the organization toward a sustainable model for delivering safe, collaborative, and person centered kūpuna care.




Structure of Project Oversight
