HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES THIRTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE, 2022 STATE OF HAWAII

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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STUDENT JOURNALISM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. This Act shall be known and may be cited as the
- 2 Hawaii Student Journalism Protection Act.
- 3 SECTION 2. The legislature finds that states may enhance
- 4 the protections guaranteed by the First Amendment of the United
- 5 States Constitution through state laws, rules, and regulations.
- 6 The legislature further finds that student journalists attending
- 7 Hawaii public schools and the University of Hawaii need
- 8 additional protection against censorship, and that advisors need
- 9 additional protections against retaliation for refusing to
- 10 illegally censor student journalists.
- 11 Pursuant to the exclusive jurisdiction of the legislature
- 12 to identify laws of statewide concern granted under article X,
- 13 section 6, of the Hawaii State Constitution, the legislature
- 14 further finds that allowing student journalists at the
- 15 University of Hawaii to exercise freedom of speech and freedom
- 16 of the press in school-sponsored media and protecting their

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- 1 advisors from retaliation for refusing to censor their students
- 2 is a matter of statewide concern.
- 3 The purpose of this Act is to establish the Hawaii Student
- 4 Journalism Protection Act to:
- 5 (1) Allow student journalists at public schools and the
- 6 University of Hawaii to exercise freedom of speech and
- freedom of the press in school-sponsored media; and
- 8 (2) Protect advisors from retaliation for refusing to
- 9 infringe upon student press freedom.
- 10 SECTION 3. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 11 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 12 and to read as follows:
- 13 "§302A- Student journalists; school-sponsored media.
- 14 (a) A student journalist shall be allowed to exercise freedom
- 15 of speech and freedom of the press in school-sponsored media and
- 16 shall not be disciplined for acting in accordance with this
- 17 section. A student journalist shall be responsible for
- 18 determining the news, opinion, feature, and advertising content
- 19 of school-sponsored media.
- 20 (b) Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent
- 21 a student media advisor from teaching professional standards of

1	English la	anguage use and journalism to student journalists or
2	determini	ng grades and credit for those purposes.
3	<u>(c)</u>	Nothing in this section shall be construed to
4	authorize	or protect student expression that:
5	(1)	Is libelous or slanderous;
6	(2)	Constitutes a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal
7		privacy;
8	(3)	Violates state or federal law;
9	(4)	Is obscene; or
10	(5)	So incites students as to create a clear and present
11		danger of the commission of an unlawful act, the
12		violation of lawful school or board policies, or the
13		material and substantial disruption of the orderly
14		operation of the school; provided that the
15		determination of a risk of material and substantial
16		disruption shall be based upon specific facts,
17		including past experience at the school and current
18		events influencing student behavior, and not on
19		undifferentiated fear or apprehension of disturbance.
20	(d)	There shall be no prior constraint of material
21	prepared	for school-sponsored media except as provided in

- 1 subsection (c). School officials shall have the burden of
- 2 showing justification without undue delay before a limitation of
- 3 student expression under this section and shall establish a
- 4 reasonable period of review for material prepared for school-
- 5 sponsored media. If the period of review elapses without a
- 6 decision, the material prepared for school-sponsored media shall
- 7 be considered authorized.
- 8 (e) No publication or other expression of material by
- 9 student journalists in the exercise of rights under this section
- 10 shall be deemed to be an expression of the school, board, or
- 11 department. No state agency, member of the board, officer of
- 12 the department, or employee of any agency or the board shall be
- 13 held responsible in any civil or criminal action for the
- 14 publication or other expression of material by student
- 15 journalists in the exercise of rights under this section or the
- 16 First Amendment of the United States Constitution.
- 17 (f) A student media advisor shall not be dismissed,
- 18 suspended, disciplined, reassigned, transferred, or otherwise
- 19 retaliated against for:

(1)	Acting to protect a student journalist engaged in
	conduct protected under this section or the First
	Amendment to the United States Constitution; or
(2)	Refusing to infringe on conduct that is protected by
	this section or the First Amendment to the United
	States Constitution.
<u>(g)</u>	The board shall adopt a written policy for the
exercise	of the right of student journalists to freedom of
speech an	d freedom of the press in school-sponsored media in
accordanc	e with this section; provided that the policy shall
include:	
(1)	Reasonable provisions for the time, place, and manner
	of distribution of student expression; and
(2)	A procedure for the timely appeal of decisions made
	pursuant to this section.
(h)	For the purposes of this section:
<u>"Sch</u>	ool-sponsored media" means any material:
(1)	Prepared, written, published, or broadcast in any
	media by a student journalist at a school;
	(g) exercise speech and accordance include: (1) (2) (h) "Sch

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1	(2)	Distributed or generally made available, either free
2		of charge or for a fee, to members of the student
3		body; and
4	(3)	Prepared under the direction of a student media
5		advisor, regardless of whether the material is
6		supported financially by the school or by use of
7		facilities of the school or produced in conjunction
8		with a class for which the student is enrolled.
9	"School-s	ponsored media" does not include material intended for
10	distribut	ion or transmission for classroom purposes only.
11	<u>"Stu</u>	dent journalist" means a student who determines,
12	gathers,	compiles, writes, edits, photographs, records, or
13	prepares	information or advertising for inclusion in school-
14	sponsored	media.
15	<u>"Stu</u>	dent media advisor" means an individual employed,
16	appointed	, or designated by a school to supervise or provide
17	instructi	on relating to school-sponsored media."
18	SECT	ION 4. Chapter 304A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
19	amended b	y adding a new section to be appropriately designated
20	and to re	ad as follows:

1	" <u>§30</u> 4	4A- Student journalists; university-sponsored media.
2	(a) A sti	udent journalist shall be allowed to exercise freedom
3	of speech	and freedom of the press in university-sponsored media
4	and shall	not be disciplined for acting in accordance with this
5	section.	A student journalist shall be responsible for
6	determini	ng the news, opinion, feature, and advertising content
7	of univer	sity-sponsored media.
8	(b)	Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent

15	States Constitution.
16	(g) The board of regents shall adopt a written policy for
17	the exercise of the right of student journalists to freedom of
18	speech and freedom of the press in university-sponsored media in
19	accordance with this section; provided that the policy shall
20	include:

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1	<u>(1)</u>	Reasonable provisions for the time, place, and manner
2		of distribution of student expression; and

20	<u>(3)</u>	Prepared under the direction of a student media
21		advisor, regardless of whether the material is

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1	supported financially by the university or by use of
2	facilities of the university or produced in
3	conjunction with a class for which the student is
4	enrolled.
5	"University-sponsored media" does not include material intended
6	for distribution or transmission for classroom purposes only."
7	SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.
8	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
