HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES THIRTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE, 2022 STATE OF HAWAII

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ROBBERY IN THE FIRST DEGREE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Hawaii Penal
Code does not adequately address potential situations in which
offenders will utilize electric guns to facilitate crimes. On
January 1, 2022, it became legal for many members of the public
to buy and possess electric guns.

6 Electric guns can cause severe pain and completely 7 incapacitate a person. Criminals will begin to use these 8 devices against others to facilitate crimes as they become more 9 prevalent in the community. While the effect of electric guns 10 can be severe, the incapacitation can also be momentary and may not result in death or serious bodily injury. Once the use of 11 12 an electric gun against a person stops, it is likely that the 13 residual injuries would be lesser than would occur had a similar level of incapacitation or pain been inflicted on a victim by 14 other means. 15

16 The Penal Code frequently utilizes residual injury or17 incapacitation as a key determining factor for the level of

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severity and resulting penalty for a crime. Electric guns will
allow criminals to achieve unprecedented incapacitation of a
person and potentially avoid residual injury to the victim,
resulting in lower penalties for the crime.

5 For these reasons, the legislature further finds that 6 specifying the use or threatened use of an electric gun during 7 the course of committing a robbery under this particular offense 8 is necessary and may have a long-term deterrent effect that 9 creates a safer environment for the community.

10 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to amend the 11 offense of robbery in the first degree to include as part of 12 this offense being armed with or using an electric gun during 13 the course of a theft or non-consensual taking of a motor 14 vehicle.

15 SECTION 2. Section 708-840, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 16 amended by amending subsections (1) and (2) to read as follows: 17 "(1) A person commits the offense of robbery in the first 18 degree if, in the course of committing theft or non-consensual 19 taking of a motor vehicle:


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1	(a)	The person attempts to kill another or intentionally
2		or knowingly inflicts or attempts to inflict serious
3		bodily injury upon another;
4	(d)	The person is armed with a dangerous instrument <u>, an</u>
5		electric gun, or a simulated firearm and:
6		(i) The person uses force against the person of
7		anyone present with intent to overcome that
8		person's physical resistance or physical power of
9		resistance; or
10		(ii) The person threatens the imminent use of force
11		against the person of anyone present with intent
12		to compel acquiescence to the taking of or
13		escaping with the property;
14	(c)	The person uses force against the person of anyone
15		present with the intent to overcome that person's
16		physical resistance or physical power of resistance
17		during an emergency period proclaimed by the governor
18		or mayor pursuant to chapter 127A, within the area
19		covered by the emergency or disaster; or
20	(d)	The person threatens the imminent use of force against
21		the person of anyone present with intent to compel
