#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ACUPUNCTURE.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the regulation of medical professionals is important to ensure public safety and 2 promote access to quality care. Acupuncture is one of the 3 4 fastest growing fields in American health care due to expanded 5 benefits under health insurance policies and medicare and is a 6 popular treatment among patients seeking an alternative to 7 prescription opioids and those with other medical conditions. 8 The legislature further finds that a number of state laws 9 regarding acupuncturists have not been updated in over twenty 10 years, despite the growing demand for acupuncturists, changes to 11 standards for national certifications, and expanded accredited 12 educational programs, which now include master's and doctoral 13 level degrees.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to make comprehensive updates to chapter 436E, Hawaii Revised Statutes, regarding acupuncture practitioners to reflect modernized scopes of practice and licensing requirements.

1	(b) Applicants who have earned a bachelor's, master's, or		
2	doctoral degree from a foreign university or college shall		
3	demonstrate curricula and standards equivalent to or higher than		
4	accredited institutions in the United States, which have been		
5	recognized and approved by the board. The board may contract		
6	with a third-party agency to determine equivalency, at cost to		
7	the applicant.		
8	§436E-B Legacy exemptions. Any current acupuncture		
9	licensees in the State as of January 1, 2023 shall be designated		
10	legacy status by the board for their current license		
11	designation, allowing for the practice of acupuncture medicine.		
12	If a license that was issued before January 1, 2023, lapses and		
13	is not restored within two years of its expiration date, the		
14	licensee will be subject to the new licensure requirements		
15	pursuant to section 436E-A."		
16	SECTION 3. Section 436E-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
17	amended to read as follows:

19	control. The legislature hereby finds and declares that		
20	acupuncture medicine is an evidence-based medicine rooted in		
21	traditional and modern modalities and that the practice of

2	examination, evaluation, diagnosis, and treatment of [illness
3	and disability and for strengthening and invigorating the body
4	and as such affects] the patient, therefore requiring regulation

6	therefore there is a necessity that individuals practicing
7	acupuncture be subject to regulation and control]."
8	SECTION 4. Section 436E-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

13	school or college accredited or recognized as a candidate for
14	accreditation by an acupuncture medicine accrediting body

17	rooted in traditional theories and practices, integrated with
18	modern biomedical theories and practices.
19	"Acupuncture medicine physician" means an acupuncture
20	practitioner engaged in the practice of advanced acupuncture
21	medicine.



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1	"Practice of advanced acupuncture medicine" means the
2	practice of acupuncture medicine and the use of advanced
3	diagnostics, specialties, and therapeutics, based on additional
4	traditional and biomedical internal medicine training, as
5	further determined by administrative rules.
6	"Practice of acupuncture medicine" means the practice of
7	acupuncture with adjunctive therapies, including but not limited
8	to manual, mechanical, electrical, light, sound,
9	electromagnetic, thermal therapy, herbal and nutraceutical
10	medicines, lifestyle and nutritional counseling, movement, and
11	other traditional and modern techniques as further determined by
12	administrative rules."
13	2. By amending the definition of "acupuncture
14	practitioner" to read:
15	""Acupuncture practitioner" means a person engaged in the
16	practice of acupuncture[-] medicine."
17	3. By amending the definition of "practice of acupuncture"
18	to read:
