#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO A SEX TRAFFICKING EMERGENCY SHELTER.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that sex trafficking is a 2 modern-day form of slavery. According to a September 2018 3 report published by Arizona State University and the Hawaii 4 state commission on the status of women, it is estimated that 5 one out of every eleven men in Hawaii over the age of eighteen 6 is an online sex buyer and that there are 74,362 potential sex 7 buyers in Hawaii. Moreover, during the coronavirus disease 2019 8 (COVID-19) pandemic, a service provider for sex trafficking 9 victims in Hawaii reported seeing a three hundred per cent 10 increase in demand for services, which included trauma-informed 11 care.

In 2018, as a part of a juvenile justice reform measure, the legislature authorized the creation and development of the Kawailoa youth and family wellness center at the site of the Hawaii youth correctional facilities, including "crisis shelters for victims of human and sex trafficking" under section 352D-7.5(d), Hawaii Revised Statutes. Within a few months of

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1 that authorization, the Kawailoa campus included an assessment 2 center and shelter for young victims of sex trafficking. In 3 addition, in the spring of 2021, Ho'ola Na Pua opened a 4 first-of-its-kind, thirty-two bed, residential treatment program 5 for victims of sex trafficking in Hawaii.

6 The legislature further finds that, despite the development of these two much-needed facilities, a gap in service remains 7 that can be met by an emergency shelter for minor victims of sex 8 9 trafficking. An emergency shelter for minor victims of sex 10 trafficking would improve the State's effectiveness in 11 responding to sexual exploitation by allowing government 12 agencies and victim service providers to establish a coordinated 13 continuum of care and protect victims in a centralized location.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to authorize the office of youth services to establish or contract with a victim service provider to operate an emergency shelter for minors who are victims of sex trafficking and sexual exploitation.

18 SECTION 2. Chapter 352D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
19 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
20 and to read as follows:

10	(C)	The operator of the emergency shelter, in consultation
11	with any a	appropriate governmental agency or nongovernmental
12	organizat:	ion, shall be responsible for determining:
13	(1)	If a sex trafficking victim is eligible for services
14		at the shelter, including the level of need and course
15		of treatment for each victim; and
16	(2)	Whether a sex trafficking victim is no longer eligible
17		for services at the shelter; provided that services
18		for any victim shall not exceed thirty days.
19	(d)	Any person who enters or remains on the premises of an
20	emergency	shelter authorized by this section after being asked
21	to leave i	by the office or its designee, a victim service

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1	provider, or a law enforcement officer shall be guilty of a			
2	misdemeanor.			
3	(e) The mayor of any county in the State, by executive			
4	order, may exempt the operator of an emergency shelter			
5	established pursuant to this section from real property taxes,			
6	water and sewer development fees, rates collected for water			
7	supplied to consumers and for use of sewers, and any other			
8	county taxes, charges, rates, or fees arising from the operation			
9	of the sex trafficking emergency shelter; provided that any			
10	county may enact ordinances to regulate the exemptions			
11	authorized by this section.			
12	(f) The office shall require any victim service provider			
13	with whom it enters into a contract under this section to submit			
14	to the office a report for each year that the contract is in			
15	effect. The report shall include a financial report and			
16	recommendations for improving services for sex trafficking			
17	victims. Failure to provide the required report shall be			
18	grounds for the office to terminate a contract with the victim			
19	service provider.			

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1	(g)	Nothing in this section shall prohibit the office from
2	<u>establish</u> :	ing additional programs or services for sex trafficking
3	victims.	
4	(h)	Except as otherwise provided by law, the State shall
5	be the par	yor of last resort for the operation of emergency
6	shelters	for sex trafficking victims pursuant to this chapter.
7	<u>(i)</u>	As used in this section:
8	"Min	or" means a person who is less than eighteen years of
9	age.	
10	"Sex	trafficking victim" means:
11	(1)	A minor subject to an act or practice of prostitution,
12		as described in section 712-1200;
13	(2)	A minor subject to an act or practice of sex
14		trafficking, as described in section 712-1202(1)(b);
15	(3)	A minor who is a victim of the offense of promoting
16		prostitution under section 712-1203;
17	(4)	A minor solicited for prostitution, as described in
18		section 712-1209.1;
19	(5)	A victim of a severe form of trafficking, as defined
20		in title 22 United States Code section 7102, who is a
21		<pre>minor;</pre>

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1	(6)	A victim of trafficking, as defined in title 22 United	
2		States Code section 7102, who is a minor; or	
3	(7)	A minor subject to the crime of sex trafficking of	
4		children or by force, fraud, or coercion under title	
5		18 United States Code section 1591.	
6	"Victim service provider" means a nonprofit or		
7	nongovernmental organization that provides services to sex		
8	trafficki	ng victims, including outreach, direct intervention,	
9	housing,	rehabilitation, education, vocational, medical, mental	
10	health, or substance abuse treatment programs."		
11	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general		
12	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$500,000 or so much		
13	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for the		
14	office of youth services to establish or contract with a victim		
15	service provider to operate a sex trafficking emergency shelter		
16	for minors.		
17	The	sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of	
18	youth services for the purposes of this Act.		
19	SECT	ION 4. This Act does not affect rights and duties that	
20	matured,	penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were	
21	begun before its effective date.		

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SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.
 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2060;
 provided that section 4 shall take effect on July 1, 2022.



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#### Report Title:

Sex Trafficking; Minors; Emergency Shelter; Office of Youth Services; Appropriation

#### Description:

Authorizes the office of youth services to establish or contract with a victim service provider to operate an emergency shelter for minors who are victims of sex trafficking or sexual exploitation. Appropriates funds. Effective 7/1/2060. (HD1)

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
