A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO UNDERGROUND FUEL STORAGE TANKS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that fresh water and 2 streams have been among the most important natural resources to
- 3 Hawaii's people. Dating back to ancient Hawaii, the sanctity of
- 4 fresh water, or wai, is reflected in the way water permeates
- 5 throughout olelo Hawaii, the Hawaiian spoken language. For
- 6 example, the Hawaiian word for "law" is kanawai, which literally
- 7 translates to the "equal sharing of water". The Hawaiian word
- 8 waiwai, water repeated twice, means abundance and prosperity.
- 9 In Native Hawaiian culture, to have water is to have wealth.
- 10 The legislature further finds that the purity and safety of
- 11 the State's fresh water is in jeopardy of contamination. In
- 12 December 2021, the United States Navy confirmed that the Red
- 13 Hill bulk fuel storage facility on Oahu leaked petroleum into
- 14 the Navy's water system, contaminating the drinking water for
- 15 residents and personnel at Joint-Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam and
- 16 surrounding neighborhoods. More than ninety-two thousand people

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- 1 were impacted within weeks, with some reporting ill effects from
- 2 ingesting the fuel-tainted water.
- 3 Therefore, the purpose of this Act is to:
- 4 (1) Prohibit the department of health from issuing new 5 permits for underground fuel storage tanks within one-
- 6 half mile from an aquifer;
- 7 (2) Prohibit the renewal of permits for underground fuel storage tanks within one-half mile of an aquifer,
- 9 beginning January 1, 2050; and
- 10 (3) Create a new definition for "fuel storage tanks" to
 11 include tanks with a capacity at or greater than one
 12 hundred gallons.
- SECTION 2. Chapter 342L, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
 amended by adding a new section to part I to be appropriately
 designated and to read as follows:
- 16 "§342L- Permits near aquifer prohibited. (a) Beginning
 17 July 1, 2022, the department shall not issue a permit for a new
 18 underground fuel storage tank within one-half mile of the outer
 19 edge of an aquifer; provided that a permit may be issued by the
- 20 department for purposes of repairing or replacing an existing
- 21 underground fuel storage tank.

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1	(b) Beginning January 1, 2050, no person shall operate an
2	underground fuel storage tank within one-half mile of the outer
3	edge of an aquifer, and no permit for an underground fuel
4	storage tank within one-half mile of the outer edge of an
5	aquifer shall be renewed.
6	(c) As used in this section, "underground fuel storage
7	tank" means any fuel tank with a capacity of one hundred or more
8	gallons installed underground."
9	SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
10	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

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Report Title:

Underground Fuel Storage Tanks; Aquifers; Permits; Prohibition

Description:

Prohibits issuance of future underground fuel storage tanks within one-half mile of an aquifer beginning July 1, 2022. Prohibits operation of and renewal of underground fuel storage tank permits located within one-half mile from an aquifer beginning January 1, 2050. Defines underground fuel storage tanks as any fuel tank with a capacity of one hundred gallons or more.

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
