A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO NATIVE HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The departments and agencies listed in section
- 2 2 of this Act shall provide grants to federal tax-exempt non-
- 3 profit organizations that have previously received government
- 4 assistance to support their organizational mission and also
- 5 possess at least twenty years of providing assistance and
- 6 support to Native Hawaiian communities.
- 7 The grants shall be tailored toward improving Native
- 8 Hawaiian communities and culture through various assistance
- 9 programs, including but not limited to programs that offer food
- 10 sustainability; development of renewable infrastructure; Native
- 11 Hawaiian historic preservation; development of a mill to process
- 12 ulu and taro; business training, entrepreneurship, and
- 13 mentoring; farming; education; cultural training; and
- 14 environmental management.
- 15 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 16 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$15,700,000 or so
- 17 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 to be
