### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STATEWIDE INTEROPERABLE PUBLIC SAFETY COMMUNICATIONS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to formally
2	establish the statewide interoperable communications executive
3	committee and technical subcommittee, and the position of
4	statewide interoperable communications coordinator as a position
5	exempt from section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes.
6	SECTION 2. Chapter 128A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
8	to read as follows:

3	(4)	Develop plans and strategies for the coordination of
4		state; county; and, if possible, federal emergency
5		alerts and warnings with public safety answering
6		points and public safety responder communications
7		networks, infrastructure, and systems;
8	(5)	Review and adopt plans and recommendations to improve
9		or promote increased interoperability between public
10		safety responders and other government or
11		non-government stakeholders that support responses to
12		emergencies; and
13	(6)	Submit a status report on the requirements of this
14		subsection, including any obstacles and proposed
15		legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty
16		days prior to the convening of the regular session of
17		2023 and each regular session thereafter.
18	(b)	The members of the statewide interoperable
19	communica	tions executive committee shall include the following:

1	(1)	The adjutant general or the adjutant general's
2		designee, who shall serve as the chair of the
3		committee;
4	(2)	The attorney general or the attorney general's
5		designee;
6	(3)	The deputy director of the law enforcement division of
7		the department of public safety or the deputy
8		director's designee;
9	(4)	The chairperson of the board of land and natural
10		resources or the chairperson's designee;
11	(5)	The state chief information officer or the chief
12		information officer's designee;
13	(6)	The director of transportation or the director's
14		designee;
15	(7)	The director of health or the director's designee;
16	(8)	The chairperson of the Hawaii enhanced 911 board or
17		the chairperson's designee; and
18	(9)	Four members at the executive or senior personnel
19		level from the first responder or emergency management
20		agencies from each of the four counties, to be
21		selected by the respective heads of the first

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1	responder or emergency management agencies of each
2	county.
3	(c) Members of the statewide interoperable communications
4	executive committee shall receive no compensation but shall be
5	reimbursed for travel and other reasonable and necessary
6	expenses incurred in carrying out the member's duties relating
7	to the committee.
8	§128A- Statewide interoperable communications technical
9	subcommittee. (a) There is established a statewide
10	interoperable communications technical subcommittee to provide
11	technical advice to the statewide interoperable communications
12	executive committee.
13	(b) Membership on the statewide interoperable
14	communications technical subcommittee shall be limited to
15	representatives from any governmental agency having duties that
16	include management, planning, and operation of public safety
17	communications systems and networks, including government land
18	mobile radio and broadband networks and those related to
19	emergency communications centers and public safety answering
20	points; provided that:

1	(1)	The statewide interoperable communications coordinator
2		shall serve as the chairperson of the statewide
3		interoperable communications technical subcommittee;
4	(2)	The respective lead radio communication engineer or
5		manager for the State and each county, or each lead
6		radio communication engineer or manager's respective
7		designee, shall serve on the subcommittee as subject
8		matter experts for their respective radio
9		communication systems and networks; and
10	(3)	The respective lead information security manager for
11		the State and each county, or each lead information
12		security manager's respective designee, shall serve or
13		the subcommittee as subject matter experts for matters
14		relating to cyber security.
15	(c)	The statewide interoperable communications technical
16	subcommit	tee shall:
17	(1)	Not have a fixed membership, subject to the limitation
18		established in subsection (b);
19	(2)	Not be subject to any quorum requirement; and
20	(3)	Be exempt from part I of chapter 92.

3	(6)	Serve as a liaison between the statewide interoperable
4		communications executive committee or statewide
5		interoperable communications technical subcommittee,
6		or both, and the federal government and private
7		communications industry on issues concerning statewide
8		interoperable communications;
9	(7)	Coordinate guidance, input, and recommendations from
10		state, county, and federal agencies on the statewide
11		communications interoperability plan and lead the
12		development, implementation, and regular updating of
13		the statewide communications interoperability plan;
14	(8)	Assist, as necessary or requested, with communications
15		among responders during emergencies who are responding
16		to planned and unplanned events;
17	(9)	Coordinate closely with the state single point of
18		contact on issues related to the implementation of the
19		Nationwide Public Safety Broadband Network in the
20		State;

1	(10)	Coordinate interoperability activities with public
2		safety answering points; operators of state, county
3		and federal communications systems; and emergency
4		management coordinators;
5	(11)	Manage communications unit program training and
6		exercises provided by federal and state agencies, and
7		work with public safety agencies to assist with any
8		credentialing or recognition of the agencies'
9		communications personnel; and
10	(12)	Serve as the state representative to the National
11		Council of Statewide Interoperability Coordinators."
12	SECT	ION 3. Section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

9		normal civil service recruitment procedures. Any such
10		contract may be for any period not exceeding one year,
11	(3)	Positions that must be filled without delay to comply
12		with a court order or decree if the director
13		determines that recruitment through normal recruitment
14		civil service procedures would result in delay or
15		noncompliance, such as the Felix-Cayetano consent
16		decree;
17	(4)	Positions filled by the legislature or by either house
18		or any committee thereof;
19	(5)	Employees in the office of the governor and office of
20		the lieutenant governor, and household employees at
21		Washington Place;

15		and each judge of the circuit court; one secretary for
16		the judicial council; one deputy administrative
17		director of the courts; three law clerks for the chief

16			alternative school project coordinators, and

16			or temporary public service employment that are
17			filled by persons entering the workforce or
18			persons transitioning into other careers under
19			programs such as the federal Workforce Investment
20			Act of 1998, as amended, or the Senior Community
21			Service Employment Program of the Employment and

4	(14)	A custodian or guide at Iolani Palace, the Royal

10		duties require only a portion of their time, if it is
11		impracticable to ascertain or anticipate the portion

13	(16)	Positions of first deputies or first assistants of
14		each department head appointed under or in the manner
15		provided in section 6, article V, of the Hawaii State
16		Constitution; three additional deputies or assistants
17		either in charge of the highways, harbors, and
18		airports divisions or other functions within the
19		department of transportation as may be assigned by the
20		director of transportation, with the approval of the
21		qovernor; four additional deputies in the department

1		of health, each in charge of one of the following:
2		behavioral health, environmental health, hospitals,
3		and health resources administration, including other
4		functions within the department as may be assigned by
5		the director of health, with the approval of the
6		governor; an administrative assistant to the state
7		librarian; and an administrative assistant to the

9	(17)	Positions specifically exempted from this part by any
10		other law; provided that:
11		(A) Any exemption created after July 1, 2014, shall
12		expire three years after its enactment unless
13		affirmatively extended by an act of the
14		legislature; and
15		(B) All of the positions defined by paragraph (9)
16		shall be included in the position classification
17		plan;
18	(18)	Positions in the state foster grandparent program and
19		positions for temporary employment of senior citizens
20		in occupations in which there is a severe personnel
21		shortage or in special projects;

1	(19)	Household employees at the official residence of the
2		president of the University of Hawaii;
3	(20)	Employees in the department of education engaged in
4		the supervision of students during meal periods in the
5		distribution, collection, and counting of meal
6		tickets, and in the cleaning of classrooms after
7		school hours on a less than half-time basis;
8	(21)	Employees hired under the tenant hire program of the
9		Hawaii public housing authority; provided that not
10		more than twenty-six per cent of the authority's
11		workforce in any housing project maintained or
12		operated by the authority shall be hired under the
13		tenant hire program;
14	(22)	Positions of the federally funded expanded food and
15		nutrition program of the University of Hawaii that
16		require the hiring of nutrition program assistants who
17		live in the areas they serve;
18	(23)	Positions filled by persons with severe disabilities
19		who are certified by the state vocational
20		rehabilitation office that they are able to perform
21		safely the duties of the positions;

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1	(24)	The sheriff;
2	(25)	A gender and other fairness coordinator hired by the
3		judiciary;
4	(26)	Positions in the Hawaii National Guard youth and adult
5		education programs;
6	(27)	In the state energy office in the department of
7		business, economic development, and tourism, all
8		energy program managers, energy program specialists,
9		energy program assistants, and energy analysts;
10	(28)	Administrative appeals hearing officers in the
11		department of human services;
12	(29)	In the Med-QUEST division of the department of human
13		services, the division administrator, finance officer,
14		health care services branch administrator, medical
15		director, and clinical standards administrator;
16	(30)	In the director's office of the department of human
17		services, the enterprise officer, information security
18		and privacy compliance officer, security and privacy
19		compliance engineer, and security and privacy
20		compliance analyst;

1	(31)	The Alzheimer's disease and related dementia services
2		coordinator in the executive office on aging;
3	(32)	In the Hawaii emergency management agency, the
4		executive officer, public information officer, civil
5		defense administrative officer, branch chiefs, and
