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HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE JUDICIAL COUNCIL TO APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO REVIEW AND RECOMMEND REVISIONS TO THE HAWAII PENAL CODE.

1 WHEREAS, although the Hawaii Penal Code generally provides 2 judicial discretion in sentencing repeat offenders, it appears that judges are not utilizing this discretionary authority in a 3 consistent and fair manner; and 4 5 6 WHEREAS, according to prosecutors, the outcomes for repeat 7 offenders often depends on the judge assigned to the case - with sentences ranging from prison time to same-day release; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, judges should be utilizing their judicial 11 discretion to sentence individuals consistently and fairly 12 depending on the circumstances involved, including whether the 13 individual is a repeat offender and may benefit from substance 14 abuse treatment or diversion to one of the Judiciary's 15 specialized programs such as the Drug Court or HOPE Probation (Hawaii's Opportunity Probation with Enforcement); and 16 17 18 WHEREAS, the news reported on a story earlier this year involving an individual who, over the past fifteen years, has 19 been convicted one hundred sixty-one times for various crimes, 20 including theft, harassment, open lewdness, and alcohol-related 21 offenses; and 22 23 24 WHEREAS, the number of convictions this individual has amassed over fifteen years suggests that the laws for sentencing 25 individuals need to be revisited to better address repeat 26 offenders: and 27 28 WHEREAS, in 2015, the Legislature requested under House 29 Resolution No. 155, Senate Draft 1, Regular Session of 2015, for 30 the Judicial Council to appoint a committee to review the Hawaii 31 Penal Code and recommend to the Legislature revisions to the 32 33 Code that will help ensure that sentences are fair and

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proportionate to the crime committed with particular attention 1 2 paid to Hawaii Penal Code sections that base culpability on 3 dollar amounts; and 4 5 WHEREAS, this resulted in the enactment of various. amendments to the Hawaii Penal Code the following year under Act 6 231, Session Laws of Hawaii 2016, to ensure more fair and 7 8 proportionate sentencing; and 9 10 WHEREAS, given the success of the previous Penal Code Review Committee in updating the Hawaii Penal Code to address 11 sentencing disparities, a similar committee should be appointed 12 to help ensure judicial discretion, consistency, and fairness in 13 sentencing repeat offenders; now, therefore, 14 15 16 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 17 18 of 2022, that the Judicial Council, established pursuant to section 601-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is requested to appoint 19 a committee to review the Hawaii Penal Code and recommend to the 20 21 Legislature revisions to the Code that the committee concludes will help ensure judicial discretion, consistency, and fairness 22 in sentencing repeat offenders; and 23 24 25 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of the committee 26 include: 27 28 (1)The prosecuting attorney of the City and County of 29 Honolulu, who shall serve as chairperson of the 30 committee; 31 32 (2) A representative from the Judiciary; 33 34 (3) A member of the Senate Committee on Judiciary; 35 (4) A member of the House of Representatives Committee on 36 37 Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs; 38 39 (5) The Administrator of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs or 40 the Administrator's designee; 41

35 36 37 38 39 40 41	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall recommend updates to the Hawaii Penal Code by reviewing HOPE Probation (Hawaii's Opportunity Probation with Enforcement), which is designed to reduce probation violations by drug offenders and others at high risk of recidivism by providing swift, predictable, and immediate sanctions - typically resulting in several days in jail - for each detected violation, such as	

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1 detected drug use or missed appointments with a probation officer; and 2 3 4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee may accept 5 assistance in the performance of its duties; and 6 7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Judicial Council may 8 request the Legislative Reference Bureau to assist the committee with research and reporting assistance, as needed; and 9 10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Judicial Council is 11 encouraged to use, to the greatest extent possible, the faculty 12 and students of the University of Hawaii William S. Richardson 13 14 School of Law in performing its work; and 15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of the committee 16 17 serve without compensation; provided that members of the committee may be reimbursed for the costs of mileage, parking, 18 19 and transportation from the neighbor islands; and 20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that no member of the committee 21 22 shall be made subject to chapter 84, Hawaii Revised Statutes, 23 solely because of that member's participation as a member of the 24 committee; and 25 26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Judicial Council is 27 requested to submit its findings and recommendations, including 28 any proposed legislation, to the Governor and Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular 29 Session of 2023; and 30 31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 32 33 Resolution be transmitted to the Chief Justice of the Hawaii 34 Supreme Court, President of the Senate, Speaker of the House of 35 Representatives, Administrator of the Office of Hawaiian 36 Affairs, Attorney General, Director of Public Safety, State 37 Public Defender, Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, 38 Prosecuting Attorneys of each of the counties, and police chiefs of each of the counties. 39 40 41 42

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
