A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FOOD ASSISTANCE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that one in six Hawaii
- 2 residents currently faces food insecurity, including nearly one
- 3 in four children. The legislature further finds that more than
- 4 eighty-two thousand children in the State are projected to
- 5 struggle with hunger in 2022, placing Hawaii as a state with the
- 6 second highest rate of child food insecurity in the country.
- 7 The legislature also finds that food banks in Hawaii have
- 8 been distributing food to persons in need in the State for
- 9 nearly forty years. Hawaii's food banks ensure that persons who
- 10 are food insecure are provided with food and nutrition
- 11 assistance by sourcing food through donations, purchases, and
- 12 federal programs including The Emergency Food Assistance
- 13 Program; inspecting the donated food to ensure its safety for
- 14 consumption; and distributing the food to those in need through
- 15 a network of eligible recipient agencies across the State,
- 16 including food pantries, community programs, soup kitchens, and
- 17 homeless shelters.



- 1 The legislature finds that The Emergency Food Assistance
- 2 Program in Hawaii is administered by the department of labor and
- 3 industrial relations' office of community services. The office
- 4 established a statewide operational system for the federal
- 5 program to provide food by entering into contracts with a food
- 6 bank for each of the State's four counties to establish,
- 7 maintain, and supervise a network of eligible recipient agencies
- 8 that distribute the donated food throughout designated areas of
- 9 the respective county.
- 10 The four Hawaii food banks currently administering The
- 11 Emergency Food Assistance Program at the county level are the
- 12 Hawaii Foodbank, Inc., which serves the city and county of
- 13 Honolulu; Maui Food Bank, Inc., which serves the county of Maui;
- 14 Hawaii Foodbank, Inc.'s Kauai branch, which serves the county of
- 15 Kauai; and The Food Basket, Inc., which serves the county of
- 16 Hawaii. All Hawaii food banks follow the highest standards of
- 17 food safety and maintain strict standards of food distribution
- 18 and recordkeeping.
- 19 The legislature acknowledges that the coronavirus disease
- 20 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic heavily impacted food security levels
- 21 in Hawaii. During fiscal year 2018-2019, the four Hawaii food

- 1 banks collectively distributed 16,800,000 pounds of food
- 2 statewide. The volume of food collectively distributed by the
- 3 banks in fiscal year 2020-2021 increased to 36,500,000 pounds,
- 4 which is more than double the volume distributed before the
- 5 pandemic. The level of food insecurity in Hawaii are expected
- 6 to remain elevated for at least another year following the
- 7 conclusion of the pandemic.
- 8 The Hawaii food banks administering The Emergency Food
- 9 Assistance Program were able to meet the State's increased need
- 10 for food during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic due to a
- 11 major increase in federal funds and philanthropy. However,
- 12 funding from these sources has declined considerably, and the
- 13 food banks do not have sufficient funds to continue to meet the
- 14 food security needs of Hawaii residents.
- 15 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to appropriate
- 16 funds to enable Hawaii's food banks administering The Emergency
- 17 Food Assistance Program to continue to meet the food security
- 18 needs of the people of Hawaii during this time of unprecedented
- 19 need due to disturbances caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.
- 20 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 21 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much

- 1 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 to fund
- 2 the operating expenses of Hawaii Foodbank, Inc.; Maui Food Bank,
- 3 Inc.; Hawaii Foodbank, Inc.'s Kauai branch; and The Food Basket,
- 4 Inc., including expenses for staffing, transportation, food
- 5 purchase, food storage, and food distribution.
- 6 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 7 labor and industrial relations' office of community services for
- 8 the purposes of this Act; provided that of the sum appropriated:
- 9 (1) Five per cent shall be allocated to the office of
- 10 community services to administer the funds
- appropriated pursuant to this Act;
- 12 (2) Ten per cent shall be allocated to the food bank in
- 13 each county as administrative funds, based on the
- 14 county's proportional share of the State's poverty
- 15 population as set forth in the latest small area
- income and poverty estimates issued by the United
- 17 States Census Bureau (SAIPE formula); and
- 18 (3) The remainder shall be allocated to the food bank in
- each county as food purchase funds using the SAIPE
- formula.

- 1 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on December 31,
- **2** 2050.
