### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HOUSING SHORTAGE.

#### **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:**

1 Section 225M-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is SECTION 1. 2 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows: 3 The office of planning and sustainable development "(b) 4 shall gather, analyze, and provide information to the governor, 5 the legislature, and state and county agencies to assist in the 6 overall analysis and formulation of state policies and 7 strategies to provide central direction and cohesion in the 8 allocation of resources and effectuation of state activities and 9 programs and effectively address current or emerging issues and 10 opportunities. More specifically, the office shall engage in 11 the following activities: 12 State comprehensive planning and program coordination. (1)13 Formulating and articulating comprehensive statewide goals, objectives, policies, and priorities, and 14 15 coordinating their implementation through the

16 statewide planning system established in part II of 17 chapter 226;

The office shall be the 9 lead agency responsible for coordinating the 10 maintenance of the multi-agency, statewide 11 planning and geographic information system and 12 coordinating, collecting, integrating, and 13 disseminating geospatial data sets that are used 14 to support a variety of state agency applications 15 and other spatial data analyses to enhance 16 decision-making. The office shall promote and 17 encourage free and open data sharing among and 18 between all government agencies. To ensure the 19 maintenance of a comprehensive, accurate, up-to-20 date geospatial data resource that can be drawn 21 upon for decision-making related to essential



1 public policy issues such as land use planning, 2 resource management, homeland security, and the 3 overall health, safety, and well-being of 4 Hawaii's citizens, and to avoid redundant data 5 development efforts, state agencies shall provide 6 to the shared system either their respective 7 geospatial databases or, at a minimum, especially 8 in cases of secure or confidential data sets that 9 cannot be shared or must be restricted, metadata 10 describing existing geospatial data. In cases 11 where agencies provide restricted data, the 12 office of planning and sustainable development 13 shall ensure the security of that data; and 14 (C) Maintaining a centralized depository of state and 15 national planning references; 16 (5) Land use planning. Developing and presenting the 17 position of the State in all boundary change petitions 18 and proceedings before the land use commission, and 19 assisting state agencies in the development and 20 submittal of petitions for land use district boundary 21 amendments, and conducting periodic reviews of the

5		(A)	The capability of various regions within the
6			State to support projected increases in both
7			resident populations and visitors;
8		(B)	The potential physical, social, economic, and
9			environmental impact on these regions resulting
10			from increases in both resident populations and
11			visitors;
12		(C)	The maximum annual visitor carrying capacity for
13			the State by region, county, and island; and
14		(D)	The appropriate guidance and management of
15			selected regions and areas of statewide critical
16			concern.

12		preserving non-urbanized land, improving worker
13		access to jobs, and reducing fuel consumption;
14	(D)	Target transit-oriented development areas for
15		significant increase in affordable housing and
16		rental units;
17	(E)	Conduct outreach to state agencies to help
18		educate state employees about the ways they can
19		support and benefit from transit-oriented
20		development and the State's smart growth goals;

1		(F)	Publicize coordinated state efforts that support
2			smart growth, walkable neighborhoods, and
3			transit-oriented development;
4		(G)	Review state land use decision-making processes
5			to identify ways to make transit-oriented
6			development a higher priority and facilitate
7			better and more proactive leadership in creating
8			walkable communities and employment districts,
9			even if transit will only be provided at a later
10			date; and
11		(H)	Approve all state agencies' development plans for
12			parcels along the rail transit corridor. For the
13			purposes of this subparagraph, "development
14			plans" means conceptual land use plans that
15			identify the location and planned uses within a
16			defined area; [ <del>and</del> ]
17	(11)	Envi	ronmental review. Performing duties set forth
18		unde	r chapter 343, serving the governor in an advisory
19		capa	city on all matters relating to environmental
20		revi	ew, and having such powers delegated by the
21		gove	rnor as are necessary to coordinate and, when



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1		requested by the governor, direct all state		
2		governmental agencies in matters concerning		
3		environmental quality control, including:		
4		(A) Advising and assisting private industries,		
5		government department and agencies, and other		
6		persons on the requirements of chapter 343; and		
7		(B) Conducting public education programs on		
8		environmental quality control;		
9		provided that the office shall adopt rules in		
10		accordance with chapter 91 to implement this		
11		paragraph[-]; and		
12	(12)	Identification and analysis of existing and projected		
13		housing needs. Identifying a quantity of adequate		
14		sites for housing, including rental housing, factory-		
15		built housing, and emergency shelters sufficient to		
16		meet housing demands each year for all income levels."
