A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ACUPUNCTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the regulation of medical professionals is important to ensure public safety and 2 3 promote access to quality care. Acupuncture is one of the fastest growing fields in American health care due to expanded 4 benefits under health insurance policies and medicare and is a 5 popular treatment among patients seeking an alternative to 6 prescription opioids and those with other medical conditions. 7 8 The legislature further finds that a number of state laws 9 regarding acupuncturists have not been updated in over twenty 10 years, despite the growing demand for acupuncturists, changes to 11 standards for national certifications, and expanded accredited educational programs, which now include master's and doctoral 12 13 level degrees.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to make comprehensive updates to chapter 436E, Hawaii Revised Statutes, regarding acupuncture practitioners to reflect modernized scopes of practice and licensing requirements.
