A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO DENTAL ASSISTANTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that, according to a 2016 report by the department of health, nearly one in four third graders in Hawaii has untreated tooth decay: the highest rate in the nation. More than sixty per cent of all children in Hawaii lack protective dental sealants, which are a safe and cost-effective intervention to prevent tooth decay in molar teeth.

8 The legislature further finds that this lack of access to 9 sufficient dental care has led to devastating health outcomes 10 among children, especially those in native Hawaiian and Pacific 11 Islander communities. The high rate of tooth decay among Hawaii's keiki can lead to significant pain that interferes with 12 daily activities, such as eating, learning, and socializing. 13 14 Untreated cavities also increase the risk of more serious 15 infection in the mouth and body.

16 The legislature further finds that the State lacks adequate17 and accessible dental public health infrastructure, especially



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on the neighbor islands. The 2015 Hawaii Oral Health Key 1 Findings report by the department of health suggests multiple 2 3 strategies to address the lack of adequate dental public health 4 infrastructure, including the development of community and 5 school-based dental disease prevention programs for all age groups, continued support and expansion of affordable and 6 7 accessible preventive dental care services to the State's low-8 income population, and further exploration of innovative, evidence-based strategies to expand access to underserved, high-9 10 risk populations.

11 The legislature further finds that dental assistants could 12 play an important role in improving access to dental health care 13 across the State. Although the Hawaii Dental Practice Act 14 allows dental hygienists to practice under the general 15 supervision of a dentist in public health settings, dental 16 assistants are prohibited from providing auxiliary support except under direct supervision. This undermines the efficiency 17 18 of dental hygienists in public health settings and limits the 19 reach and sustainability of community dental programs.

20 The legislature further finds that, according to the Oral
21 Health Workforce Research Center, eight states, including



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Alaska, Arizona, Maine, Maryland, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oregon, 1 2 and Wyoming, allow dental assistants to perform some tasks under indirect or general supervision without licensure, registration, 3 4 or representation on the State Board of Dentistry. Allowing dental assistants to provide limited, but essential, auxiliary 5 6 support under general supervision while in public health 7 settings would contribute to the development and sustainable implementation of community-based dental disease prevention 8 9 programs. It would also expand providers' ability to offer 10 adequate and accessible oral health services to rural 11 communities and the State's most vulnerable residents.

12 The purpose of this Act is to allow dental assistants to 13 perform limited, essential duties under the general supervision 14 of a dentist in public health settings.

15 SECTION 2. Chapter 448, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 16 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 17 and to read as follows:

18 "<u>\$448-</u> Supervision in public health settings. (a) A
19 dental assistant may operate under the supervision of any
20 licensed dentist providing support dental services in a public
21 health setting.



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1	(b)	General supervision shall be permitted in a public	
2	health setting; provided that:		
3	(1)	The supervising licensed dentist is available for	
4		consultation;	
5	(2)	The dental assistant is working directly with a	
6		licensed dental hygienist; and	
7	(3)	The supervising licensed dental hygienist is under the	
8		supervision of a licensed dentist.	
9	(c)	A dental assistant working under the general	
10	supervision of a licensed dentist and the direct supervision of		
11	a licensed dental hygienist who is under the supervision of a		
12	licensed dentist may perform the following supportive dental		
13	procedures:		
14	(1)	Taking intra-oral and extra-oral photographs, and	
15		recording or charting clinical findings as directed by	
16		the licensed dental hygienist;	
17	(2)	Exposing, processing, mounting, and labeling	
18		radiographs;	
19	(3)	Measuring and recording vital signs;	
20	(4)	Assisting the licensed dental hygienist who is	
21		performing a dental procedure on a patient, such as:	



1	<u>(A)</u>	Preparing procedural trays and armamentaria;
2	<u>(B)</u>	Retracting a patient's oral tissues to maintain
3		the field of operation during a dental procedure;
4	<u>(C)</u>	Removing debris, as is normally created and
5		accumulated during or after dental procedures by
6		the dental hygienist; and
7	(D)	Transferring dental instruments or any other
8		concept of four-handed dentistry the dental
9		hygienist requires to perform the procedure; and
10	(5) Assi	sting the licensed dental hygienist in the
11	perf	ormance of the duties of the dental hygienist as
12	requ	ested; provided that the assistance does not
13	incl	ude procedures listed in Hawaii Administrative
14	Rule	s, sections 16-79-69.5 and 16-79-69.10;
15	provided that	the dental assistant, licensed dental hygienist,
16	and licensed d	entist are employed in a public setting.
17	(d) The	supervising licensed dentist shall be responsible
18	for all delega	ted acts performed by the dental assistant.
19	(e) As u	sed in this section, "public health setting" has
20	the same meani:	ng as defined in section 447-3."
21	SECTION 3	. New statutory material is underscored.
