### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the ohana zones 2 pilot program enacted under Act 209, Session Laws of Hawaii 3 2018, and Act 128, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, has thus far 4 been effective at serving its intended purposes. A total of 5 sixteen projects, including twenty different sites, are 6 supported by ohana zones funding. As of September 30, 2021, the 7 ohana zones program has served over five-thousand individuals 8 statewide and placed more than one-thousand individuals into 9 permanent housing. The program has preserved or added 10 approximately eight-hundred beds and units in shelter and 11 housing inventory. The program has also led to the development 12 of innovative programs addressing homelessness, such as the 13 Homeless Outreach and Navigation for Unsheltered Persons (HONU) 14 program.
- 15 The purpose of this Act is to:
- 16 (1) Provide additional funding to the ohana zones program;

- 13 expend any appropriation transferred pursuant to this section
- 14 for the performance of its duties under the pilot program and
- 15 may contract with any county or county agency in implementing

- 19 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2022.
