A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE STATE PROCUREMENT POLICY BOARD.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that boards and
 commissions provide an opportunity for citizens to have a voice
 in government and provide a means to influence decisions that
 shape the quality of life for the residents of the State.
 However, vacancies on these boards and commissions pose
 challenges for some agencies in fulfilling their duties.

7 The state procurement policy board is one example of 8 vacancies hampering state processes. The board was formed to 9 adopt, amend, or repeal administrative rules to carry out and 10 effectuate the purpose and provisions of chapter 103D, Hawaii 11 Revised Statutes, known as the Hawaii public procurement code, 12 which governs the State's procurement, management, control, and 13 disposal of any and all goods, services, and construction, and 14 chapter 103F, which governs the State's purchase of health and 15 human services. Other duties of the board are to consider and decide matters of policy, including those referred by a chief 16 17 procurement officer, audit and monitor the implementation of its



1	rules and the requirements of applicable statutes, and consider
2	applicants for the position of the state procurement
3	administrator. Unfortunately, because of vacancies on the
4	board, vital tasks are left pending. Repealing the policy
5	procurement board and transferring its duties to the state
6	procurement administrator will increase efficiency in government
7	and facilitate the rule-making process and procurement in the
8	State.
9	The purpose of this Act is to:
10	(1) Repeal the state procurement policy board, including
11	the policy board nominating committee;
12	(2) Amend the appointment process of the administrator of
13	the state procurement office; and
14	(3) Transfer the authority and responsibilities of the
15	state procurement policy board to the administrator of
16	the state procurement office.
17	SECTION 2. Section 103D-104, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
18	amended as follows:
19	1. By amending the definition of "responsible bidder or
20	offeror" to read:

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1	""Responsible bidder or offeror" means a person who has the
2	capability in all respects to perform fully the contract
3	requirements, and the integrity and reliability that will assure
4	good faith performance, pursuant to the responsibility
5	determination standards adopted by the [policy board.] the state
6	procurement office."
7	2. By deleting the definition of "policy board".
8	[""Policy board" means the procurement policy board created
9	in section 103D-201."]
10	SECTION 3. Section 103D-106, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
11	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
12	"(b) After reasonable notice and reasonable opportunity to
13	be heard, the chief procurement officer, after consultation with
14	the using agency and the attorney general or corporation
15	counsel, as applicable, may render a written decision or issue a
16	written order providing for the assessment of an administrative
17	fine against a person found to have violated this chapter;
18	provided that:
19	(1) The amount of the fine shall be set out in rules
20	adopted by the [policy board pursuant to section 103D-
21	202;] state procurement office; and



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1	(2)	The written decision or order shall be final and
2		conclusive, subject to an administrative review under
3		section 103D-709."
4	SECT	ION 4. Section 103D-108, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
5	amended t	o read as follows:
6	"§10	3D-108 Compliance audit unit; duties and
7	responsib	ilities. The compliance audit unit shall:
8	(1)	Review and assess applicable innovations in
9		procurement methods or processes in other governmental
10		jurisdictions or as described in national or regional
11		publications;
12	(2)	Review current or proposed statutes and rules to
13		determine whether they promote fairness, efficiency,
14		and accountability in the procurement process;
15	(3)	Review selected contracts awarded pursuant to section
16		103D-304;
17	(4)	Conduct studies, research, and analyses, and make
18		reports and recommendations with respect to existing
19		and new methods of procurement and other matters
20		within the jurisdiction of the [policy board;] <u>state</u>
21		procurement office;



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1 (5) Establish and maintain a procurement library; 2 (6) Report to the appropriate agency and the chief 3 procurement officer stating the areas of noncompliance 4 and recommendations for remedial action; and 5 (7) Be present at legislative hearings [and policy board 6 meetings] to present the findings of the unit." 7 SECTION 5. Section 103D-204, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 8 amended to read as follows: 9 "§103D-204 Establishment of the state procurement office; 10 administrator. (a) There shall be a state procurement office, 11 placed for administrative purposes only, within the department 12 of accounting and general services, which shall be headed by the 13 administrator of the state procurement office. The 14 administrator shall be the chief procurement officer for those 15 governmental bodies of the executive branch as provided in 16 section [4]103D-203(a)(8)[4]. The administrator shall be a 17 full-time public official. The administrator shall serve a term 18 of four years, and shall be paid a salary not to exceed eighty-19 seven per cent of the salary of the director of human resources 20 development, without diminution during the administrator's term

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1 of office unless by general law applying to all deputies or 2 assistants to department heads. 3 (b) The administrator shall be appointed by the governor 4 [from a list of no less than three and no more than five names 5 submitted by the policy board]. The appointment of the 6 administrator shall require the advice and consent of the 7 senate. The administrator may only be removed from office by 8 the governor, provided the governor shall give prior 9 notification of [such] the removal to [the chairperson of the 10 policy board,] the president of the senate $[\tau]$ and the speaker of the house of representatives. 11 12 (C) The administrator shall have: 13 (1) A minimum of five years experience in public 14 procurement within twelve years preceding the date of 15 appointment; and 16 (2) Demonstrated executive and organizational ability. 17 (d) The administrator shall operate independently of the 18 comptroller. The administrator may appoint and dismiss a 19 private secretary without regard to chapters 76 and 89, who 20 shall serve at the administrator's pleasure. The comptroller 21 shall provide support to permit the administrator to satisfy

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1	[all of] the administrator's responsibilities as the chief
2	procurement officer for those governmental bodies of the
3	executive branch of the State for which a chief procurement
4	officer is not otherwise designated.
5	(e) Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, the
6	state procurement office shall have the authority and
7	responsibility to adopt rules, consistent with this chapter,
8	governing the procurement, management, control, and disposal of
9	any and all goods, services, and construction. All rules shall
10	be adopted in accordance with chapter 91; provided that the
11	state procurement office shall have the power to issue interim
12	rules by procurement directives, which shall be exempt from the
13	public notice, public hearing, and gubernatorial approval
14	requirements of chapter 91. The interim rules shall be
15	effective for no more than eighteen months. The state
16	procurement office shall consider and decide matters of policy
17	within the scope of this chapter including those referred to it
18	by a chief procurement officer. The state procurement office
19	shall have the power to audit and monitor the implementation of
20	its rules and the requirements of this chapter, but shall not
21	exercise authority over the award or administration of any



particular contract, or over any dispute, claim, or litigation 1 2 pertaining thereto." SECTION 6. Section 103D-206, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 3 amended to read as follows: 4 "\$103D-206 Additional duties of the administrator of the 5 procurement office. In addition to the duties referred to in 6 7 section 103D-205, the administrator shall: 8 Perform periodic review of the procurement practices (1) 9 and procedures of all governmental bodies [, in 10 collaboration with the state procurement policy 11 board;] for compliance with the procurement code; 12 Assist, advise, and guide governmental bodies in (2) matters relating to procurement; 13 Determine corrective actions; provided that if a 14 (3) procurement officer under the jurisdiction of the 15 16 administrator of the state procurement office or a 17 chief procurement officer of any of the other state entities under section 103D-203, fails to comply with 18 any determination rendered by the administrator within 19 thirty days from the date of the issuance of the 20 determination, or longer if permitted by the 21 I



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1		administrator upon request by the procurement officer
2		or a chief procurement officer, the procurement
3		officer or chief procurement officer shall be subject
4		to an administrative fine under section 103D-106, for
5		every day of noncompliance;
6	(4)	Develop and administer a statewide procurement
7		orientation and training program;
8	(5)	Develop, distribute, and maintain a procurement manual
9		for all state procurement officials; and
10	(6)	Develop, distribute, and maintain a procurement guide
11		for vendors wishing to do business with the State and
12		its counties."
13	SECT	ION 7. Section 103D-310, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14	amended b	y amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
15	"(a)	Unless the [policy board, by rules, specifies] <u>rules</u>
16	adopted b	y the state procurement office specify otherwise,
17	before su	bmitting an offer, a prospective offeror, not less than
18	ten calen	dar days prior to the day designated for opening
19	offers, sl	hall give written notice of the intention to submit an
20	offer to	the procurement officer responsible for that particular
21	procureme	nt."

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1 SECTION 8. Section 103D-408, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows: 3 "(d) Notwithstanding chapter 91, for the purposes of 4 satisfying the percentage footprint requirements under 5 subsection (c), the purchasing agency may exclude from total 6 plant footprint calculations those areas where available 7 Hawaiian plant species are not appropriate for the particular 8 landscaping needs or environmental conditions of such areas. 9 The exclusion of such areas shall be determined by procedures, 10 standards, or guidelines established by the [policy board] state 11 procurement office at the time of issuance of the invitation for 12 bids, requests for proposals, or other solicitation under this 13 chapter. [Procedures, standards, or guidelines established 14 pursuant to this subsection may be established by board action 15 notwithstanding chapter 91.]" SECTION 9. Section 103F-106, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 16

17 amended to read as follows:

18 "\$103F-106 Authority of the [procurement policy board.]
19 state procurement office. The [policy board] state procurement
20 office established under section [103D-201] 103D-204 shall adopt
21 all rules necessary to implement this chapter. All rules shall



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1 be adopted in accordance with chapter 91. The [policy board] 2 state procurement office shall consider and decide matters of 3 policy within the scope of this chapter including those referred 4 to it by chief procurement officers. The [policy board] state 5 procurement office may audit and monitor implementation of its 6 rules and the requirements of this chapter, but shall not 7 exercise authority over the award or administration of any 8 particular contract, or over any dispute or claim arising from a 9 contract."

Section 103D-201, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 8 repealed. 9 ["§103D-201 Creation and membership of the procurement 10 policy board. (a) There is hereby created an autonomous state 11 procurement policy board. The policy board shall be assigned, 12 for administrative purposes only, to the department of 13 accounting and general services.

14 (b) The policy board-shall consist of seven members.

15 Notwithstanding the limitations of section 78-4, the members of

16 the board shall include:

17 (1) The comptroller;

18 (2) A-county employee with significant high-level

19 procurement experience; and

20 (3) Five persons who shall not otherwise be full-time

21 employees of the State or any county; provided that at

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1	least one member shall be a certified professional in
2	the field of procurement, at least one member shall
3	have significant high-level, federal procurement
4	experience, and at least two members shall have
5	significant experience in the field of health and
6	human services.
7	Each appointed member shall have demonstrated sufficient
8	business or professional experience to discharge the functions
9	of the policy board. The initial and subsequent members of the
10	policy board, other than the comptroller, shall be appointed by
11	the governor from a list of three individuals for each vacant
12	position, submitted by a nominating committee composed of four
13	individuals chosen as follows: two persons appointed by the
14	governor; one person appointed by the president of the senate;
15	and one person appointed by the speaker of the house. Except as
16	provided in this section, the selection and terms of the policy
17	board members shall be subject to the requirements of section
18	26-34. No member of the policy board shall act concurrently as
19	a chief procurement officer. The members of the policy board
20	shall devote such time to their duties as may be necessary for
21	the proper discharge thereof.



1	(c) The policy board shall be assisted by employees of the
2	department of accounting and general services, which shall
3	provide at least one full-time support staff and funding
4	necessary to support the policy board.
5	(d) Members of the policy board shall be reimbursed for
6	any expenses, including travel expenses, reasonably incurred in
7	the performance of their duties.
8	(e) The chairperson of the policy board shall be elected
9	annually by a majority of its members from among all of its
10	members; provided that the state comptroller shall not be
11	eligible to serve as the chairperson."]
12	SECTION 13. Section 103D-202, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	repealed.
14	[" §103D-202 Authority and duties of the policy board.
15	Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, the policy board
16	shall have the authority and responsibility to adopt rules,
17	consistent with this chapter, governing the procurement,
18	management, control, and disposal of any and all goods,
19	services, and construction. All rules shall be adopted in
20	accordance with chapter 91; provided that the policy board shall
21	have the power to issue interim rules by procurement directives,



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1	which shall be exempt from the public notice, public hearing,
2	and gubernatorial approval requirements of chapter 91. The
3	interim rules shall be effective for not more than eighteen
4	months. The policy board shall consider and decide matters of
5	policy within the scope of this chapter including those referred
6	to it by a chief procurement officer. The policy board shall
7	have the power to audit and monitor the implementation of its
8	rules and the requirements of this chapter, but shall not
9	exercise authority over the award or administration of any
10	particular contract, or over any dispute, claim, or litigation
11	pertaining thereto."]
12	SECTION 14. The revisor of statutes shall substitute the
13	phrase "state procurement office", or similar term, wherever the
14	phrase "procurement policy board", or similar term, appears, as
15	the context requires, in any Acts of the Session Laws of Hawaii
16	2022.
17	SECTION 15. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
18	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
19	SECTION 16. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
