A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FEDERAL IMPACT AID.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the United States 2 Department of Defense is not meeting its financial obligations 3 to Hawaii's public schools. Pursuant to section 3 of United 4 States Public Law 81-874, the Department of Defense is required 5 to pay impact aid to the State to offset the financial burden on 6 the State's public education system of non-taxable military 7 lands and non-payment of income and general excise tax by 8 military personnel. However, according to the department of 9 education, in fiscal year 2019, the federal impact aid 10 reimbursement paid to the State was only 12.91 per cent of the 11 total per-pupil cost of educating eleven thousand to fourteen 12 thousand military students.

13 The legislature notes that, when reimbursing tuition for 14 federally connected students attending approved overseas 15 schools, the Department of Defense Education Activity office 16 calculates reimbursement rates using the "full cost recovery 17 method", in compliance with Government Accountability Office



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guidelines. Applying this same methodology of full cost
 recovery to military students in Hawaii, the Department of
 Defense owes the State approximately \$170,687,000 to
 \$217,238,000 for fiscal year 2019 alone.

5 The legislature recognizes that income tax and general 6 excise tax are the primary sources of funding for the department of education. When Department of Defense families utilize the 7 State's public education system without paying full, or any, 8 9 income or excise taxes, and the Department of Defense does not fully reimburse the State for these students' educational costs, 10 11 Hawaii residents and taxpayers effectively, and unfairly, subsidize the military students' education. Over decades, this 12 amounts to several billion dollars owed by the Department of 13 Defense to the State for costs incurred by Hawaii's residents. 14 15 The legislature finds that an annual report to the legislature and the public is needed to hold the Department of Defense 16 accountable for moneys owed. 17

18 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to require the 19 department of education to provide to the legislature and 20 publish on the department's website an annual summary of the



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federal impact aid owed and paid by the United States Department
 of Defense.

3 SECTION 2. (a) No later than twenty days prior to the 4 convening of the regular session of 2023 and no later than 5 twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session 6 thereafter, the department of education shall report to the 7 legislature and publish on the department's website a summary of 8 the federal impact aid owed and paid by the United States 9 Department of Defense pursuant to section 3 of United States 10 Public Law 81-874.

(b) Information reported to the legislature and publishedon the department's website annually shall include:

13 The total number of federally connected and military (1)14 students attending department of education schools and 15 the per-pupil cost of the students' education; 16 (2) The full cost recovery method calculation for federal 17 impact aid reimbursement owed for the year, in 18 compliance with Government Accountability Office 19 guidelines;

20 (3) The basic support payment calculation for federal
21 impact aid reimbursement owed for the year; and



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1	(4) The total amount of federal impact aid paid that year
2	by the Department of Defense.
3	SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
