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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ACCESS TO BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that emergency 2 governmental proclamations to restrict and manage in-person 3 gatherings and meetings during the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic have suspended certain laws that exclude the 4 5 use of standard telephone contacts from the definition of "telehealth" to enable health care providers and patients to 6 7 minimize in-person meetings while also ensure access to care. Additionally, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services 8 9 recently made permanent coverage changes to include audio-only 10 (telephone) services used in the treatment of mental health and 11 substance abuse issues, which will allow federally qualified health centers and rural health clinics to use telehealth to 12 13 care for patients in their own homes.

14 The availability of insurance reimbursement for telehealth 15 provided through standard telephone contacts has greatly 16 increased access to care for vulnerable populations, including 17 the elderly, low-income, medically- and socially-complex

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capabilities, electronic equipment, financial means, 2 transportation options, or technological proficiency to operate 3 4 sophisticated digital video conferencing software. Allowing 5 standard telephone contacts to qualify as "telehealth" also 6 avoids problems with devices, internet, sufficient bandwidth, power and battery charging capabilities, and digital literacy. 7 8 The legislature further finds that the prolonged nature of 9 the public health emergency created by COVID-19 and its 10 attendant personal, familial, work, social, and economic 11 disruptions have created chronic and unprecedented emotional 12 distress, anxiety, and mental conditions for all of Hawaii's 13 communities. The demand for mental health services has never 14 been so high. 15 Research has found standard telephone contacts to be an 16 effective, viable means for providing timely mental health 17 services to patients. Talk therapy and other audio-only 18 treatment modalities do not require physical examinations or 19 medical prescriptions. As recently noted by the department of 20 human services in testimony submitted in support of a similar 21 measure (which was broadly and enthusiastically supported by the

patients, and those in rural areas who do not have the broadband

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1 medical community with the exception of the health insurance 2 companies), "telephone calls have been shown to be clinically 3 effective for some services such as behavioral health." 4 Moreover, standard telephone contacts for telehealth purposes is 5 endorsed nationally by the American Psychological Association.

6 The legislature further finds that allowing the use of 7 standard telephone contacts for telehealth purposes related to 8 behavioral health services is not a new mandate that would 9 trigger an auditor's impact assessment, but is simply an 10 additional telehealth modality to further support existing 11 coverage requirements, and establishes parity with the services 12 covered under medicare and medicaid.

13 Therefore, the purpose of this Act is to allow for the use 14 and reimbursement of standard telephone contacts for telehealth 15 purposes by mental health professionals.

16 SECTION 2. Section 346-59.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 17 amended by amending subsection (g) to read as follows:

18 "(g) For the purposes of this section:

Section 453-1.3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 21 amended by amending subsection (h) to read as follows:



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1 "(h) Reimbursement for behavioral health services provided 2 through telehealth, including standard telephone contacts, shall 3 be equivalent to reimbursement for the same services provided 4 via face-to-face contact between a health care provider and a 5 patient." 6 SECTION 7. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 7 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

8 SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2050.
