## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TEACHER COMPENSATION.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the recruitment and
- 2 retention of qualified teachers is essential to the success of
- 3 Hawaii's public education system. The State continues to face a
- 4 chronic teacher shortage, which undermines student learning and
- 5 achievement. For the 2018-2019 school year, the department of
- 6 education experienced a qualified teacher shortage of one
- 7 thousand twenty-nine positions.
- 8 The legislature further finds that research indicates that
- 9 competitive and equitable compensation correlates with greater
- 10 success in recruiting and retaining qualified educators. Yet,
- 11 numerous studies have shown that Hawaii's teacher salaries are
- 12 the lowest in the nation when adjusted for the State's high cost
- 13 of living.
- 14 The legislature also finds that teacher salaries are
- 15 unequal when experienced senior teachers are aligned with less
- 16 senior teachers in their placement within the existing salary
- 17 schedules. Unfair pay scales have driven experienced senior

- 1 teachers to either retire early or leave the profession, due to
- 2 the perception that their experience and dedication to public
- 3 education and the teaching profession will never be adequately
- 4 valued and recognized.
- 5 The legislature further finds that an increasing number of
- 6 school districts around the country are utilizing compensation
- 7 methods and strategies designed to improve the recruitment and
- 8 retention of qualified teachers.
- 9 The legislature additionally finds that subsection (c) of
- 10 section 302A-624, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is outdated and
- 11 conflicts with the intent of this Act, and should be repealed.
- 12 The purpose of this Act is to:
- (1) Repeal section 302A-624(c), Hawaii Revised Statutes;
- 14 and
- 15 (2) Fund an experimental modernization project pursuant to
- section 78-3.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to address
- 17 compensation equity issues and to make the necessary
- discretionary salary adjustments for approximately
- 19 eight thousand seven hundred experienced senior
- 20 teachers by recognizing their professional service to

1		the department of education through discretionary
2		salary adjustments.
3	SECT	TION 2. Section 302A-624, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended t	o read as follows:
5	"§30	2A-624 Teachers' salary schedule. (a) The salary
6	schedule	for all teachers of the department shall be negotiated
7	pursuant	to section 89-9.
8	(b)	All teachers shall meet the following requirements:
9	(1)	A teacher shall earn at least five credits within a
10		three-year cycle to receive increment or longevity
11		step increases in the third year of the three-year
12		cycle;
13	(2)	A teacher who fails to meet the requirement set forth
14		in paragraph (1) shall not be eligible for any
15		increment or longevity step increases until the
16		teacher earns the credit requirement for the three-
17		year cycle;
18	(3)	Any credit earned in excess of any three-year credit
19		requirement may not be carried over beyond the three-
20		year cycle; and

             Credits earned may be in the form of in-service,
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              university, or other credits approved by the
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              department.
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         [(c) A teacher shall be required to spend at least one
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    year in Class III before going on to Class IV, at least one year
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    in Class IV before going on to Class V, at least one year in
    Class V before going on to Class VI, and at least one year in
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    Class VI before going on to Class VII.
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         [<del>(d)</del>] (c) In the case of promotion from a teaching
    position to an educational officer, the employee shall receive
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    compensation at the lowest step of the higher grade that exceeds
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    the employee's existing compensation by at least eight per cent
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    if such a step exists.
         [<del>(e)</del>] (d) Effective July 1, 2006, the minimum hourly or
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    minimum per diem rate for substitute teachers shall be
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    determined by the legislature as follows; provided that any
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    individual in Class I, II, or III who works less than a full
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    seven-hour work day shall be compensated on a pro-rated, hourly
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    basis:
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1	(1)	Class I: other individuals who do not possess a	
2		bachelor's degree shall be compensated at a rate of	
3		not less than \$125 for a full work day;	
4	(2)	Class II: individuals with a bachelor's degree shall	
5		be compensated at a rate of not less than \$136 for a	
6		full work day; and	
7	(3)	Class III: department of education teachers, or	
8		licensed or highly qualified teachers, shall be	
9		compensated at a rate of not less than \$147 for a full	
10		work day.	
11	[ <del>(f)</del>	(e) Effective July 1, 2008, the board shall provide	
12	wage adjustments for substitute teachers. The wage adjustments		
13	shall be comparable to the across-the-board wage adjustments for		
14	teachers	that are negotiated for bargaining unit (5) subject to	
15	legislative approval, pursuant to section 89C-5. The board may		
16	also adjust hours, benefits, and other terms and conditions of		
17	employment for substitute teachers."		
18	SECT	ION 3. There is appropriated out of the general	
19	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so	
20	much there	eof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 to	
21	fund an e	xperimental modernization project pursuant to section	

- 1 78-3.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as negotiated between the
- 2 superintendent of education and the exclusive representative of
- 3 collective bargaining unit (5) in a memorandum of understanding
- 4 to address compensation equity issues and make the necessary
- 5 discretionary salary adjustments for approximately eight
- 6 thousand seven hundred teachers whose current base salary does
- 7 not reflect their years of professional service; provided that
- 8 the moneys shall not be released until the memorandum of
- 9 understanding is executed between the superintendent of
- 10 education and the exclusive representative of collective
- 11 bargaining unit (5).
- 12 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 13 education for the purposes of this Act.
- 14 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 15 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 16 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for
- 17 charter schools (EDN 600) to fund an experimental modernization
- 18 project pursuant to section 78-3.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as
- 19 negotiated between the governing boards of state public charter
- 20 schools and the exclusive representative of collective
- 21 bargaining unit (5) in a memorandum of understanding to address

- 1 compensation equity issues and make the necessary discretionary
- 2 salary adjustments for teachers whose current base salary does
- 3 not reflect their years of professional service; provided that
- 4 the moneys shall not be released until the memorandum of
- 5 understanding is executed between the governing boards of state
- 6 public charter schools and the exclusive representative of
- 7 collective bargaining unit (5).
- 8 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the state public
- 9 charter school commission for the purposes of this Act.
- 10 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 11 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 12 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2022.
