A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE STATE BUILDING CODE COUNCIL.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the state building
- 2 code council was established by Act 82, Session Laws of Hawaii
- 3 2007, to create and implement a uniform set of statewide
- 4 building codes applicable to all construction in the State of
- 5 Hawai'i, which is now known as the Hawai'i state building codes.
- 6 The legislature believes that health and safety considerations
- 7 related to the state building codes are matters of statewide
- 8 concern.
- 9 The legislature further finds that the state building code
- 10 council has struggled with limited funding and insufficient
- 11 staffing since its creation. It is also a concern that the
- 12 members of the state building code council may lack the required
- 13 experience in and knowledge on building codes and the cost
- 14 impacts of building code revisions. Amendments to the state
- 15 building codes proposed by the private sector and others that
- 16 may financially benefit from the adoption of the proposed
- 17 amendments, especially amendments to codes that do not pertain



- 1 to public health or safety, are often adopted without a cost
- 2 benefit analysis; input from residential, commercial, and
- 3 industrial builders; or consideration of the resulting increase
- 4 in the overall cost of construction in Hawai'i.
- 5 The legislature also finds that the state building code
- 6 council is significantly burdened by its duty to update the
- 7 state building codes to conform to the International Building
- 8 Code (IBC), since a new edition of the international code is
- 9 published by the International Code Council every three years.
- 10 The frequent updates affect not only the council, but also
- 11 county building departments that must spend hundreds of
- 12 workhours revising the county codes to reflect the updates; the
- 13 construction industry that must spend considerable time and
- 14 effort in learning the new codes and retraining workers; and
- 15 consumers that are subject to the resulting increase in building
- 16 costs and delays in permit processing.
- 17 Despite the work performed by the state building code
- 18 council, the decision to adopt the state building codes into
- 19 county building codes ultimately rests with each individual
- 20 county. The legislature finds that this two-step process
- 21 results in delays to the adoption of building codes and

- 1 increases to the cost of construction in Hawai'i, especially when
- 2 repeated every three years.
- 3 Therefore, the purpose of this Act is to amend part II,
- 4 chapter 107, Hawaii Revised Statutes, titled state building code
- 5 and design standards, to:
- 6 (1) Add one voting member to the state building code
- 7 council representing the Hawai'i chapter of the
- 8 National Association of Industrial and Office
- 9 Properties;
- 10 (2) Add one voting member to the state building code
- 11 council representing the construction trade unions;
- 12 (3) Require voting members of the state building code
- 13 council and persons drafting recommended state
- amendments to the codes to disclose all potential
- financial interests, relating to their
- 16 recommendations; and
- 17 (4) Require the state building code council to adopt every
- other new edition of the IBC instead of every new
- edition, starting with the adoption of the 2018
- 20 edition. This will enlarge the adoption cycle from
- three years to six years, which is consistent with

1	past code adoption cycles by the countles and many
2	other building codes and standards referenced in the
3	IBC.
4	SECTION 2. Section 107-22, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
5	amended to read as follows:
6	"§107-22 State building code council. (a) There is
7	established a state building code council. The council shall be
8	placed within the department of accounting and general services
9	for administrative purposes only. The council shall consist of
10	[eleven] thirteen voting members and one nonvoting member, who
11	shall be the comptroller or the comptroller's designee. The
12	council members shall serve four-year terms. The voting members
13	shall include:
14	(1) One county building official from each of the four
15	counties appointed by the mayor;
16	(2) One member representing the state fire council;
17	(3) One member representing the department of labor and
18	industrial relations who has significant experience in
19	elevator safety;

1	(4)	One member representing the state energy office of the
2		department of business, economic development, and
3		tourism;
4	(5)	One member representing the Structural Engineers
5		Association of Hawaii;
6	(6)	One member representing the American Institute of
7		Architects, Hawaii State Council;
8	(7)	One member representing the Building Industry
9		Association of Hawaii or the General Contractors
10		Association of Hawaii, who has significant experience
11		with building codes, with alternating four-year terms
12		between the two organizations and the first four-year
13		term to be served by the Building Industry Association
14		of Hawaii; [and]
15	(8)	One member representing the Subcontractors'
16		Association of Hawaii who has significant experience
17		with building codes[+];
18	(9)	One member representing the Hawaii chapter of the
19		National Association of Industrial and Office
20		Properties; and

(10) One member representing the construction trade unions 1 2 in Hawaii. 3 (b) [Seven] Eight voting members shall constitute a The chairperson of the council shall be elected 4 5 annually from among its members by a majority vote of the 6 members of the council. (c) Members shall serve without compensation, but shall be 7 8 reimbursed for expenses, including travel expenses necessary for 9 the performance of their duties." SECTION 3. Section 107-24, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 10 11 amended to read as follows: "§107-24 Authority and duties of the council. (a) 12 Any law to the contrary notwithstanding, the council shall establish 13 14 the Hawaii state building codes. 15 The council shall appoint a subcommittee comprising (b) 16 the four council members representing county building officials, whose duty shall be to recommend any necessary or desirable 17 18 state amendments to the codes and standards identified in 19 section 107-25. Any recommended state amendments shall require

the unanimous agreement of the subcommittee.

1	(c) All voting members, members recommending a state
2	amendment to the codes, and any person drafting the
3	recommendation shall disclose all potential conflicts of
4	financial interests relating to the recommended amendment to the
5	council in writing prior to a member making a recommendation.
6	$[\frac{(c)}{(c)}]$ The council shall adopt, amend, or update codes
7	and standards identified in section 107-25 on a staggered basis
8	as established by the council; provided that the adoption of the
9	International Building Code shall be every six years, starting
10	with the adoption of the 2018 edition; provided further that
11	adoption of a code or standard shall be within two years of the
12	official publication date of the code or standard, pursuant to
13	chapter 92, and exempt from the requirements of chapter 91. If
14	the council does not adopt a code or standard identified in
15	section 107-25 within the two-year time period, that code or
16	standard shall automatically become part of the Hawaii state
17	building code until superseded by the adoption of an amended
18	version of the code or standard by the council pursuant to this
19	subsection.

1 [(d)] (e) The council may appoint other investigative, 2 technical expertise committees, which may include council 3 members. 4 [(e)] (f) The council shall consult with general building 5 contractor associations and building trade associations to 6 gather information and recommendations on construction practices 7 and training relevant to building codes and standards. 8 $\left[\frac{f}{f}\right]$ (g) The council may make expenditures for technical 9 references, equipment and supplies, and other operating 10 expenses, and may contract for the conduct of research studies 11 and other technical services. 12 [(q)] (h) The council may provide education and technical 13 training and administrative assistance in the form of services 14 or grants at the state and county levels relating to the 15 implementation and enforcement of the Hawaii state building 16 codes adopted pursuant to this part. 17 [(h)] (i) At the end of each fiscal year, the council 18 shall submit a written report to the governor on the council's 19 activities, including the codes and standards adopted, amended,

or updated by the council."



Requires council members and the drafters of recommended state code amendments to disclose potential conflicts of financial interests. Requires the council to adopt the International Building Code every six years starting with the 2018 edition.
