A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO KUPUNA CARE PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to improve
- 2 government efficiency by amending part II of chapter 349, Hawaii
- 3 Revised Statutes, entitled kupuna care and caregiver support
- 4 services, to incorporate the kupuna caregivers program into the
- 5 kupuna care program.
- 6 SECTION 2. Section 349-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 7 amended as follows:
- 8 1. By adding four new definitions to be appropriately
- 9 inserted and to read:
- ""Caregiver" means a spouse, adult child, other relative,
- 11 partner, or friend who has a personal relationship with and
- 12 provides a broad range of unpaid assistance for an older adult
- 13 having a chronic or disabling condition.
- 14 "Caregiver support services" means services that offer
- 15 education, skills, knowledge, or mental, emotional, or social
- 16 support to employed caregivers.
- 17 "Employed caregiver" means an individual who:



- 1 (1) Provides care for a care recipient; and
- 2 (2) Is employed at least twenty hours per week by one or
- more employers or is self-employed.
- 4 "Financial management service provider" means an agency
- 5 under contract with the executive office on aging to act as the
- 6 fiscal and employer agent on behalf of a care recipient to
- 7 manage employer-related functions, process payment to employees
- 8 and vendors, and monitor the care recipient's allocation of
- 9 funds."
- 10 2. By amending the definitions of "aging and disability
- 11 resource centers" and "attendant care" to read:
- ""Aging and disability resource centers" means an entity
- 13 established by the State as part of the state system of long-
- 14 term care, serving as a highly visible and trusted source where
- 15 people of all incomes and ages can [get] obtain information on
- 16 the full range of long-term support options, and as a single
- 17 point of entry for access to public long-term support programs
- 18 and benefits.
- 19 "Attendant care" means standby assistance, supervision, or
- 20 cues, including verbal prompts for medication, bathing, eating,
- 21 grooming, and dressing, and may also include other activities to

- 1 help maintain the independence of an individual at home.
- 2 "Attendant care" does not include physical contact in support,
- 3 including [but not limited to] weight-bearing assistance with
- 4 transfers, washing, bathing, and dressing."
- 5 3. By amending the definitions of "care recipient" and
- 6 "case management" to read:
- 7 ""Care recipient" means an individual who:
- 8 (1) Is a citizen of the United States or a qualified
- 9 alien; provided that for the purposes of this
- paragraph, "qualified alien" means a lawfully admitted
- 11 permanent resident under the Immigration and
- 12 Nationality Act;
- (2) Is sixty years of age or older;
- 14 (3) Is not covered by any comparable government or private
- home- and community-based care service, except or
- 16 excluding kupuna care services;
- 17 (4) Does not reside in a long-term care facility, such as
- an intermediate care facility, assisted living
- facility, skilled nursing facility, hospital, adult
- 20 foster [family] home, community care foster family
- 21 home, adult residential care home, [or] expanded adult

3	(5)	Has	impairments of at least:
4		(A)	Two activities of daily living;
5		(B)	Two instrumental activities of daily living;
6		(C)	One activity of daily living and one instrumental

8		(D)	Substantive cognitive impairment requiring
9			substantial supervision because the individual
10			behaves in a manner that poses a serious health
11			or safety hazard to the individual or another
12			person.
13	"Cas	e man	agement" means assistance either in the form of
14	access or	care	coordination in circumstances where an individual
15	is experi	encin	g diminished functioning capacities, personal
16	condition	s, or	other characteristics that require the provision
17	of service	es by	formal service providers, caregivers, or [family]
18	employed	careg	ivers. Activities of case management may include
19	assessing	need	s, developing care plans, authorizing and
20	coordinat	ing s	ervices among providers, and providing follow-up
21	and reass	essme	ent. as required."

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         4. By amending the definition of "homemaker services" to
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    read:
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         ""Homemaker [services]" means a person who provides
    assistance with preparing meals, shopping for personal items,
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    managing money, using the telephone, or performing light
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    housework."
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         5. By amending the definitions of "kupuna care core
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    services", "person-centered planning", and "person-centered
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    support plan" or "support plan" to read:
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         ""Kupuna care [core] services" means [services-consisting
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    <del>of</del>]:
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         (1) Services for the employed caregiver, including:
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              (A) Adult day care;
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              (B) Respite care; and
              (C) Caregiver support services;
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         (2) Services for the care recipient, including:
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              (A) Attendant care;
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        [\frac{(3)}{(3)}] (B) Case management;
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              (C) Care coordination;
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        [\frac{4}{1}] (D) Chores;
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        [<del>(5)</del>] (E) Homemaker [services];
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1 [(6)] (F) Home-delivered meals; 2 $[\frac{(7)}{}]$ (G) Personal care; 3 [(8)] (H) Transportation; or 4 $[\frac{(9)}{(1)}]$ (I) Assisted transportation. "Person-centered planning" means a process, [directed by 5 6 the care recipient, intended to identify the strengths, 7 capacities, preferences, needs, and desired outcomes of the care 8 recipient[-], caregiver, or employed caregiver. 9 "Person-centered support plan" or "support plan" means a 10 plan developed by a care recipient [with the assistance of a 11 coach], caregiver, or employed caregiver that allows the care 12 recipient, caregiver, or employed caregiver to establish the 13 goals, skills, and knowledge necessary to work toward the 14 desired outcomes and lays out practical steps toward the 15 achievement of the goals; provided that family members and friends may provide assistance in developing a care recipient's 16 17 plan if the care recipient chooses to include them." 6. By amending the definition of "respite care" to read: 18 ""Respite care" means services that offer temporary, 19

substitute supports, or living arrangements for care recipients

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1 to provide a brief period of rest to [qualified] employed 2 caregivers. "Respite care" includes: In-home respite (personal care, homemaker [services], 3 (1)4 and other in-home respite); (2) 5 Respite provided by attendance of the care recipient 6 at a nonresidential program; 7 (3) Institutional respite provided by placing the care 8 recipient in an institutional setting such as a 9 nursing home for a short period of time as a respite service to the employed caregiver; and 10 11 (4)Any combination of services to assist the employed 12 caregiver as deemed appropriate by the area agency on aging." 13 14 7. By deleting the definition of "coach". 15 ["-Coach" means an individual who: 16 (1) Helps the care recipient understand the program of 17 participant-directed services-and support; 18 (2) Develops and implements a spending plan to describe 19 how the care recipient will spend the care recipient's 20 budget; and

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         (3) Evaluates whether the participant directed service and
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              support program is meeting the care recipient's
              needs."
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             By deleting the definition of "family caregivers".
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         [""Family caregivers" means a spouse, adult child, other
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    relative, partner, or friend who has a personal relationship
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    with, and provides a broad range of unpaid assistance for an
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    older adult with a chronic or disabling condition."]
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         9. By deleting the definition of "qualified caregiver".
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         [""Qualified caregiver" means an individual who meets the
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    following requirements:
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         (1) Provides care for a care recipient; and
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              Is employed at least thirty hours per week by one or

              more employers."]
         SECTION 3. Section 349-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
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    amended to read as follows:
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         "§349-17 Kupuna care program. (a) The executive office
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    on aging may establish the kupuna care program. The program
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    shall provide an array of long-term services and supports to
    address the needs of Hawaii's older adults (and their desire to
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    remain in their own homes and communities as they age.] to age
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Ţ	in place and avoid institutionalization and to provide support
2	services to caregivers or employed caregivers in their efforts
3	to assist older adults to continue residing in their homes.
4	(b) The program shall be coordinated and administered by
5	the executive office on aging and implemented through the area
6	agencies on aging.
7	(c) To qualify for the kupuna care program, an individual
8	shall be a care recipient, caregiver, or employed caregiver as
9	defined in section 349-16.
10	(d) An area agency on aging, through the aging and
11	disability resource center or any other entity designated by the
12	executive office on aging, shall determine eligibility for the
13	program, which may include the following:
14	(1) An intake process to preliminarily determine
15	eligibility for publicly funded services and supports,
16	including kupuna care services;
17	(2) A comprehensive in-home assessment of the care
18	recipient or a caregiver assessment, if necessary; and
19	(3) A written, individualized, person-centered support

plan that identifies all services and supports needed

or currently used to meet the needs of the care

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1	recipient, caregiver, or employed caregiver, including
2	those provided by other programs such as medicaid or
3	privately paid programs.
4	(e) An area agency on aging shall use the assessment data
5	and individual's support plan to confirm kupuna care program
6	eligibility before authorizing and coordinating services and
7	supports. An area agency on aging shall authorize and allot
8	kupuna care services and shall not delegate the service
9	authorization function to the agency's subcontractors.
10	$[\frac{(e)}{(f)}]$ The kupuna care program shall be delivered
11	through two distinct service options: traditional service
12	delivery or participant-directed services and support, based on
13	an [individual] individualized, person-centered support plan for
14	each eligible care recipient[+], caregiver, or employed
15	<pre>caregiver; provided that:</pre>
16	(1) Traditional service delivery shall be \underline{by} a service
17	provider [organization or person who provides services
18	to clients under a formal contractual arrangement with
19	the executive office on aging or area agency on aging
20	who shall deliver to each care recipient one or more
21	kupuna care core services to address the care

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I		recipient's specific needs that have been identified
2		in the care recipient's person centered support plan;
3		and] that provides services to care recipients,
4		caregivers, and employed caregivers under a formal
5		contractual arrangement with the executive office on
6		aging or applicable area agency on aging; and
7	(2)	Participant-directed services and support shall
8		address the care recipient's assessed needs [that have
9		been identified through the person centered planning
10		process and documented in the support plan.
11		Participant directed services and support shall
12		consist of long term services and supports that a care
13		recipient uses to maintain independence in the
14		community, in which the care recipient determines what
15		mix of services and support will address the care
16		recipient's needs.] through person-centered planning.
17		The care recipient shall have decision-making
18		authority over [the care recipient's budgeted dollar
19		amount] their own budget to purchase and manage [the]
20		their needed services and supports based upon [the
21		care recipient's] their person-centered support plan.

1	(Participant directed services and support snair
2	provide the care recipient with a coach to assist the
3	care recipient with using the services and support in
4	a manner that best supports the care recipient's
5	ability to maintain independence and enable a quality
6	living experience in the community.
7	(d) To qualify for the kupuna care program, an individual
8	shall be a care recipient as defined in section 349-16.
9	(e) An area agency on aging, through the aging and
10	disability resource center or other entity designated by the
11	executive office on aging, shall conduct an intake and
12	assessment-of individuals seeking-long-term-services and
13	supports to determine eligibility for the program. The intake
14	and assessment shall include the following:
15	(1) A statewide uniform intake process developed with and
16	adopted by the executive office on aging to
17	preliminarily determine eligibility for publicly
18	funded services and supports, including kupuna care
19	services; and
20	(2) An assessment of the eligible care recipient utilizing
21	a statewide, uniform comprehensive in home assessment,

1	if necessary. Upon completion of the in home
2	assessment, the care recipient develops a written
3	individualized person centered support plan with:
4	(A) The assistance of a coach in the preparation of
5	the support plan; and
6	(B) Participation from family, friends, and others,
7	if the care recipient desires such additional
8	assistance.
9	The support plan identifies all the services and
10	supports needed or currently used to meet the care
11	recipient's needs, both formal and informal, including
12	those provided by other programs such as medicaid or
13	private paid programs. The plan shall be reviewed
14	with the care recipient to confirm that it is the plan
15	the care recipient desires.
16	(f) An area agency on aging shall use the assessment data
17	and individual's support plan to confirm kupuna care program
18	eligibility, then authorize and coordinate services and
19	supports. An area agency on aging shall directly authorize and
20	allot kupuna care services, and shall not delegate the service
21	authorization function to its subcontractors.

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              An individual shall be determined to be ineligible for
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    kupuna care services when:
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         (1)
              [An] The individual does not meet the eligibility
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              requirements specified;
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         (2)
              [An individual] The individual's need is not
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              substantiated through an in-home assessment;
              [An] The individual leaves the State or the
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         (3)
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              individual's whereabouts are unknown; or
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         (4)
              [An] The individual refuses services.
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              An area agency on aging shall provide an individual
         (h)
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    with written notice of the disposition of [the request]
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    ineligibility for kupuna care services.
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         (i) An individual who has been determined ineligible for
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    kupuna care services shall have the opportunity to appeal the
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    decision to the [director of the executive office on aging
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    within ninety days after the date of notice of the area agency
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    on aging's written disposition. The director of the executive
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    office on aging's decision on the appeal shall be issued in
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    writing and shall be final.] applicable area agency on aging.
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         (j) Prior to termination of kupuna care services, service
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providers shall notify the [appropriate contracting] applicable

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- 1 area agency on aging of the date and reason for termination.
- 2 Termination of kupuna care services may occur if the care
- 3 recipient[+], caregiver, or employed caregiver:
- 4 (1) Moves and the provider is unable to locate the care
- f recipient[+], caregiver, or employed caregiver;
- 6 (2) Is transferred to another area agency on aging;
- 7 (3) Dies;
- 8 (4) No longer needs or wants kupuna care services and
- 9 supports, or no longer needs or wants a particular
- kupuna care service or support;
- 11 (5) Is uncooperative with the service provider;
- 12 (6) Is noncompliant with the basic requirements of the
- program;
- 14 (7) Engages in behavior that threatens or demonstrates
- violence toward the service provider;
- 16 (8) Is placed or resides in a long-term care facility,
- 17 such as an intermediate care facility, assisted living
- facility, skilled nursing facility, hospital,
- 19 community care foster [eare] family home, adult foster
- 20 [family] home, adult residential care home, [or]

1		expanded adult residential care nome[+], or
2		developmental disabilities domiciliary home;
3	(9)	Uses comparable services from other programs; or
4	(10)	Has a communicable disease that threatens the safety
5		and welfare of the service provider.
6	(k)	All area agencies on aging shall record all consumer
7	data, ass	essments, and service delivery within a statewide
8	consolida	ted database.
9	(1)	The kupuna care program shall award an allocation of
10	funds to	cover costs for services, subject to availability of
11	funding;	provided that the allocated funds shall be issued
12	directly	to the service provider or financial management service
13	provider	upon request and receipt of an invoice for services
14	rendered.	
15	[(1)] $\underline{\text{(m)}}$ The director may adopt rules pursuant to chapter
16	91 necess	ary for the purposes of this section."
17	SECT	ION 4. Section 349-18, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
18	repealed.	
19	[" §3	49-18 Kupuna caregivers program. (a) The executive
20	office on	aging may establish the kupuna caregivers program.

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    The program shall provide assistance to a qualified caregiver
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    who meets the requirements of this section.
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         (b) The program shall be coordinated and administered by
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    the executive office on aging and implemented through the area

    agency on aging. The executive office on aging shall develop
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    and implement a plan to maximize the number of caregivers served
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    by the program.
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         (c) The kupuna caregivers program shall award an
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    allocation of funds, subject to the availability of funding and
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    up to a maximum of $210 per week, to cover costs for services
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    that would otherwise be performed by the qualified caregiver for
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    the care recipient, including but not limited to:
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         (1) Care-coordination-or-case-management;
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         (2) Adult day care;
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         (3) Assisted transportation;
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         (4) Chores;
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         (5) Home-delivered meals;
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         <del>(6)</del>
              Homemaker services;
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         (7) Personal care:
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         (8) Respite care; or
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         (9) Transportation;
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- 1 provided that the allocated funds shall be issued directly to
- 2 the service provider upon request and receipt of an invoice for
- 3 services rendered.
- 4 (d) The director may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91
- 5 necessary for the purposes of this section."]
- 6 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 7 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 8 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
