A BILL FOR AN ACT

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION REGARDING THE FREEDOM OF SPEECH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the United States 2 Supreme Court's decision in Citizens United v. Federal Election 3 Commission, 558 U.S. 310 (2010), reversed long-standing campaign 4 finance restrictions and designated corporate spending on 5 elections as free speech protected under the First Amendment of 6 the Constitution of the United States. The decision removed any 7 limits on the amount of money that corporations, special 8 interest groups, and political action committees (PACs) could 9 spend on an election. The legislature further finds that the 10 decision in Citizens United is a serious threat to our 11 democracy. Corporations enjoy various advantages, including 12 limited liability, perpetual life, and favorable treatment in 13 the accumulation and distribution of assets, which allow them to 14 amass and spend an extraordinary amount of money on political 15 messages that often have far greater reach and influence than 16 messages from individuals. During the twelve years since the



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Citizens United decision, there has been a massive increase in
political spending by corporations, special interest groups, and
PACs, dramatically expanding their already outsized political
influence on election outcomes and policy decisions.

5 The legislature also finds that at least twenty states, 6 including Hawaii in 2016, have passed legislation urging 7 Congress to pass a proposed constitutional amendment that 8 overturns the decision in *Citizens United*; however, Congress has 9 failed to take any such action and appears unlikely to do so.

10 The purpose of this Act is to propose a symbolic amendment 11 to article I, section 4, of the Hawaii State Constitution to 12 provide that the expenditure of money to influence elections is 13 not a form of speech protected under the Hawaii State 14 Constitution. The legislature acknowledges that this Act will have no binding effect on the Constitution of the United States, 15 nor will it change the outcomes of the Citizens United decision. 16 However, the power to amend state constitutions rests with the 17 people of each state, and the legislature believes it is 18 19 critical that the State of Hawaii express its disapproval of the 20 Citizen United decision.

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1	SECTION 2. Article I, section 4, of the Constitution of
2	the State of Hawaii is amended to read as follows:
3	"FREEDOM OF RELIGION, SPEECH, PRESS,
4	ASSEMBLY AND PETITION
5	Section 4. No law shall be enacted respecting an
6	establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise
7	thereof, or abridging the freedom of speech or of the press or
8	the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition
9	the government for a redress of grievances.
10	The freedom of speech shall not include the expenditure of
11	money to influence elections."
12	SECTION 3. The question to be printed on the ballot shall
13	be as follows:
14	"Shall the Hawaii State Constitution be amended to
15	symbolically state that freedom of speech protections under
16	the Hawaii State Constitution do not include the expenditure
17	of money to influence elections, as a means to express
18	disapproval of the United States Supreme Court's decision in
19	Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission which allows
20	unrestricted spending by corporations on elections?"
21	SECTION 4. New constitutional material is underscored.



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- 1 SECTION 5. This amendment shall take effect upon
- 2 compliance with article XVII, section 3, of the Constitution of
- 3 the State of Hawaii.
